John A. Fairbank, PhD, is the new Director of our MIRECC. Dr. Fairbank did his undergraduate studies at Rutgers University. He earned his Ph.D. in clinical psychology at Auburn University. He is a Professor in the Department of Psychiatry and Behavioral Sciences at Duke University Medical Center. He is also faculty in the Department of Psychology at Duke University.

Dr. Fairbank's research interests include epidemiological and clinical studies of anxiety and

mood disorders in adults and children. He is particularly interested in traumatic stress reactions and PTSD. He co-directs the National Center for Child Traumatic Stress. He is also a co-investigator for a National Institute of Mental Health training grant focused on disaster mental health research.

Dr. Fairbank is very active nationally. He is a past president of the International Society for Traumatic Stress Studies. He continues to serve that Society in an advisory capacity. He was a member of the National Academy of Sciences-Institute of Medicine committee that studied compensation for war-related PTSD. He also serves on advisory boards for the National Center for PTSD, Psychology Beyond Borders, and the Center for Child and Family Health in Durham, NC.

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PAINTING A MOVING TRAIN:

Working with Veterans of Iraq and Afghanistan and Their Families

Veterans and families are turning to mental health and other care providers in many settings. These providers need training on military culture, VA services, readjustment issues and best clinical practices. *"Painting a Moving Train"* was designed to meet these needs. This clinical training program has now been delivered in all 9 state districts served by the NC Area Health Education Centers (AHEC). More than 1000 mental health and primary care providers have been trained.

Each program consisted of a shorter evening session followed by a full day meeting. The evening session was a 1.5 hour interactive training tailored for primary care providers.



Post Deployment Mental Health

Research Briefing May 30, Durham NC

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The visit began with an entrance briefing. Attending were Mr. Ralph T. Gigliotti, FACHE, Medical Center Director, Mr. Bradley Olson, Administrative Officer for Research and Mr. Hal Hummel, Public Affairs Officer. Mr. Tewes later met with members of the VISN 6 MIRECC research staff for presentations on their work.

John A. Fairbank, PhD (MIRECC Director) opened the meeting. He presented an overview of the MIRECC's translational medicine structure and its focus on postdeployment mental illness. Jean Beckham, PhD (MIRECC Assistant Director of Research - Genetics) described the multi-site OEF/OIF Registry Study. She emphasized its central importance for the MIRECC's genetics research program. Rajendra Morev, MD (Assistant Director of Research - Neuroimaging) followed with a presentation on neuroimaging. His focus was the research path for finding effective treatments. Christine Marx, MD, (Assistant Director of Research - Interventions) gave the final presentation. Dr. Marx described her work with novel intervention treatments and neurosteroid biomarker levels. Research collaborations with the Department of Defense were also discussed.

Several MIRECC researchers took part in later meetings. Jennifer Strauss, PhD described her work as part of the Health Services Research and Development presentation. Scott Moore, M.D., Ph.D. (Assistant Director of Research - Neuroscience) gave an overview of neurobiological research at the Durham VAMC. The Neurobiology Research presentation was followed by a tour of their research lab facilities.

All who attended considered the meetings worthwhile. This was a valuable opportunity to keep our Nation's policymakers informed about the importance of the MIRECC's mission-related research.

The full day meeting was designed for mental health providers and community leaders. CMEs and CEUs were provided through AHEC. Many of the sessions were sold out. Plans are underway to adapt the curriculum to a web-based format for national roll-out. In addition, the curriculum design will be presented at the national AHEC meeting this year for consideration for national dissemination. The shorter primary care provider curriculum is posted at www.giveanhour.org as part of their training for volunteers. Two new AHEC training partnerships are in development. One is a TBI curriculum (see article below). The other is a special program for pastoral counselors and leaders of faith-based organizations.
