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Major Milestone: Registry Study Passes 2,000!!!

Establishing a mental health registry of post deployment OIF/OEF era veterans was one of the first goals our MIRECC when it was established in 2004. The Registry Study was launched in June, 2005, with enrollment of the first participant at the Durham VAMC site. The Salisbury VAMC quickly followed suit, enrolling its first participant in November, 2005. Two more sites, Hampton VAMC and Richmond VAMC, came on board in 2006. On November 1, 2011, the 2000th Registry participant was enrolled! That this accomplishment was realized in only 6 years is a compelling credit to the directors, interviewers, and staff at the four participating sites. It is all the more remarkable considering the time involved. Each participant almost always requires a full day.

Although ambitious from the start, the scope of the Registry measures expanded during its 6 year history. Added were measures of coping, resiliency and social support. At the beginning, all measures were completed on paper and then painstakingly entered into an electronic database. Direct electronic entry of information by participants themselves was first implemented at the Durham site in June 2006 and quickly expanded to all sites. By November, 2007, all data entry for questionnaires was fully electronic. The project also pioneered an electronic version of the Structured Clinical Interview for DSM-IV-TR Axis I Disorders (SCID-I). As the Registry study moves forward, other benchmarks will arise, but this one is special: 2000 participants, 6 years, and a wealth of data!

In August, we welcomed the Reverend Bill Cantrell, MDiv to our MIRECC. He is the new Chaplain for Education

and Research for VA Mental Health & Chaplaincy. Chaplain Cantrell's present work examines the relationship between spirituality and health. One focus is the integration of VA and military chaplains into Mental Health Services, in order to meet the spiritual healing and support that many veterans are seeking or need.



Chaplain Cantrell comes to us with a diverse background of military, parish and non-profit ministry. Most recently he was released from active duty after a three year recall to Navy Medical Center San Diego. He accomplished a great deal during his time in San Diego. In addition to completing four units of Clinical Pastoral Education, and supporting the WoundedWarrior Battalion, Oncology, Radiology and ICU units, he served as primary chaplain for the Special Psychiatric Rapid Intervention Team, and was an instructor for the Professional Development Training Conferences for Navy Chaplains. He also initiated the Navy Caregiver Occupational Stress Control program, and developed and facilitated PTSD spirituality groups for Intensive 8 week outpatient and 12 week residential programs.

Excerpts from "PTSD and TBI: Where Are We Now" by Craig Collins

....Dr. Robin Hurley is associate director for education at the VA's Mid-Atlantic Mental Illness Research, Education and Clinical Center (MIRECC). Her research has revealed a physiological link between PTSD and TBI. "The places where those three most common injuries to the brain occur – a subdural bleed, a contusion, or a third thing that we call diffuse axonal injury – are exactly the areas that control your emotion and memory circuits," she said. "That's exactly why we're seeing the co-occurrence of mental health conditions along with the things that we traditionally see with brain injury, such as dizziness, nausea, vomiting, and confusion." The frequent comorbidity of PTSD and TBI have led to a revision of the VA's clinical practice guidelines, finalized in 2011, for the treatment of PTSD that include sections about frequently comorbid diagnoses, including TBI.

...According to Hurley and Friedman, PTSD and TBI are conditions that should concern anyone – but they shouldn't be feared. "Most people who are exposed to a mild concussion or brain injury are just fine and don't have any long-term symptoms," said Hurley. "Sometimes patients get really scared because of other reports and cases they've seen about patients with severe injuries. For those who do, the VA is well ahead of the curve in terms of screening and in terms of having a standardized, national, comprehensive system to care for them through our polytrauma program."



Group Supervision for Clinicians Listening to Trauma Histories

Therapists treating PTSD often find themselves in parallel turmoil, as they react to the patient's inner and outer worlds. Good clinical supervision is essential. In addition to receiving guidance and support from an experienced colleague, having the opportunity to share one's often turbulent emotions and learning how these can be used to better understand the case are also important.
