From the Commander - 2009 Year in Review

One year ago the Wing established what we wanted to accomplish for 2009. As we look back to last year, I'd like to share with you what SDANG FILE PHOTO OUR goals were and take

a measurable objective look at how we did. Our goal was to safely train and

equip battle-ready Airmen to meet any assigned state and federal mission.

We executed an \$81 million budget flying 6,105 hours with no Class A/B or Weapons accidents. This is accomplished with Technical Order compliance, outstanding attention to detail, and unwavering professionalism.

The Operations Group had a goal of less than 10 percent Regualification Training. The 114th averaged 3 percent. Congratulations to Major Kestel who is the first unit-selected graduate to complete the Weapons Instructor Course in the last 23 years.

The 114th Fighter Wing accomplished ASA and AEF mission-focused training through both day and night intercept training with Civil Air Patrol, two mobile training team exercises with Joint Terminal Attack Controllers, a large force exercise to Maple Flag, Canada, and a Tucson live munitions deployment.

The Maintenance Group 's goal was a 72 percent mission capable rate and exceeded those expectations with 74.5 percent mission capable rate. Total abort rate expected was 4 percent maximum and we acheived 3.35 percent. The Maintenance Group also surpassed the 960 MSEP inspections at a 92 percent pass rate by accomplishing 1,360 inspections with a 94.6 percent pass rate.

Mission Support Group performed CBRNE training for 95 percent of the personnel, with 97 percent being initial taining, 98 percent refresher training and 90 percent TQT.

The Group deployed 337 personnel to nine different countries around the world throughout the year.

Communications ensured the successful migration to Exchange 2007 with 100 percent of the base migrated.

The 114th Medical Group immunized 96.5 percent of the personnel, exceeding the goal of 95 percent. Dental went above and beyond their goal of 90 percent of dental readiness by reaching 96.5 percent of the force. Nearly 97 percent of our personnel passed the

program fitness standards this year and 95.6 percent of the base population was tested.

Our goal was to position the 114FW for a community based Active Associate unit with an advanced fighter to follow.

The Fighter Wing flew 3,700 hrs in fiscal year 2009, bringing our total of accident-free flying hours to 12,923. The Logistics Evaluation and Standardization Team evaluation resulted in the unit receiving a 99 percent complies in critical areas with the team reporting, "the best inspection they've seen in last 3 years."

During the Unit Compliance Inspection we acheived 99 percent complies or complies with comments, "Mission Support Group stands out as one of the best units inspected," and three areas rated, "Best Seen to Date."

The unit also accomplished briefings with Air Combat Command's integrated staff, NGB/A8, and the Deputy Director of ANG on associations and potential future missions.

Our goal was to increase positive visibility of the unit at the local, state and national levels.

With a goal of recognizing a minimum of 10 percent of personnel with awards and decorations, we recognized 11 percent locally in addition to AEF decorations.

TheAirShowandopenhousewereabigsuccess and we saw over 150,000 satisfied attendees. Our goal was to recruit to 18

PAA end strength within two years. The recruiting team reached our 100 percent

manned goal within 13 months. Great job! As we reflect on 2009 and the previous

decade, you should be extremely proud of what you have accomplished. The events of 9-11 led to an Operations Tempo in the Air National Guard that has never been seen before. The contributions, commitment and sacrifices by you and your families will be of historical perspectives. As we enter 2010 and a new decade, we will continue to challenge ourselves and grow as a unit, and I look forward to working alongside of you continuing our proud heritage of excellence.

114TH OPERATIONS GROUP COMMANDER



114th Operations Group has experienced an extremely busy and diverse 2009. We began the new year preparing for a SDANG FILE PHOTO high visibility Unit

Compliance Inspection which took place in March. Our top-notch enlisted and officer Airmen responded in South Dakota fashion, demonstrating an extremely high level of enthusiasm, professionalism, and confidence. Our **Superior Performance Teams included** Aircrew Flight Equipment led by Chief Master Sgt. James R. Bradshaw and the Intelligence Shop led by Maj. Brandon W. Eskam. In addition to team recognition, individual superior performers were Maj. Eskam, Staff Sgt. Mark S. Kreul, and Staff Sgt. Drew A. Popham, all from Intelligence section. Also cited as superior performers were Capt. Steven R. Schultz for his work with the Electronic Combat and Weapons area, and Master Sgt. Steven R. Jansen for his work with the Aviation Resource Management shop Especially noteworthy was the work Maj. Eric J. Gerber accomplished in preparing the Operations Training program for the inspection. We are proud of the entire group for the manner in which they prepared and demonstrated utmost pride and professionalism to the inspection team.

