Dear Sir:

The February meeting of the DC Intelligence Chapter of the Reserve Officers Association will be held on Tuesday evening, 13 February 1947, at 8 PM at the Officers Club, 1400 New Hampshire Avenue (one block south of Dupont Circle). The speaker of the evening will be Lt. Colonel C. W. Shuler, USAF, who was P-2 of the Amphibious Forces, US Pacific Fleet, from August 1943 to October 1945. He is presently a member of the Intelligence Staff of the Naval War College. He will talk on amphibious intelligence.

In view of the patriotic interest expressed by the members of the Chapter at the January meeting in the subject of national intelligence, there will be a discussion from one place concerning this subject at the February meeting. I have appointed a committee to lead this discussion. To facilitate and to provide a partial basis for the discussion, this committee has drafted the enclosed check list of points to be considered. It is hoped that whatever agreement is reached by the Chapter on this and other topics connected with national intelligence may be formulated into a Chapter resolution for transmission to the Executive Director of the ROA as a proposed draft for an ROA recommendation to the Armed Services Committees of the Senate and the House of Representatives.

The final draft of the Chapter's Constitution was adopted unanimously at the meeting on 17 January 1947. The attention of all is called to the fact that no guest is allowed at Chapter meetings who does not have the basic qualification for membership in the Chapter as prescribed in Article VII of the Chapter Constitution, namely, honorable war-time intelligence experience, or a reserve commission in intelligence, or present employment in a government intelligence agency.

Checklist of Points to be Considered in a Discussion of a
Proposed Central Intelligence Agency or the Principles
to be followed by the establishment of a
Central Intelligence Agency

1. A National Security Agency should be established as a portion of the Executive Office of the President.
2. The CIA should be authorized by law of Congress.
3. The CIA should be headed by a civilian appointed by the President, confirmed by Senate, and responsible to the President.
4. The CIA should be financed from the President's confidential fund and name of its personnel should have Civil Service standing. Salaries should be based on the same scale as those of private industry for similar types of work.
5. The function of the CIA should be the coordination of the collection, evaluation and dissemination of information (intelligence) by all Federal agencies. It should determine the overall intelligence needs and insure the availability of the required information by the appropriate agencies.
6. The CIA should maintain a small separate intelligence unit under its own control which would be concerned with the collection of intelligence not procurable through other agencies.
7. The CIA should prepare such intelligence-military estimates as relate to the national security and which transcend the exclusive competence of any particular department to prepare. Under this the CIA should maintain a small but highly qualified research staff to interpret the basic estimates prepared by the various departments.
8. The CIA should be responsible to the Government through the President to the appropriate agency in the Army, Navy, Air Force, Internal Security Commission.
9. The CIA should have no domestic police functions and no domestic counter-intelligence functions.
