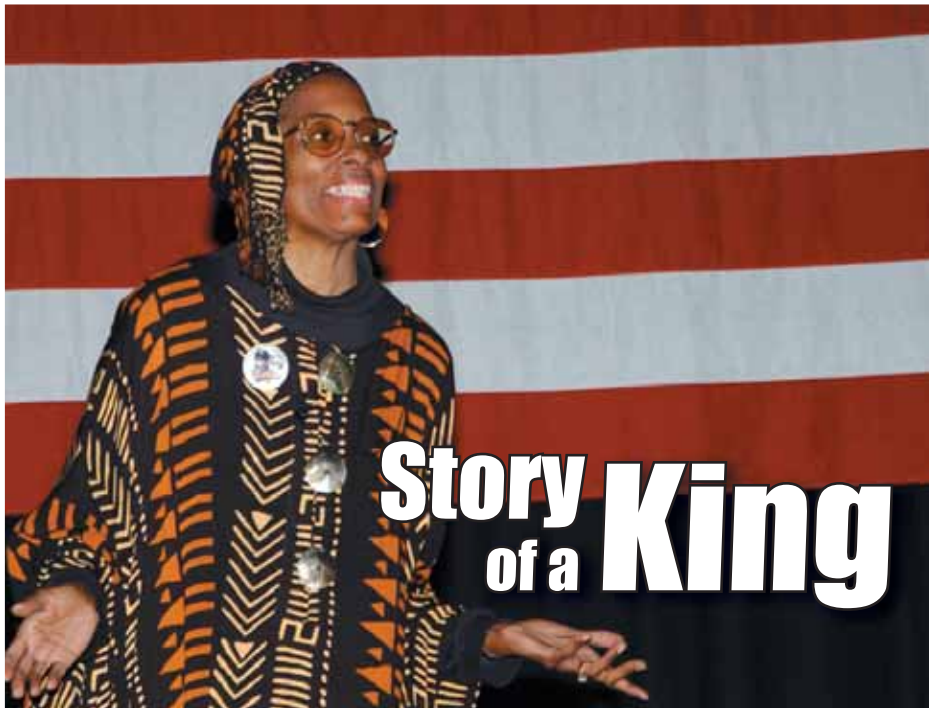

Turkey Time

Group set for AEF

Some Group members are gearing up for more than their usual two days a month.

The 931st ARG is scheduled to participate in an Aerospace Expeditionary Force mission to Incirlik, Turkey, soon after the February Unit Training Assembly.

The AEF will require the 931st to rotate more than 60 personnel to fill nearly 40 operations and maintenance positions in support of Operation Enduring Freedom.

Two Air National Guard units will lead the AEF while the 931st ARG is deployed.

"When we first arrive, the 117th Air Refueling Wing from Birmingham, Ala. will be the lead unit," said Lt. Col Roger Gallet, 18th Air Refueling Squadron Operations Officer. "The 101st Air Refueling Wing

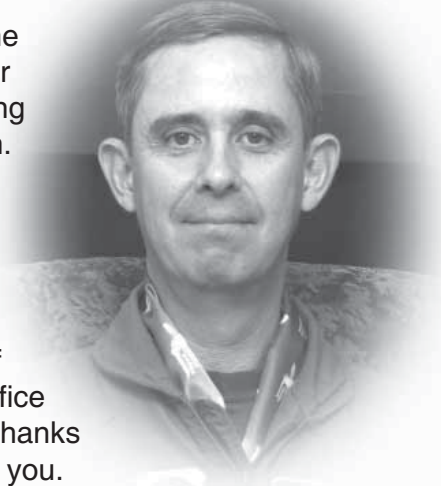

The 931st ARG is scheduled to celebrate its 10-year anniversary of being stationed at McConnell Air Force Base with a dinner May 21 at the Cotillion Ballroom in Wichita.

The event will include food, live entertainment, a slide show and a series of story boards depicting major events and unit accomplishments since its activation in 1995. The celebration will be a casual adult event, according to Lt. Col. Matthew Archer, 931st ARG evaluator pilot and head of the 931st ARG anniversary planning committee. All Group members, their spouses and other adult guests are welcome.

While many details are still being worked out, \$10 tickets should be on sale during the February Unit Training Assembly, said Lt. Col. Archer. Group members with financial issues are encouraged to speak with their first sergeant about assistance with purchas-

ing tickets for the celebration.

"We are designing a coin to commemorate the event," said another planning committee member, Senior Master Sgt. Donna Lorenz, 931st ARG noncommissioned officer in charge of Logistics Plans. The coin price is expected to be \$5. It will have a depiction of the Kanza Roach on the front with the statement "People Of The Southwind Unite To Rekindle Their Spirit," and on the back will be an hour glass with the dates 1995 and 2005 across from each other.

