Population Enrolled: 39,928 Total; 7,727 Active Duty Soldiers, 12,745 Active Duty Family Members, 19,456 Retirees and their Family Members; 4,474 Active Duty trainees included in the active duty total but not enrolled. Facility: The original hospital was constructed on Camp Gordon in 1941. It consisted of 139 separate one-story buildings over 80 acres of land with 9 miles of corridors. The present consolidated building was constructed between 1973-1975. Dwight David Eisenhower Army Medical Center was dedicated on April 24, 1975, in honor of the former General of the Army and 34th President of the United States. The 14 story medical center measures 622,661 square feet and occupies another 314,011 square feet in outlying buildings on Fort Gordon.

Graduate Medical Education and Training Programs: Family Medicine, Internal Medicine, General Surgery, Orthopedic Surgery, and Transitional Year Residencies. Also Oral and Maxillofacial Surgery Dental Residency, Clinical Psychology Internship and Residency, Nurse Anesthesia Residency, Surgical Podiatry Residency, Clinical Pastoral Education, Social Work Internship, and Health Care Administration.

Other Training Programs / Hospital Education & Training (HET): Graduate Program for Anesthesia Nursing, Practical Nurse Course, Operating Room Technician, Radiology Technician, Laboratory Technician courses, and rotational training for Special Forces Medics. HET also offers, Life Support courses to include BLS, ACLS, PALS, and ATLS. Additionally, HET facilitates the transition of novice Registered Nurses through the BG (R) Anna Mae Hayes Clinical Nurse Transition Program.
