
How are the "parts" organized?

Workforce Investment Boards

Serves as the regional "conveners" for discussions and policy matters relating to intersection of employment, economic development and education issues at the regional level in 15 local workforce investment areas.

One Stop System

Organizes the delivery of workforce services for employers, employees and job seekers in an coordinated network of comprehensive center locations and a network of additional access points



Workforce Investment Board Composition Supports Key Local Partnerships

- Private employers (must make up majority of board composition)
- Economic development agencies
- Education
- Labor organizations
- Community-based organizations
- Publicly-funded workforce agencies



ETA Grant Process

Grant opportunity types:

- Solicitation for Grant Applications (SGAs)
- Request for Proposals

Potential grantees usually have 30 to 60 days to submit applications

Keys to Application Preparation Success

- Establish and document the "need"
- Recognize the individual
- Use existing partnerships / Build others
- Illustrate sustainability
- Build and expand on ETA resources
- Create and describe innovative uses of resources

SGA pointers

- Do ...
- Read SGA carefully
- Organize the application covering all required areas
- Pay attention to rating criteria
- Develop attainable project goals for the period of performance
- Align program activities and budget
- Make sure that staff is experienced
- State the return on investment
- Ask someone to review it

Don't

- Ignore the requirements about the number of pages recommended
- Ignore the private sector
- Inflate the budget
- Wait until the last minute
- Ignore required forms for budget and other assurances
