

Are you in need of a security clearance or background check? Do you require a military map of a specific area? What if you needed to know how much illumination (moon

cific area? What if you needed to know how much illumination (moon light) there will be next Monday night? A quick visit to the 1<sup>st</sup> Battalion, 7<sup>th</sup> Field Artillery S2 office can help you with most of your clearance and intelligence data needs. The S2 section specializes in both war fighting products and also provides everyday garrison needs in support of all Soldiers in the battalion.

Recently, 1-7 FA conducted battery level situational training exercises (STX) in the field; a roughly two week field exercise. The Battalion Tactical Operations Center (TOC) was also deployed to the field during the STX to support the batteries as they maneuvered through their areas of the training exercise. The S2 section is located within the Battalion TOC to provide intelligence reporting for the missions.



Some of the main tasks that the S2 is responsible for are insuring that weather forecasts, illumination data, enemy/friendly movements, and significant actions (SIGACTS) are updated continuously. All of these elements play important roles in developing mission plans such as the Field Artillery Support Plan (FASP), which is the battalion commander's tactical plan for employing fires; his commander's intent and concept of operations. The main role of the S2 in the FASP is to provide intelligence on enemy information that is vital to the accomplishment of the unit's mission. This may include indirect fire capabilities, air threats, ground threat, and any other enemy information that is relevant to the unit. All of this is pre-



sented by the S2 section in a product called a Modified Combined Obstacle Overlay (MCOO). This product portrays the effects of all battlespace environments such as obstacles, key terrain, and objectives. The S2 section also has large printers allowing it to print detailed military maps of many specific areas that help with creating the proper products for the mission, which are used by the leaders on the ground to successfully execute their tasks.

The S2 section also performs tasks for the battalion that are necessary for Soldiers back in garrison. This includes conducting security clearances for individual Soldiers and upholding the physical security standards of the battalion. Every Soldier in the battalion needs to have some form of security

clearance and because of the nature of their work, they may run into the need to access classified information. The S2 office ensures that individual clearances do not expire and are organized for renewals in a timely manner.

Keeping information secure is important, but so is the physical security of the battalion. In garrison, the S2 office ensures that physical security of all the batteries and headquarters is up to standard in accordance with the post Inspector General (IG) policies. Everything from arms rooms down to individual buildings must pass rigorous inspections based off of IG criteria.

Whatever the intelligence or security needs, the S2 section is ready to answer the call to make the battalion successful on the battlefield and at home station.

The 1-7 FA S2 section is operated and supported by CPT Todd Cramer (OIC), LT Po Chiang (AOIC), Staff Sergeant Randall Cline (NCOIC), Sergeant Nickolas Johnson (Sr Analysis), SPC Nathaniel Mueller (Analyst), PFC Tyler Reynolds (Analyst).

Radios crackled with calls for fire as the forward elements maneuvered towards the enemy. The chaos of war unfolded to the north and Bravo Battery, 1-7 FA sat calmly at the firing point ready to provide immediate fire support to the Second Armored Brigade Combat Team. This is not the beginning of some new, high intensity conflict. This is instead 1st Battalion 7th Field Artillery Regiment's training at Fort Riley for their upcoming National Training Center rotation.

"This is a great opportunity for us to rehearse our wartime mission and also to certify our crews," said 1LT Glenn Rumph, Bravo Battery's First Platoon Leader. The field training exercise at the beginning of December provided the chance for the brigade to once again proof its fire support structure from sensor to shooter in both dry and live fire. Each day saw a new maneuver company executing their mission with Bravo Battery in support. The fire support teams in each company had the task of coordinating all the available assets from artillery, to mortars and even aircraft. "There were times when we had to go cold because of the Apaches," said SFC Andre Payne, First Platoon's Gunnery Sergeant; indicating the proximity of these two heavy weapons systems and their ability to place the preponderance of their fires onto the target.

While supporting the Combined Arms Live Fire Exercise (CALFEX), Bravo Battery also certified each of their individual howitzer crews. "It is a testament to the abilities of these Noncommissioned Officers and Soldiers that they can so rapidly transition from supporting a complicated combined arms operation to being evaluated themselves," said 1LT Casey Nugent, Second Platoon, Bravo Battery Fire Direction Officer.

Ultimately, the CALFEX support and crew certification went very well for Bravo Battery who spent a week in the field and fired over 300 rounds safely and accurately. 1SG Deatherage summed up the event, "these Soldiers performed in an exemplary manner, proving that Bravo Battery is always ready for the call."
