INTERGENERATIONAL OVERVIEW

7/25/94

The 1995 White House Conference on Aging expects to play a significant leadership role in how our country acknowledges and responds to the social, political and economic consequences of an aging American society. The WHCoA is committed to promoting positive linkages between generations through careful and thoughtful consideration of intergenerational programs, research and policy recommendations.

Over the past few months, experts in the intergenerational field have been identified and contacted by WHCoA staff. The experts have provided valuable guidance in helping the WHCoA frame a strategy as well as to identify cutting edge policy issues. The four overall suggested areas of concentration are: valuing the contributions of seniors, promoting the interdependence of generations, highlighting the roles of grandparents, and enduring positive relationships across generations.

Due to the high visibility of this Conference, it is hoped that we can educate our country's leaders, the media and the general public about the benefits of intergenerational programs and policies. Those who attend this Conference should return to their communities with a better sense of why this issue is important, the benefits of intergenerational programs and policies, what progress has been made in the field and how they can begin implementing some of the major recommendations that will emerge from the Conference.

Intergenerational Activities

- ✓ * Temple University has conducted 4 intergenerational focus groups with ethnic communities (Hispanic, Asian and African-American). They have submitted a proposal to conduct 8 more similar focus groups.
- * The WHCoA featured an intergenerational program in the second issue of its newsletter.
- ✓* At least 24 States expect to address intergenerational issues in their State conferences and related activities.
- ✓* As of today, the interdependence of generations will be the topic of 63 WHCoA local events and mini-conferences (unfunded).
- ✓* Of the mini-conference applications received for WHCoA funding, 11 are focused on intergenerational issues (75 total applications received).

CLINTON TO CONVENE LAST WHITE HOUSE CONFERENCE ON AGING OF 20th CENTURY

President Bill Clinton, on February 17, 1994, formally called for a White House Conference on Aging (WHCoA) to be convened in May of 1995 -- the first such conference since 1981.

In a press release from the White House detailing the convocation, the President noted, "An older America must soon face a new century. A 1995 White House Conference on Aging allows us to plan for this challenge by working together to build policy recommendations for the 21st century. We owe this to future generations."

As the President was announcing his decision

regarding the '95 WHCoA in Washington, the Conference was conducting its first local forum in Tampa, Florida aimed at obtaining grass roots input on what should be included in the agenda for the Conference.

On March 21, 1994, Secretary Donna Shalala of the Department of Health and Human Services briefed the Domestic Policy Council on the progress of the 1995 White House Conference on Aging. Cabinet officers, agency heads and senior White House staff in attendance expressed interest and support for the Conference.

Four-Part Strategy Outlined

Pre-Conference Planning and Programs Underway

The 1995 White House Conference on Aging has embarked upon a four-part strategy of programs and activities to be conducted in advance of convening the formal Conference.

The four parts of the strategy involve local, state, regional and topic-specific mini conferences.

This strategy has two purposes: first, to encourage the widest possible participation by individuals and organizations; second, to identify common interests and concerns.

Letters of invitation have been sent to thousands of potential sponsors of local conferences. Concurrently,

to broaden public awareness, an announcement was also published in the March 14, 1994 edition of the Federal Register.

Both the Federal Register announcement and the letter included guidelines for local programs and activities that could be recognized as official 1995 WHCoA events.

States will soon be notified that the WHCoA will provide limited seed money for the convening of State White House Conferences on Aging.

President: "How will we build upon the sacrifice of D-Day's heroes?"

Tribute To Pathfinders Of A Generation Past Becomes A Challenge To Light Paths For Future Generations

"Let us never forget, when they were young, these men saved the world."

In these words, President Clinton characterized the achievements of American troops who fought so valiantly in World War II. His remarks came during D-Day ceremonies at the U.S. military cemetery in Colleville-sur-Mer, France, June 6th, the fiftieth anniversary of the original invasion.

The President not only credited the fallen heroes of Omaha and Utah Beaches with saving the world, but also noted that those who survived are now the bulwark of the nation's seniors, still contributing to our national pride. Excerpts follow.

We come to this hallowed place that speaks, more than anything else, in silence. Here on this quiet plateau, on this small piece of American soil, we honor those who gave their lives for us 50 crowded years

ago. Today, the beaches of Normandy are calm: If you walk these shores on a summer's day, all you might hear is the laughter of children playing on the sand, or the cry of sea gulls overhead, or perhaps the ringing of a distant church

bell—the simple sounds of freedom barely breaking the silence. Peaceful sounds. Ordinary sounds.

