Also, at the time of her first delivery, Natalia's husband was not allowed to be in the delivery room – which was a standard post-Soviet birthing practice.

This time, however, her worries were unfounded. While delivering her second baby at the Donetsk Oblast Maternity Hospital last October, she couldn't help but smile.

USAID TO LAUNCH FIRST ENGLISH-LANGUAGE MBA PROGRAM IN BELARUS

he United States Embassy in Belarus and the U.S. Agency for International Development (USAID) are partnering with the Belarusian State University (BSU) and the Embassy of Latvia to launch an Englishlanguage Master of Business Administration degree program in Belarus - the first of its kind in the nation.

The news was recently announced at the launch of the project Developing an English-Language Master of Business Administration Program. USAID/Belarus will provide funds and expertise to establish the program and transition it into a full-fledged Western-style MBA program, with the aim of receiving internationally recognized accreditation within five years.

USAID has supported business education development in Belarus through partnerships between American universities and business schools and Belarusian educational institutions for more than a decade. USAID remains the primary donor for establishing a high quality MBA program at the School of Business and Management Technologies at BSU. USAID's financial investment and technical assistance will be maximized through bringing U.S. guest lecturers to teach in the MBA program, and taking Belarusian professors to the U.S. to get firsthand knowledge of how American business schools operate. RECENT ELECTORAL PROGRESS IN MOLDOVA

ast fall, Moldovans went to the polls for the fourth time in less than two years in an attempt to break the political stalemate that has existed since April 2009. The voter turnout was approximately 63 percent for the parliamentary election on November 28, 2010. Although the results required hard negotiations to produce a coalition government, the Alliance For European Integration was reestablished and is continuing Moldova's progress in economic and democratic reform.

Moldova (CEC) collaborates with a USAID implementing partner, the International Foundation for Electoral Systems (IFES), to make electoral administration at all levels efficient, and to ensure democratic elections. IFES worked with all stakeholders to help the CEC conduct an improved joint civic and voter education campaign, reaching voters at home and abroad. **Read more**
