he Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) and the Department of Transportation (DOT), along with the Department of Defense (DoD), are combining forces to develop shortand long-term approaches to reduce motor vehicle crashes and their consequences among veterans, particularly those returning from the current conflicts in Iraq and Afghanistan. The Veterans' Safe Driving Initiative will involve both an information campaign and a strategic research plan.

VA and DOT are embarking on two parallel efforts:

They are launching a *Veterans' Safe Driving Public Health Information Campaign* to increase awareness and prevention of motor vehicle crash risk among veterans. Key target audiences for this information will be veterans, their families, VA health care and other staff, veteran service groups, State governments, and the business community, especially businesses related to automobiles and motorcycles. The information delivered to these groups will build upon the results of the DoD's work since 2003 to reduce service member deaths from motor vehicle accidents.

VA and DOT are developing a Veterans' Traffic Safety Strategic Research Plan to identify priority needs for expanded knowledge that will enable longer-term reductions in crash risks among veterans. DoD's experience and findings to date will be an important contribution to the VA/DOT plan. Experts in transportation safety, veterans' health and medical care, and public health have been convened to identify gaps in current knowledge and are proposing a strategic plan for addressing key research questions. A range of research directions will be considered, from epidemiology to psychology and biomechanics.



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






Returning Veterans:
