### **Headquarters & Headquarters Company**

The last month has been a busy time for the Headhunters as we completed the division's Reset Assistance Visit (RAV), the battalion's Maintenance Week, and the company Training Week.

Prior to the RAV, the staff sections and company headquarters dedicated long hours and worked hard to put systems in place resulting in several inspected areas being satisfactory and only minimum issues needing corrections. Two HHC Soldiers received Coins of Excellence from BG MacWillie for their achievements in preparing for the RAV; congratulations to PFC Downey from S6 and SPC Bishop from the Arms Room.

From 7-9 August, HHC participated in the battalion's Maintenance Week operations. The company started the week with an early (0330!) alert and rolled out a convoy of vehicles to complete the mission as directed. Throughout the week, the Soldiers inspected and tested many types of equipment including the tent heaters, generators, and chemical protection masks in order to improve our overall readiness.

The company completed Warrior Tasks Training from 13-17 August. On the first day, personnel developed confidence in their chemical masks by completing the CBRN chamber (commonly referred to as the "gas chamber"). Later that day, 1LT Dalton and SFC Wernholm led the company through Land Navigation Training. Their familiarization course introduced Soldiers to finding points through land recognition, compasses, and DAGRs. On Tuesday, personnel completed a road march to the training site and executed the Field Leaders Reaction Course (FLRC) which developed both teamwork and leadership among the Soldiers. In the afternoon, SFC Dougherty, SSG Moore, and SGT Motsinger led classroom instruction on radio communications, evaluating a casualty, and crew weapon systems. On Wednesday, the Fort Riley's Counter IED Integration Cell provided the company with convoy and C-IED training. Training included familiarization with types and uses of IEDs, recognizing ground signs, conducting checks, and reacting to a possible IED. The Soldiers completed two convoys during which they used the skills they were taught that day. On Thursday, each section conducted specialized skills training focused on their specific mission. The week ended with recovery operations including cleaning and maintenance on the masks and weapons.

Families and Soldiers had the opportunity to enjoy the battalion's Kids Day on 10 August. HHC led the MRE tasting and the "Soak-a-Soldier" stations. Additionally, the staff cooked and served lunch to everyone in attendance. We were blessed with great weather for the event and truly appreciated everyone who joined us. The company's next FRG event is 10 October. Mark your calendars now and plan to join us in celebrating the Month of the Military Family! In preparation for the upcoming company and battalion field training exercises (FTX), Soldiers from each company went into a reverse training cycle on 16 August 2012 to conduct night drivers training, led by Alpha Company. The day didn't start until early afternoon, and Soldiers spent the evening and much of the night in the field training

with their night vision devices (NVDs). Convoys were conducted first in the daylight to famil-

iarize themselves with the route, then again with no daylight or headlights, constructing a "blackout" environment. This was to prepare the Soldiers for the upcoming FTXs when it becomes necessary to move undetected through a field environment at night, whether it is to accomplish a resupply mission, or to move the Brigade Support Area (BSA) to keep up with the maneuver battalions needing resupply.



## **Bravo Company**

During the month of July, Bravo Company's overall mission was to continue to be both efficient and effective while losing half of our available personnel due to the block leave period. Both Soldiers and Non-Commissioned Officers worked extremely hard completing every task that was asked of them to standard. Throughout this time period, we balanced



both day-today operations, conducted multiple RESET inspections by the Division



Inspector General Office, completed over 100 dispatches, 98 work orders, completed 17 Bradley M2A2 TOW systems 180 day verification test, 18 Javelin missile system verifications, and ordered over \$125,000 of water equipment that will be used to sustain an entire Brigade with fresh potable water. In addition, we conducted multiple training sessions on Traumatic Brain Injury, Communication/Radio, Life Skills, Family Advocacy Training, and Split Rim Safety Training. In July, Bravo had two promotion ceremonies and two re-enlistment ceremonies (SPC Timothy Luan-

grath and SPC Andrew

Guttierrez). SPC Kendall Briggins and SPC Miguel Solis have become members of the United States Army Non-Commissioned Officer Corps also known as "The Backbone of the Army" and hold the title SGT Briggins and CPL Solis. The tasks, inspections, training events, re-enlistments and promotions conducted during July has allowed us to improve our overall mission readiness and properly prepare for the upcoming NTC rotation.



## **Charlie Company**

Charlie Company, 299th BSB, recently spent four days in the field from 13-16 AUG 12 in order to become more proficient in individual and collective training tasks as well as to synchronize the efforts of each platoon. Training included low light area of operations set up, ambulance exchange point operations, establishing a secure perimeter, communications training, the set-up of a carrier command post, and night drivers training. The company also performed a night jump which involved breaking down all equipment and setting up in a new location. The company performed superiorly with limited personnel covering multiple roles and responsibilities. SPC Wolf, a Medical Logistician, with Headquarters, commented on what makes HQ Platoon successful by saying, "Each Soldier strives to take more responsibility and perform their duties with maximum effort in order to quickly and correctly accomplish the mission."

During this time Charlie Company also conducted ambulance exchange point operations, which were combined with the night drivers training Soldiers were able to familiarize themselves and retrain on their driving skills. During this training, Soldiers not only had the opportunity to familiarize themselves with the night vision goggles (NVGs), but now understand the complexities associated with this skill set. The Soldiers had to negotiate multiple terrain features in order to complete the route. Initially, the drivers secured the NVGs to their Army Combat Helmet. They were able to get comfortable with the added weight to the helmet, as well as the lack of depth perception looking through the NVGs. Once confident with their equipment and surroundings, the drivers began the course. The drivers then approached the first check point, SGT Schaufler and the Evacuation Platoon Leader, were located there in order to ensure safety of the Soldiers. The Soldiers then maneuvered around the turn around point manned by SGT Matlock. At this point, the Soldiers were required to drive back to the start point located near the entry control point for company area of operations. Upon return to the entrance control point, the truck commander dismounted the truck and conducted ground guiding procedures with NVGs.

The mission will be built upon during platoon STX training in early October and the Battalion FTX during late October/ early November. The tactics, techniques, and procedures used by Charlie Company will be refined during these field events in order to prepare for a successful NTC rotation in next year.