In May, we responded to a short notice Air Combat Command tasking to provide critical support for the Weapons Instructor Course at Nellis Air Force Base. We deployed jets and personnel and gained valuable training for our aircrew and support team.

Shortly thereafter, we deployed eight jets and 100 Airmen to Cold Lake, Canada for a Maple Flag Exercise

where we were able to train with our NATO Allies in a massive flying exercise. This was also the beginning of our formal spin-up program in preparation for a rapidly approaching Air Expeditionary Force tasking.

July was Power on the Prairie month. Maj. Gerber led a huge team of military and local civic leaders in planning for the largest and most successful airshow ever for the Sioux Falls area. Recordsetting attendance, the Blue Angels, the F-22 Demo Team, and numerous other flying and static displays, as well as nearly perfect airshow weather were key ingredients to a positive perception for the South Dakota Air National Guard.

In August, we deployed yet again to Davis Monthan Air Force Base, Ariz., for a summer Snowbird with the primary objective of employing live bombs and bullets. We expended a total of 87 weapons and fired over 3000 rounds of 20mm bullets with a hit rate of 100%.

We continue to man a 24/7Homeland Defense Air Sovereignty Alert Detachment at Langley Air Force Base, Va., Our pilots have responded at all hours of the day and night in almost flawless fashion. We are at the forefront of a mission the U.S. President has termed "No Fail."

In September, we formally began spin-up for our third AEF deployment since 2006. We hosted the 23rd Special Tactics Squadron from Hurlburt Air Force Base, Fla., for two weeks to assist with Close Air Support training very similar to what we will see while we are deployed. The team operated from Norfork, Neb., underneath military special use airspace while we provided on-demand air support. Demanding scenarios and challenging weather conditions made for extremely valuable and realistic training. We again hosted the 23rd STS

for two weeks in October for a top-off training opportunity emphasizing advanced combat scenarios and night operations. The majority of the Operations Group will deploy in December to Operation Iraqi Freedom.

This year we said goodbye to several longtime unit members. Maj. Matthew Fritz left after a long tenure, transferring to the Florida Air Reserve Component at Homestead Air Reserve Base, Fla., Maj. Leslie Zyzda-Martin accepted an assignment to Nellis Air Force Base, Nev., working for the 561st Joint Tactics Squadron. Chief Master Sgt. Bruce E. Anderson left us after serving as our First Sergeant for many years and Staff Sgt. Elizabeth Bartmann left the military for the civilian world.

We've also said hello to many additions to the group. 2nd Lt. Dell R. Schledewitz with his wife Erika reported here after completion of F-16 training at Luke Air Force Base, Ariz., Tech. Sgt. Kristi Niedert transferred from Public Affairs as a Knowledge Operations Manager. We also welcomed Staff Sgt. Mary K. Snyder and Tech Sgt. Jason Snyder to the Intelligence shop. Senior Master Sgt. Randy A. Wingen transferred to serve as our new First Sergeant and we

welcomed two new pilots from active duty, both from Luke Air Force Base, Ariz.. Maj. Saul D. Hage with his wife Kelly and family and Maj. Quenten Esser with his wife Jennifer and family left active duty to proudly serve with the South Dakota Air National Guard. They both bring years of seasoning and experience. Staff Sgt. Jason J. Mundt transferred to the Aircrew Flight Equipment shop from Security and has been selected to attend Undergraduate Pilot Training. Capt. Scott A. Smit and Nebraska native Sean Cappel were also selected for Pilot Training. Our Weather Flight received two new

additions, Airman 1st Class Luke Olson and Tech. Sgt. Dwaine S. Tiedemann.

2009 has been a very busy time with deployments, inspections, exercises, and AEF preparation and deployment. Our people; officers, enlisted personnel, and civilians have all made it happen. We look forward to continued success and challenges in 2010.

114th Maintenance Group 2009 Year in Review

The 114th Maintenance Group is proud of this year's success which reflects the outstanding work ethic of each and every maintainer. 2009 was an extremely demanding year.

It began with our maintainers returning from our second Air Expeditionary Force in two years. Two months later the Air National Guard Logistics Standardization Evaluation Program inspection was upon us, with only three months until the Air Combat Command Unit Compliance Inspection team arrived.

Add a deployment and an Operational Readiness Exercise to finish up in spring. We then threw in two more deployments over the summer in addition to a two day Air Show. The year wrapped up with the departure to another AEF deployment. Let's not forget that while all this is happening, the unit continued to support the Air Sovereignty Alert mission at Langley Air Force Base.

