Far from the hustle and bustle that surrounds most of McConnell, in a corner of the base where few ever venture, 931st Air Refueling Group civil engineers are swarming over the land, ripping up earth and rocks as they build a state-of-the-art confidence course.

The course, which will be used for training by airmen from the 22nd Security Forces Squadron as well as fellow reservists from the Army, Navy and Marine Corps, is expected to be finished by April -- at a cost of more than \$50,000.

18th Air Refueling Squadron changes hands

New commander says squadron to stay focused on 'getting the job done'

Lieutenant Col. Ronald Johnston took command of the 931st Air Refueling Group's 18th Air Refueling Squadron Nov. 6 as scores of his fellow reservists turned out for the ceremony and wished him well.

Johnston, the former operations officer for the 18th ARS took over from Lt. Col. Ellis Yoder, who moved on to become the 931st ARG deputy commander.

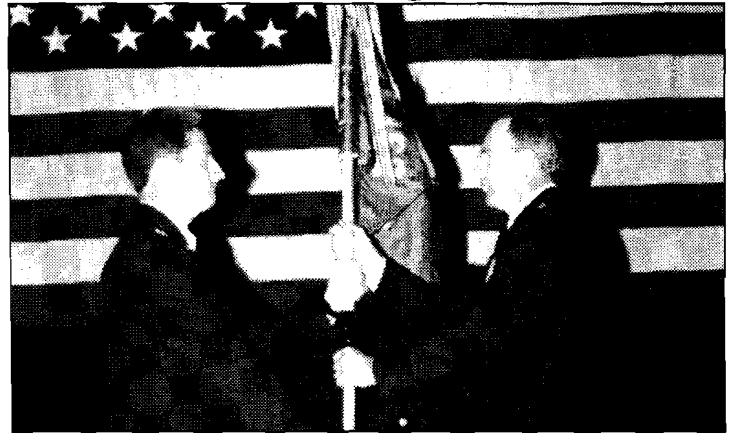
The new commander brings more than 27 years of military experience with him to the job, having served in jobs as diverse as a weapons officer in the RF-4

Phantom, navigator in the C-130 Hercules and chief of weapons and tactics for the 924th Tactical Fighter Group at Bergstrom Air Force Base, Texas.

Johnston entered active duty in mid-1972 after graduating from Southern Methodist University in Dallas with a bachelor's degree in mechanical engineering.

After about six years on active duty, Johnston joined the Air Force Reserve and continued to serve at Bergstrom until 1991, when he took jobs as chief of current operations and chief of the navigation section for the 940th Air Refueling Wing at McClellan AFB, Calif.

Johnston left that position in the fall of 1995 and joined the

931st ARG just a few months after it was reactivated and assigned to McConnell.

While with the 931st, Johnston has served as commander of the 931st Operations Support Flight and as operations officer for the 18th ARS.

Johnston said he plans to "continue to have the squadron stay focused on getting the job done" while under his command.

Johnston is a master navigator with more than 6,000 flight hours in the RF-4 Phantom, the C-130 Hercules and the KC-135 Stratotanker.

The full story: Air Force officials say anthrax misinformation putting airmen at risk

WASHINGTON -- Since the Department of Defense made vaccination mandatory, anthrax has become a hot topic of conversation.

Many service members -- active, Guard and Reserve -- may have jeopardized their military careers due to information gained from potentially unreliable sources.

Pilots, lately the most visible challengers of the anthrax vaccination program, stand to risk the most.

Or do they?

"Much of our earning capacity as airline pilots occurs in the final years that we serve with the airline," said Brig. Gen. Myron Ashcraft, chief of staff, Ohio Air National Guard and a

United Airlines pilot. "For that reason, it is imperative that we reach age 60, mandatory retirement age, still able to pass a physical examination every six months."

In recent testimony before the House Armed Services Committee, Rep. Benjamin Gilman, R-N.Y., said, "Twenty-five of the 48 pilots at Stewart Air National Guard Base, N.Y., have submitted resignations to be held in the event mandatory anthrax vaccination goes forward. Most of them happen to be airline pilots, very much concerned about their physical conditions following vaccination."

This statement addresses a common rumor in the flying world that civilian airlines won't hire military pilots who have taken the anthrax vaccine.

"I have been a commercial airline pilot since 1978 and can assure you that anything that might jeopardize my career has my full attention," Ashcraft said.

But according to the general, the anthrax vaccination is a non-issue for commercial airlines and the Federal Aviation Administration's Aeromedical Certification Division.

Taking the anthrax shot has no effect on airline hiring and no effect on being granted a civilian medical certificate, according to Ashcraft.

"United (Airlines) does not even ask if you have had the shots," he said.

So where can a pilot or service member turn for factual, objective information on anthrax and the vaccination? One place is the Anthrax Tool Kit, sponsored by the U.S. Air Force

Medical Service.