"We are also creating a website where members can get continual updates on the dinner, provide photos, and reserve tickets or coins," Sgt. Lorenz said.

Event organizers are also looking for old photos and other commemorative items to be loaned for display during the dinner.

ESGR seeking Freedom Award nominees

out of Bangor, Maine, will take over in the beginning of March.” The responsibility to fill maintenance positions fell to Master Sgt. James Kirk and Staff Sgt. Edward Cropper, Maintenance Squadron Unit Deployment Managers. “We filled all the positions with volunteers,” Sgt. Kirk said. “IGX players were given first consideration and the remaining slots were turned over to individual shops to pick who should go.”

Asking for volunteers worked well in filling the mission requirements, according to Sgt. Cropper. “In fact we had more than enough volunteers and had eight to 10 alternates in case of emergencies. And now three of them are definite because of emergencies,” he said.

Filling the operations slots was trickier. “The biggest obstacle was getting volunteers among traditional reservists,” Lt. Col. Gallet said. “We are converting the planes to a new Global Air Traffic Management System. It’s an upgrade of the navigational and avionics equipment. Most of our folks have, or will have, eaten up their annual training days getting trained on the new software and hardware.”

According to Gallet, of the 15 operations slots, there will be three crews consisting of two pilots and

one boom per crew, an operations staff making up two pilots and one boom, one flight manager and two life support people. Most of the members will deploy for only 15 days and will swap out in early March.



Originally, the 931st ARG was scheduled to deploy to Istres, France, but the mission was closed in December. “It closed because the mission over the Balkans didn’t require refueling sup-

port from NATO,” Lt. Col. Gallet said.

All the 931st’s AEF deployers are scheduled to be back home by the end of March.

Every time a coin plunked into her collection can, tsunami victims in Asia received a little more financial aid. Tech. Sgt. Suzanne Tarr, 18th Air Refueling Squadron orderly room non-commissioned officer in charge, was the Group's coordinator for collecting money to help with the recent crisis.

Sgt. Tarr said she felt compelled to action after seeing stories about the destruction left by the tsunami on the

local news. "I saw a man carrying his dead daughter in his arms," she said. "She looked about the same age as my little girl, so I felt I had to do something."

Sgt. Tarr decided to help raise funds for the victims with a collection can.

Motivated by her enthusiasm, many were quick to pitch in. "It seems

everyone wants to help," she said. Sgt. Tarr said the donations would be turned over to an emergency relief agency currently in the area supporting the victims.

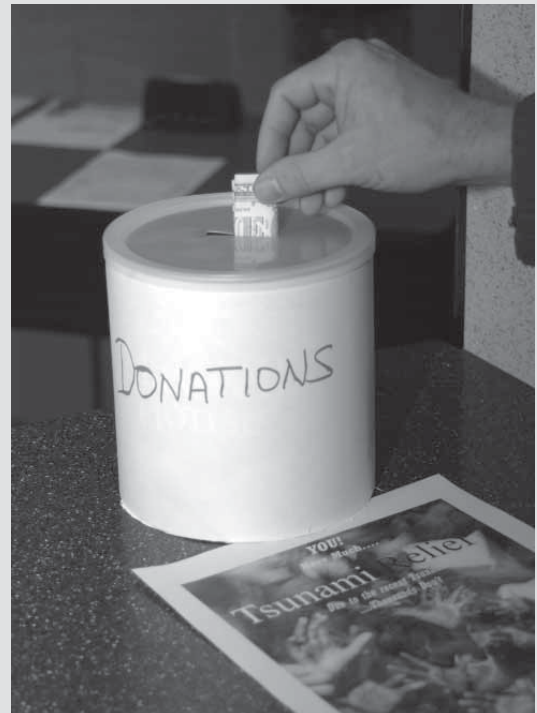

who was last year's 931st noncommissioned officer of the year, said she was honored McConnell's African-American Heritage Committee asked her to be part of the luncheon because it gave her the opportunity "to do (her) part."

"I believe in the values of Martin Luther King," she said. "I believe in unity. I want to encourage others to get involved."

The career enhancement chief said she remembers Dr. King shaping her own world as a young girl in Macon, Ga. "My family use to participate in Martin Luther King parades before it was ever a holiday," she said. Growing up in the Deep South was an experience that raised many questions for a young

African-American. Some answers, Sgt. Cornelius said, were found with Dr. King. "He said it was ok to have friends of other races," she remembered. "He wanted to unite, not divide."

For those who missed the MLK luncheon, a banquet is scheduled for Feb. 17 to honor Black History Month (call **(316) 759-3587** for more information). Sgt. Cornelius said she will take part in that event as well. "It would be great to see more traditional reservists at these events," she said. "I've seen some of the 931st's full-timers attend, but these events are for everybody. Our traditional family members aren't invited only to events scheduled during Unit Training Assemblies."
