This section will be dedicated to an interview with a preceptor. For this issue, it is Dr. Jennifer Yates from Family Medicine. Dr. Yates is what you would call a "True Tar Heel." She is from High Point, NC. She did her undergraduate studies at Duke, and her Family Medicine residency at UNC Chapel Hill. She also completed a Faculty Development Fellowship in 2010 and has been a PA preceptor since May 2010.

1. What do you like about your job?

-I love the variety, I enjoy teaching. I'm never bored and I'm "on the go" all the time.

2. What do you feel about the PA profession?

-PA's provide a huge service especially in the Army. They see

majority of the cases and have to be well trained. In a clinical setting, they are part of the team by providing a lot of comprehensive care.

3. What is rewarding about being a PA preceptor?

-When I receive a consult from a previous student who is now a practicing PA.

4. Do you feel our Family Medicine rotation is meeting expectations to produce competent PAs?

-Yes.

5. What are the keys to success during their FP/LTC rotation?

-Energy, Enthusiasm, Motivation and Flexibility. I also think that the PA mentorship program you've implemented is a great idea.

6. What do you recommend they should have for equipment?

-Stethoscope, Epocrates, Sanford Antimicrobial Therapy booklet, Harriet Lane Handbook, and the Essentials of Family Medicine (Sloan).

7. What do the students need to know prior to coming to their FP/LTC rotation?

-Schedule a time to see me at least a week prior so we can review expectations and their schedule. Definitely know how to use AHLTA prior to coming.
