This section summarizes information regarding characteristics of the tributary and its adjacent wetlands, if any, and it helps determine whether or not the standards for jurisdiction established under *Rapanos* have been met.

The agencies will assert jurisdiction over non-navigable tributaries of TNWs where the tributaries are "relatively permanent waters" (RPWs), i.e. tributaries that typically flow year-round or have continuous flow at least seasonally (e.g., typically 3 months). A wetland that directly abuts an RPW is also jurisdictional. If the aquatic resource is not a TNW, but has year-round (perennial) flow, skip to Section III.D.2. C. SIGNIFICANT NEXUS DETERMINATION

A significant nexus analysis will assess the flow characteristics and functions of the tributary itself and the functions performed by any wetlands adjacent to the tributary to determine if they significantly affect the chemical, physical, and biological integrity of a TNW. For each of the following situations, a significant nexus exists if the tributary, in combination with all of its adjacent wetlands, has more than a speculative or insubstantial effect on the chemical, physical and/or biological integrity of a TNW. Considerations when evaluating significant nexus include, but are not limited to the volume, duration, and frequency of the flow of water in the tributary and its proximity to a TNW, and the functions performed by the tributary and all its adjacent wetlands. It is not appropriate to determine significant nexus based solely on any specific threshold of distance (e.g. between a tributary and its adjacent wetland or between a tributary and the TNW). Similarly, the fact an adjacent wetland lies within or outside of a floodplain is not solely determinative of significant nexus.

B. ADDITIONAL COMMENTS TO SUPPORT JD: Limits of the jurisdiction of wetlands were established by the 1987 Delineation Manual. The site visit was performed during a drought period. Wetlands were discovered within the boundaries of the review area. The prevalence of hydrophytic vegetation was documented as well as hydric soils and hydrology indicators such as aquatic fauna and saturation to surface with a high water table. The on-site wetlands were determined to be a portion of Green Swamp, a continuous wetland system which consists of multiple braided channels which become channelized at road crossings to become a perennial tributary (pRPW). Flow of the onsite tributary was determined to be perennial by observing the tributary north of the review area on Green Swamp Road. Flowing water was observed within a drought period. Indicators of hydrology included the presence of OHWM and bed and banks, a natural channel which is absent of vegetation. Sinuousity of the channel was observed although the water level was over the top of the channel width and flooding into the adjacent floodplain wetlands known as Green Swamp. One main channel was observed which rapidly braids into multiple channels within the floodplain wetlands. USGS Topo maps depict this reach of Green Swamp as a blue line stream which is located off-site to the east. The wetlands are also depicted on this map as adjacent floodplain wetlands. The stream is more defined in aerial imagery further downstream before it flows into the Pocotaligo River. Flow enters the property from north and continues towards the south to continue off-property and continues through Green Swamp (perennial RPW) which continues in an east-southeast direction and drains into the Pocotaligo Swamp (perennial RPW), providing a hydrologic connection to the Black River (TNW). One (1) linear feature was observed on the subject property and was determined to have bed and banks but did not have an OHWM. The linear feature was determined to be a natural drainage feature which lies entirely within uplands. A site visit determined that some areas marked on the NWI maps as palustrine forested wetlands had been filled. A review of aerial photographs determined that these areas had been excavated dating back as far as 1994. No older aerial photographs were obtained. The areas were determined to have been excavated out of uplands and subsequently filled prior to the site visit. No other potentially jurisdictional features were observed within the review area.
