The DoDEA Gifted Education Program was designed to purposefully connect services for eligible students with standards-based curriculum and instruction. Seven out of the ten service options are to be provided within the general classroom, and resource sessions are no longer focused on general enrichment. In the DoDEA model, resource sessions are an option schools can select to extend classroom instruction in targeted academic areas for students with significant corresponding strengths.

Enrichment encompasses all the school- and community-sponsored activities that complement the total instructional program:

"Schools and communities should recognize their responsibility to provide enriching experiences for all students. Such experiences may include before and afterschool activities, clubs, special events, mentorships, contests, exhibitions, performances, internships, publications, and other extensions of curriculum."

Schools offer many enrichment opportunities throughout the year, including:

- Academic contests/competitions
- Interest groups and clubs
- Leadership activities
- Seminars
- Special events and opportunities
- Study groups and E-learning

SCHOOLS SELECT TWO OR MORE OPTIONS FOR ELIGIBLE STUDENTS

- 1. Regular classroom/course with differentiation of instruction (K-12)
- 2. Regular classroom/course with cluster grouping and differentiation (K-12)
- 3. Within regular classroom/course with grade acceleration of specific content (K-12)
- 4. Resource sessions outside the classroom (ES only)
- 5. Interdisciplinary courses (MS & HS only)
- 6. Advanced Placement/honors courses (HS only)
- 7. Grade acceleration for specific content (K-12)
- 8. *Grade acceleration* (K-12) The student is referred to the Grade Level Placement Committee
- 9. ADDITIONAL OPPORTUNITIES (K-12) Curricular and co-curricular activities provide additional support for gifted learners. Such activities are often part of the enrichment opportunities offered to all students.
- 10. *Individualized services* (K-12) Specifically designed to meet individual needs, i.e., mentorship, counseling, guided independent study, SPED/ESL support, etc.
