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Corps compensates landowners for property needed in flood control/hurricane protection system restoration

NEW ORLEANS – Landowners whose property is required as part of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers' efforts to restore the hurricane and flood protection system will receive fair market value for any real estate interests acquired. The Corps is working to make the New Orleans levee system better and stronger than ever before.

Compensation for real estate will be determined on a case-by-case basis under these legal requirements:

- The federal government will pay landowners fair market value for their property.
- Licensed, independent real estate appraisers hired by the Corps of Engineers will determine fair market value using standard real estate procedures.
- The Corps may also pay homeowners benefits based on the Uniform Relocation
 Assistance (URA) and Real Property Acquisition Policies Act of 1970, as amended.
 These benefits may include comparable replacement housing, moving expenses, and incidental expenses.
- Assistance received from the Federal Emergency Management Administration (FEMA)
 for housing and incidental expenses may be deducted from the benefits paid under the
 URA in some cases.
