# Summary Wildlife Disturbance Reporting Form

WITNESSES SHOULD NOT APPROACH OR CONTACT ANYONE SUSPECTED OF CAUSING A WILDLIFE DISTURBANCE

## SECTION A: TYPE OF DISTURBANCE

This portion of the form simply requires an identification of the **type of disturbance** (i.e., Vessel, Aircraft, Landbased, or Other).

## SECTION B: INCIDENT INFORMATION

This section requires specific information regarding the wildlife disturbance incident (i.e., **date**, **time**, **environmental conditions**, and a **description of the incident**). Definitions of the Beaufort conditions are included on page 3.

Record observations of anthropogenic (human) disturbances. Any event where humans cause disturbance(s) to seabirds and/or marine mammals will be recorded, including: vessels; aircraft; and land-based. In addition, Record ALL vessels approaching within about 1,500 feet (460 meters, or 0.28 miles), and aircraft flying at or below 1,000 vertical feet (305 meters) and within 1,500 horizontal feet, of a nesting sub-colony.

Photographs and video can be entered as evidence in court cases. Record the subject of each photo and the photo number in <u>SECTION H: Additional Notes</u>. Always have a camera available and when possible obtain photos of the vessel, kayak, or aircraft causing a disturbance. Ideally these photos should be able to identify the aircraft or vessel, show its relation to the wildlife area affected, and show birds being disturbed. Zoom in and get a clear photo of the identification number on the vessel or aircraft. If photos or video were captured, record the contact where the images can be obtained from.

Record **other witnesses** that observed the wildlife disturbance incident. This does not include the reporter's information (reporter's information is requested on page 5).

Describe all agencies notified of the incident. More than one agency can be described in this section.

## SECTION C: DISTURBANCE OBSERVATIONS

The primary focus of the protocol is to record the **number and species of seabirds or marine mammals** flushed, agitated and/or displaced. See laminated field reporting form for the definitions of species four-letter codes (i.e., COMU, BRCO, etc.)

Record the **duration of the disturbance** (i.e., single pass, multiple passes, hovering/lingering, unknown) and note the number of passes or the length of time the disturbance was present.

Note the **behavior of any animals affected during the incident**. More than one box can be described. You may check all that apply.

Did affected animals return to their original behavior after incident? If no, describe how the behavior changed following the incident.

#### SECTION D: VESSEL DISTURBANCE

When possible, record the "CF" identification number of the vessel, and name (when applicable). If the name and full description of the vessel cannot be made, then a full or partial vessel I.D. number must be obtained in order for enforcement to be able to follow up. Note the home port and/or vessel nationality and any special characteristics and/or special markings of the vessel. Also of importance is the vessel color.

Vessel type and vessel length are important. Please be as accurate as possible. If the exact description is not available, add the description in <u>SECTION H: Additional Notes</u>.

Approximate vessel distance to wildlife disturbed. Note: 100 yards is approximately the length of a football field. Please describe the landmark and/or equipment used to determine approximate distance. The landmark may be used to verify the vessel distance to the wildlife disturbed.

Record the direction of travel of the vessel (i.e., N, S, E, W, NW, SW, NE, SE).

Mark the box if a vessel is observed within a **Special Closure**. Special Closures are a type of marine protected area that prohibits access to sensitive seabird colonies and marine mammal haul-out areas.

## SECTION E: LAND-BASED DISTURBANCE

Identify the type of land-based disturbance. If "other" is the most appropriate category, please describe the activity. Note the approximate distance the land-based disturbance is from the wildlife that is being disturbed.

Note if habitat is altered or removed from the site. If so, describe the type of habitat. It is important to record the number of people involved in the incident, vehicle license number or other forms of I.D., provide a description of the person(s) creating the disturbance, along with any further details of the incident.

## SECTION F: AIRCRAFT DISTURBANCE

When possible, record the tail number of the aircraft. The aircraft color and description is also helpful.

Record the type of aircraft. If "other" is the most appropriate category, please describe. Note the approximate height of the aircraft. Be sure to choose "above sea level" or "above ground level." Please note any landmarks and equipment used to estimate the altitude. For example, if an aircraft flies over Southeast Farallon Island, the lighthouse is a landmark with a known height, which can be used to estimate the altitude of the aircraft. Also estimate the horizontal distance from the aircraft to the disturbed area. Record the ceiling height. This is an approximation.

Provide a **description of the aircraft**. If "other" is the most appropriate category, please describe. If the aircraft is a **helicopter**, describe the **number of top rotors** and the **landing gear**.

If the aircraft is a jet, mark jet and continue onto SECTION G. If the aircraft has a propeller(s), describe the number and location of the props, the wing arrangement and the landing gear.

## SECTION G: REPORTER'S NAME & CONTACT INFORMATION

Record the **reporter's first and last names**, most reliable **phone number** and **email**, the **date** the form was completed, and the **agency or organization** the reporter represents, if applicable.

This form does **not** contain personal information of anyone suspected of a wildlife disturbance. Once the incident is reported to the law enforcement agency, personal information will be kept within the incident database. This information will only be accessible by a limited number of people that use the database. An ID number can be sent via the internet.
