Kids get teased. They have best friends who don't want to be friends any more. Conflicts such as these are inevitable. But conflict isn't all bad. Technology Club News





Students in the Technology Club are designing and creating multimedia productions. When their productions are finished, each will be broadcasted on WCCP Patriot TV News. Students are instructed on how to use digital cameras to capture digital media such as photographs and videos. Then they arrange this media along with commentary, which provides the narration for their productions. Students utilize the media design process to insure that the needs of their productions are met. They work both independently and cooperatively in groups developing and utilizing teamwork skills. We will be using several software applications such as Power Point, PhotoStory, and MovieMaker. Students will save their finished productions on DVD's to take home and keep.

Before the students attend the ballet, they will have worked on several activities which will prepare them and allow them to get the most of this fabulous experience.

Pre-Activities

- · Students will view and discuss examples of dance from many cultures.
- · Students will see examples of classical ballet and discuss the music accompanying it.
- · Students will discuss the production aspects of any show (ballet, in this instance), such as costumes, scenery, lighting, make up, music.
- · Students will read and discuss the Grimms fairytale, *Snow White*, the ballet to be performed during this educational performance.
- · Students will discuss proper etiquette during the performance and what they can expect to see in the performance hall.
