NATIVE PLANTS & TREES FOUND IN HQ PACAF'S COURTYARD OF HEROES

LOULU



There is a Loulu palm in the far left corner of the courtyard.

Although many people think of palm trees when they think of Hawaii – oftentimes with an image of a coconut palm swaying slightly in the breeze along a sandy beach – there was only one type of palm tree on the islands before the Polynesians arrived. That was the Loulu (genus Pritchardia); it is the only palm native to Hawaii. About 26 species of Loulu are found on tropical Pacific islands, with about 23 species growing around Hawaii – of which nineteen are endemic to these islands. "Endemic" means that this is the only place in the world that these palm trees grow.

The generic name "Pritchardia" comes from the name of William Thomas Pritchard (1829-1907), who was a 19th century British consul in Fiji and a well-known adventurer.
