B. CHARACTERISTICS OF TRIBUTARY (THAT IS NOT A TNW) AND ITS ADJACENT WETLANDS (IF ANY):

This section summarizes information regarding characteristics of the tributary and its adjacent wetlands, if any, and it helps determine whether or not the standards for jurisdiction established under *Rapanos* have been met.

The agencies will assert jurisdiction over non-navigable tributaries of TNWs where the tributaries are "relatively permanent waters" (RPWs), i.e. tributaries that typically flow year-round or have continuous flow at least seasonally (e.g., typically 3 months). If the tributary has adjacent wetlands, the significant nexus evaluation must consider the tributary in combination with all of its adjacent wetlands. This significant nexus evaluation that combines, for analytical purposes, the tributary and all of its adjacent wetlands is used whether the review area identified in the JD request is the tributary, or its adjacent wetlands, or both. C. SIGNIFICANT NEXUS DETERMINATION

A significant nexus analysis will assess the flow characteristics and functions of the tributary itself and the functions performed by any wetlands adjacent to the tributary to determine if they significantly affect the chemical, physical, and biological integrity of a TNW. For each of the following situations, a significant nexus exists if the tributary, in combination with all of its adjacent wetlands, has more than a speculative or insubstantial effect on the chemical, physical and/or biological integrity of a TNW. Considerations when evaluating significant nexus include, but are not limited to the volume, duration, and frequency of the flow of water in the tributary and its proximity to a TNW, and the functions performed by the tributary and all its adjacent wetlands. It is not appropriate to determine significant nexus based solely on any specific threshold of distance (e.g. between a tributary and its adjacent wetland or between a tributary and the TNW). Similarly, the fact an adjacent wetland lies within or outside of a floodplain is not solely determinative of significant nexus.

- Does the tributary, in combination with its adjacent wetlands (if any), have other relationships to the physical, chemical, or biological integrity of the TNW?

- Significant nexus findings for non-RPW that has no adjacent wetlands and flows directly or indirectly into TNWs. Explain findings of presence or absence of significant nexus below, based on the tributary itself, then go to Section III.D: The unnamed trib has an OHWM; provides habitat for salamanders, crayfish, and macroinvertebrates; retains a significant amount of sediment from the previously mined lands surrounding it; has the capacity to transfer carbon and organic nutrients to downstream foodwebs; and is an integral part of the regional hydrology, despite temporal gaps in the surface flow to downstream streams and rivers. This small stream in combination with other small streams in the watershed maintain biodiversity in downstream waters by providing movement corridors for plants and animals across the landscape. The tributary scored 26 on the North Carolina Division of Water Quality - Stream Identification Form which demonstrates the geomorphology and biological production occuring in these reaches Individually, the tributary by itslef, may not have the capacity to carry significant amounts of pollutants or flood waters to the downstream TNW; however, because 70 percent to 80 percent of a watershed is made up of non-RPW, the cumulative contribution is substantial. The surface area and total volume of non-RPWs relative to other tributaries in the same watershed is substantially higher; consequently, contact time for biogeochemical processes and temporary storage of runoff is substantial. The tributary is an important link between terrestrial and aquatic ecosystems and for this reason is able to transfers nutrients and organic carbon downstream, which in turn supports foodwebs in stream reaches immediately downstream. This tributary is part of a system of other similar tributaries in the watershed and cumulatively makes a significant contribution to the physical, chemical, and biological integrity of the TNW.