Although written for commanders to use when briefing members, the site provides information on medical deferrals, exemptions, frequently asked questions, religious waivers and consumer information. This site is currently restricted to ".mil" hits only, and must be accessed from a computer authorized for access to .mil sites. However, Air Force officials are working to release the site into the public domain.

Toy stor

With cash in hand and a purpose in mind, Niemietz along with Master Sgt. Larry Shippy, Tech Sgt. Steve Swiercinsky and

Senior Airman Paula Hearn headed to McConnell's Base Exchange Nov. 4 to buy as many high-quality toys as they could with the money they had raised.

What must have looked like "combat shopping" to the parents who flooded toy aisles that weekend to pick out special Christmas gifts for sons or daughters was really a mission of mercy for the camouflaged maintainers as they jockeyed for position amid the holiday shopping rush.

In all, the AGS group bought more than \$320 in toys -- everything from Barbie dolls to Star Wars action figures to soccer balls.

"It's so satisfying to help others," said Swiercinsky as he unloaded cart after cart of toys in the checkout aisle. "It's really a lot of fun."

Hearn agreed with Swiercinsky and added she participated in the shopping spree as a way to "give back to the community."

There were smiles all around the squadron as other members learned their money had brought

so much hope to so many needy children.

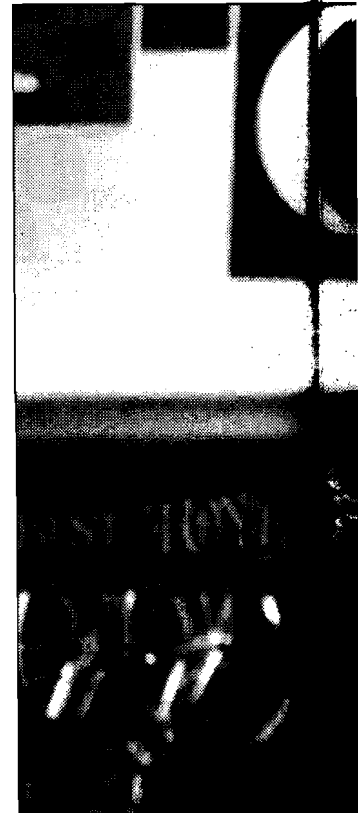
But the story doesn't stop there.

Instead of simply donating the toys to the Toys for Tots organization, Niemietz along with other present and former airmen loaded the gifts on their motorcycles and brought them to a central collection point in conjunction with the 20th Annual Wichita Toy Run.

This year's run, held Nov. 5, involved hundreds of local bikers -- all with new toys strapped to their Harleys, Hondas and Yamahas -- in a line that stretched for miles.

The hundreds of participants gathered just north of Wichita at the Kansas Coliseum -- the regional drop-off point for the event.

Niemietz and the other McConnell troops all downplayed their roles, instead focusing attention on the millions of children who find themselves in need each holiday season -- everyone agreeing that it is indeed better to give than receive.

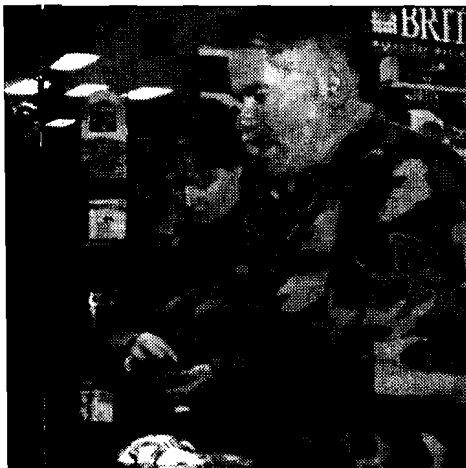

eventually involve scores of reservists, guardsmen and active duty airmen from the 22nd CES and 22nd SFS.

"This project is a big one," said Senior Master Sgt. Tamera Askren, 931st CES superintendent of operations and "point person" for this project. "It will have 23 obstacles and be about the size of a football field."

McConnell cops are ecstatic at the prospect of a new confidence course -- many of them have been waiting for years for a new one.

"We've been trying to get a new one for two and a half years," said Tech. Sgt. Xxxxx Pickering, 22nd SFS coordinator for the project. "Not having one for so long really hurt us in competitions."

Security forces troops often must brave confidence courses at various competitions throughout the year. Pickering added that having a course at McConnell will hopefully give his troops the edge they need to win more competitions.

McConnell has been without a confidence course since the old one was torn down in mid-1996. Askren, Pickering and others involved in the project all said they're happy a new one is one the way.

"It won't just benefit us," said Pickering. "Other career fields such as the finance troops now have this type of event in their competitions."

Pickering added he believes about 1,600 troops will have the chance to go through the course each year -- from airmen at McConnell and neighboring bases to soldiers and Marines from various Reserve units in the area.

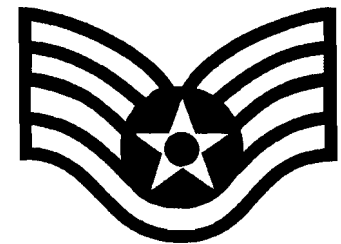
