Study. The results of this study have guided Federal policy related to veterans' mental health for the past two decades. More recently he has held senior leadership roles in the coordinating centers of eight major multi-site collaborative studies of psychosocial interventions aimed at treating or preventing mental health and/or substance abuse problems.

He currently leads a study of an internet-based selfhelp approach to cognitive behavioral therapy developed for use with combat-exposed troops returning from Iraq and Afghanistan. The study is funded by the National Institute of Mental Health. It is being conducted with Marines returning to Camp Lejeune.

Dr. Schlenger will continue to serve as adjunct faculty in the Department of Psychiatry and Behavioral Sciences at Duke University Medical Center and in the Department of Psychology at North Carolina State University.

(continued from page 1) Right now a live USO production is touring military bases across America. My wife and I attended 2 of the 4 shows presented at Camp Lejeune in September (that's us in the very back wearing the white t-shirts). Our role was to greet families and hand out free Elmo toys to the children. As you can see from the picture, these shows were popular.

Each of the 4 shows was attended by 300 family members! What you can't see is that hundreds of families who live on base were not able to attend because there simply wasn't room for them. Family Support counselors based at Camp Lejeune tell me that over 1000 children with special needs live on base and thousands more military children of all descriptions live in the area.



As a MIRECC member, I was impressed that every family that came to the shows went home with a Sesame Street DVD that included TLC I, TLC II, and the companion booklet (listing mental health resources, among other information). This was an incredibly effective way to locate and engage one of the most important populations in post deployment mental health: the military family. I think it is safe to assume that the majority of these families have since watched these films. Those who have may have some new perspective on how their family might best cope with deployment and where they can connect with valuable assistance should they need it. VA is now in the process of distributing 200,000 TLC DVDs!

Traumatic Brain Injury: Invisible Wounds of War

Dr. Robin Hurley (Associate Director, Education) and **Dr. Katherine Taber** (Assistant Director, Education) have collaborated with the CSSP and NC-AHEC to develop a series of workshops on TBI.