But June 6, 1944, was the least ordinary day of the 20th century. On that chill dawn, these beaches echoed with the sounds of staccato gunfire, the

roar of aircraft, the thunder of bombardment. And through the wind and the waves came the soldiers, out of their landing craft and into the war, away from their youth and toward a savage place, many of them would, sadly, never leave.

They had come to free a continent—the Americans, the British, the Canadians, the Poles, the French Resistance, the Norwegians and others. They had all come to stop one of the greatest forces of evil the world has ever known.

Millions of our GIs did return home from that war to build up our nation and enjoy life's sweet pleasures, but on this field there are 9,386 who did not — 33 pairs of brothers; a father and his son; [and] 11 men from tiny Bedford, Virginia killed near these bluffs by a German shell on D-Day. They

The deadline for organizations seeking funding for mini-conferences was June 27.

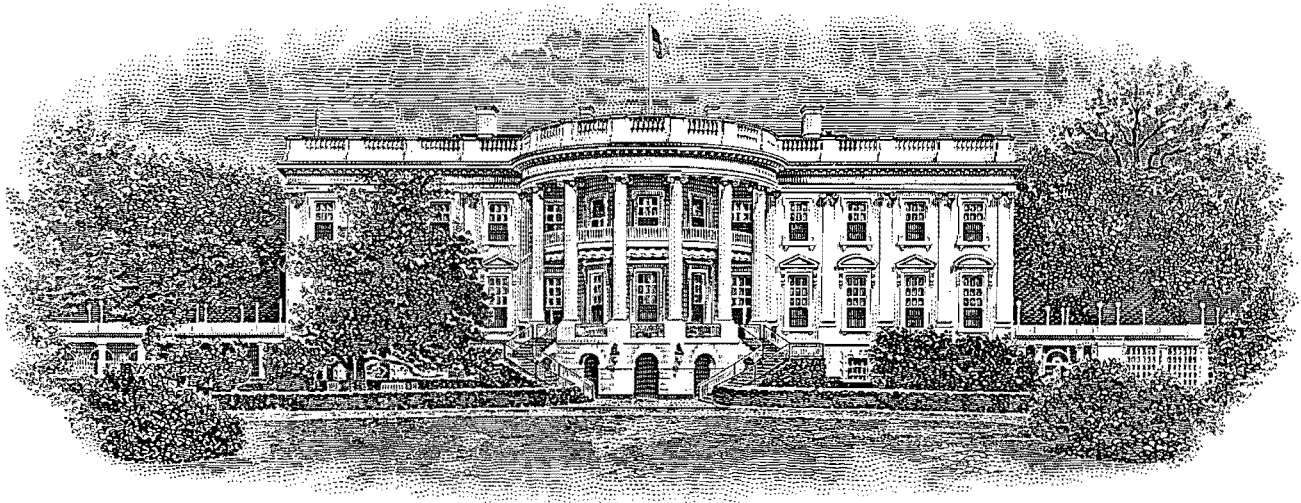

Fiscal Year 1994

- Appropriated..... \$1.0 Million
 - Carry Over From 1991 WHCoA Budget.. \$1.3 Million

- Eighty-one percent (81%) of the \$1.0 million appropriated funds are being used to support State conferences, mini-conferences and public activities such as the Policy Committee and Advisory Committee meetings. The remaining 19% or \$190,000 is for office rent.

Fiscal Year 1995

- Appropriation Request..... \$3.0 Million
- Eighty-three percent (83%) or \$2.5 million of the \$3.0 million request will go directly to compensate delegates to the 1995 Conference and to pay for the conference site.

In less than six months, the Executive Director has promoted the WHCoA at 74 events in 28 States with California, Connecticut, Florida, Illinois, Indiana, Maryland, Massachusetts, New Jersey, New York, North Carolina, Pennsylvania and Virginia visited several times. Approximately 30% of the events were official WHCoA events. In addition, he has met in Washington and around the country with two-thirds of the members of the Leadership Council of Aging Organizations.

Overview of Five-part Strategy

1. Local Conferences As of July 1, 1994, 182 events were recognized in 38 States plus Guam and Washington, DC.
2. State Conferences Closing date for grant applications was June 27, 1994. All 50 States will hold at least one State WHCoA. The amount of funding in FY 1994 is \$600,000.
3. Regional Conferences Closing date for regional plans was June 27, 1994. There are 27 regional conferences to be held before May 1995. The amount of funding provided is \$200,000.
4. Mini-conferences Closing date for grant applications was June 27, 1994. We are unable to estimate the number of funded mini-conferences at this time. The amount of funds available is \$160,000.
5. National Pre-WHCoA This category of conferences was announced in the Federal Register on July 5, 1994. We have not received any letters of intent to date.