One of our proudest accomplishments this year is the results of the LSEP inspection. The pass rate for Critical Compliance Objectives was 99 percent, surpassing the F-16 ANG average of 96 percent. The Non-critical Compliance Objectives scored two percent above the F-16 Air National Guard average of 96 percent. And the pass rate on Performance Evaluations was 93 percent, well above the F-16 average of 75 percent. The LSEP team stated, "best seen in last three years."

This inspection was followed shortly by the UCI. As expected, the unit performed higher than national standards. The Maintenance Group scored an impressive 83.5 percent compliance on more than 273 objectives.

The group's Dull Sword program was recognized as "Best Seen to Date" and the unit's ratings are at the top of the list of all Fighter Wings compared during the last three years.

Following an AEF deployment in support of Operation Iraqi Freedom, the 114th was tasked with supporting a 3,700 hour F-16 flying schedule. Our routine F-16 flying schedule consisted of eight

morning flights eight afternoon flights, while supporting a 4-ship alert mission at Langley Air Force Base. Due to the relentless dedication and hard work by the 114th Maintenance Group, the wing flew 2,616 sorties while maintaining an impressive 74 percent mission capable rate – 10 percent over the ANG average.

The outstanding reputation of the 114th Maintenance Group can be demonstrated by the accomplishments performed at the national level. 2009 began with our experts in the Metals Technology shop developing and performing a first time field level repair procedure on several F-16 canopy frames. By successfully carrying out the repair procedure on two aircraft canopies for the 114th Fighter Wing, mission essential aircraft were saved from indefinite grounding since canopy frames are no longer in the supply system. This repair is now used across the Air National Guard fighter community as a common field level repair.

Our unit was asked to kit-proof two Time Compliance Technical Order kits prior to being released to the entire F-16 fleet. One is a critical safety enhancement of the landing light while the other is a software configuration upgrade to seven of the avionics and weapons systems. Technical data was verified along with troubleshooting and resource validation.

To close out a busy year, over 250

maintainers, aircraft, and support equipment are deployed once again in support of OIF. There is no question that our performance will be exceptional and we will successfully complete every mission tasked.

Before closing, maintenance cannot achieve the level of excellence we enjoy without support from the entire 114th Fighter Wing. The teamwork and dedication of supply, POL, vehicle maintenance, security, civil engineers, medics, force support, and operations all play a huge part in our success. Thanks to a very dedicated group of people. We are the best unit in the Air National Guard.

The 114th Security Forces Squadron continued their 24/7 security vigilance in this age of ever increasing security requirements and world-wide episodes of terrorism and violence.

The SFS truly shined during the 2009 Power on the Prairie Air Show. Over a span of two days with a total in excess of 150,000 visitors resulted in loads of praise for the smooth entry and exit processes. 114th Medical Group 2009 Year in Review

Looking back on the activities of the 114th Medical Group for 2009 shows how busy the entire Fighter Wing has been with the increased OPS TEMPO. The Medical group processed 325 members for deployment, administered 2,061 immunizations, carried out 732 lab draws, 235 physicals, 758 Annual Preventative Health Assessments, 162 hearing tests, and 774 dental exams. Our people also performed eye exams which resulted in delivery of 520 pairs of glasses, ballistic eyewear, gas mask inserts, and 35 pairs of safety glasses.

Our Bioenvironmental Engineering area worked hard this year to keep our Airmen safe in their work environments. Some of their activities included water samplings, 180 ventilation surveys, 81 industrial respirator fit tests, 75 military gas mask testings, and surveys including air sampling, noise source surveys, and noise dosimeter readings.

As part of our Phase II Operation Readiness Exercise, we conducted a Mass Casualty Exercise. Last year thirtythree members of the Medical Group did annual training at Alpena, Mich. for Medical Readiness training. Several of our members attended Airman Leadership School and Master Sgt. Shawn Greer attended the Non-Commissioned Officer Academy and received the prestigious John L. Levitow award. Sgt. Greer is also an Emergency Medical Technician instructor for the National Guard Bureau and led several courses in Virginia this year.

I am so impressed with the quality and caliber of Airmen we have working in the 114th Medical Group. I'd like to thank each and everyone for their outstanding efforts this past year. I am extremely proud of your professionalism and dedication. What a team!

Let's not forget that the Guard does not exist without the support of our family members and our employers. Please take time to thank them and share my thanks as well. Without their support, the mission would not get accomplished.
