


Case Study of the Southwest Virginia Higher Education Center 1991 - 2011



Limited Access to Higher Education... if you live in SW Virginia




Percent of 25-64 Year Olds With at Least a Baccalaureate Degree – 2000


Per Capita Personal Income, 1999



Educational Attainment & Per Capita Income

- Workers with high income typically have the highest rates of educational attainment.
- In 1990, 24.5% of the adult population in Virginia had a bachelors degree or higher. In SW Virginia the average was 10.5%.
- In 1990, the average per capita income was \$23,975. In SW Virginia the average per capita income was \$15,713.

Southwest Virginia Population By Age and Sex



Lifelong Learning Trends report that:



- The strongest growth in the past two to three decades has been in part-time enrollment of students over 25 years old.
- Part-time enrollments more than doubled between 1970 and 2000.
- Enrollments of women over the age of 35 has been particularly strong.
- Higher education enrollments at all age levels continue on a longterm growth trajectory.