1995 NATIONAL CONFERENCE

OPTIONS FOR CONFERENCE DATES

Background

Under the terms of P.L. 103-171 and the 1993 Technical Amendments to the Older Americans Act, the 1995 Conference shall be convened on or before May 31, 1995. The President announced on February 17, 1994, he would convene the Conference in May 1995. WHCoA staff contacted hotels in the Washington, DC area and found only two hotels with dates open in May 1995 large enough to accommodate a 3-day conference of 2,000 delegates plus 1,000 observers.

Discussion

Adhering to this schedule, leaves 9 months to prepare and plan for the Conference.

Options

1. Reserve the hotel for May 1-5, 1995
2. Reserve the hotel for May 24-28, 1995

1995 NATIONAL CONFERENCE

OPTIONS FOR CONFERENCE LOCATION

Background

The White House Conference on Aging has historically been held in Washington, DC in 1961, 1971 and 1981.

Discussion

For comparative analysis certain assumptions were made regarding location and facilities. These include:

- A maximum of 2,000 delegates,
- An average cost per delegate of \$1500, and
- The dates available in Washington, DC only.

May 1-5, 1995

May 24-28, 1995

Options

1. Hold the 1995 Conference in Washington, DC only.
2. Hold the 1995 Conference in Washington, DC for all delegates with the option of broadcasting to sites outside of Washington, DC for the public.

Both options can be presented within the FY 1995 \$3 million request.

1995 NATIONAL CONFERENCE

DELEGATE SELECTION PROCESS

The total number of delegates for the Conference is driven, to a large extent, by the funds appropriated for the Conference. The President's FY 1995 budget request for the Conference is \$3.0 million.

The estimated cost for each delegate for a three day Conference in Washington, DC, is \$1,500. The chart, Delegate Budget Options (Exhibit 1), shows the average delegate costs at four different total numbers of delegates, from a low of 1,000 delegates to a high of 2,000 delegates.

The processes used for the previous three White House Conferences on Aging were researched to find historical precedents for delegate selection. The chart, Delegate Selection (Exhibit 2), provides information on the 1981, 1971 and 1961 conferences. The most information was available for the 1981 conference. It had the lowest number of delegates (2,211 delegates) with approximately 45% of the delegates from States. It had 1,203 observers, the highest number of observers of the three conferences. Subsidies and pre-conference training were provided for all voting delegates.

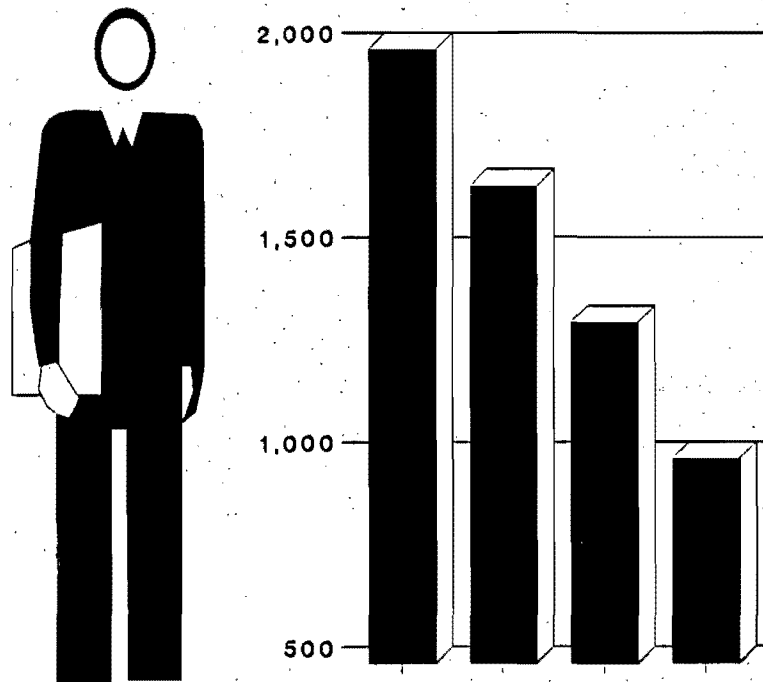
The 1971 conference had 3,600 delegates, the largest number of delegates of the three conferences. Approximately 49% of the delegates were from the States. In addition to the 1,750 State-selected delegates, the States also selected 112 youth delegates.

For the four levels of total number of delegates, the number of delegates which could be selected/appointed by various means at each level is shown in the table, Delegate Range (Exhibit 3). For a Conference of 2,000 delegates, State delegates could be appointed based upon the percentage of the State's population over 60 years of age.

- February 1995 -- A WHCoA mini-conference is being sponsored by St. Joseph's Regional Health Center in Hot


