The application of the OPSEC process develops effective countermeasures to help us accomplish our future missions- by analyzing and minimizing the risk that may inadvertently reveal critical information to our enemies. Let us ensure that we keep our radar on so that we can protect the mission, our leaders, friends and families and all redeploy safely.

The month of Feb, as typical in the US Army, is extremely busy. The following are some dates and events that will affect your Soldiers during the month of February:

February is Black History Month. The Post will host an observance of Black History on 14 February. Reorganization Ceremony: 15 Feb 07; The DISCOM will reorganize into the 1<sup>st</sup> Sustainment Brigade, and we will activate the Special Troops Battalion (STB) and the 1<sup>st</sup> SIG Co. Multiple New Equipment Training (NET) events are scheduled throughout the month and include SINCGARS (radio), JNN (Joint Network Node or Satellite Communications Package), and Blue Force Tracker (BFT). 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Lt is tax season and the Fort Riley Tax Assistance Center is open for business. The tax center will prepare your taxes at no charge and is open to all active duty and their dependents, Retirees and Reservists. The tax center is located on Fort Riley in Building 7434B, across from the Bowling Alley. Operating hours are Monday through Friday, 0900 to 1800, by appointment or walk-in, and Saturdays, 0900 to 1300, by walk-in only. The following items are required in order to file your taxes: valid picture ID; social security card for yourself and all dependents; all W-2, 1098, and 1099 forms; account and routing number for your bank; Power of Attorney if your spouse is unavailable; childcare provider's address and social security number; college tuition payments; and house mortgage for home owners. If you would like to schedule an appointment or you have any questions call 239-1040.

My family and I would like to thank all the Soldier's, families and leadership for such a warm reception into the 1<sup>ST</sup> Sustainment Brigade family. Okay so what does a safety guy do you ask? I will help the leadership in the decision making process to implement safety measures in everything we do, to help reduce injuries, accidents and loss of government equipment, from training to sports and off duty activities for our families and in home safety. I will be sending safety tips and messages in the monthly 1<sup>st</sup> Sustainment Brigade News Letter to our families at home.

Trips, slips and falls are the #1 accident in the home today. During the winter months shoes, towels, wet clothes and mops are accumulated at the doorways. Most of those doorways have steps near by. Try to keep the walkway or doorway clear to avoid trips. For those of you who have never lived in Kansas before, January and February are the coldest months of the year. With fast approaching storms (Ice storms being the worst) out of the northwest (the Rocky Mountains) or out of the Northeast (off the Great Lakes) we get the best of all the bad weather. Black Ice is very dangerous with the blowing snow. Watch the weather channel and be prepared for the worst. I'll close for now and leave you with this Fort Riley fact - improper backing is the #1 cause of POV accidents on Fort Riley. Look again before backing. Until next time, be safe.
