Title of the project: Legal Advocacy for Victims of Sexual Assault

**Amount Requested: \$831,463** 

Category: Category VI: Improving resources and services for victims of crime.

**Program Goal:** The goal of the proposed program is to sustain and strengthen Legal Advocacy Services for victims of sexual assault. The program will preserve 8 full-time positions and create 1 full-time position while providing critically needed services to approximately 2,200 victims of sexual assault over a two-year period.

Strategies to be Used: The project focuses on two strategies:

- 1) Maintaining Legal Advocacy Services: The project will preserve 8 full-time Legal Advocate positions that provide essential services to sexual assault victims within the criminal justice system. They provide information about the criminal justice process; accompany victims to all interviews; trouble shoot cases; secure protection orders; and assist in trial preparation, court accompaniment, and sentencing accompaniment, including assistance with victim impact statements. Legal Advocate team members each specialize in serving specific populations (e.g., Spanish-speaking, elderly, developmental disabilities, cyber crime victims, child/youth victims).
- operates the most in-depth legal advocacy program in the country. Legal Advocacy promotes reduction in the rate of re-offense by helping ensure that victims pursue cases against offenders. If victims do not bring cases forward, then offenders are not held accountable and may re-offend—at tremendous expense to society.
- 2) *Implementing a Volunteer Program:* The project will create a full-time Court Watch Specialist position to recruit and train community volunteers to serve as Court Monitors thus strengthening legal advocacy services and the overall criminal justice system.

### Numerical listing of key/major deliverables:

- 1) 8 full-time staff position retained (all Legal Advocates)
- 2) 1 full-time staff position created (a Court Watch Specialist)
- 3) 1 contract for 50 hours of database programming
- 4) 500 sexual assault victims served at any one time
- 5) 2,200 sexual assault victims served over the 2-year span of the grant
- 6) Partnerships with 31 law enforcement agencies, 3 courts
- 7) 30 volunteers involved in legal advocacy/court monitoring
- 8) 2160 total court monitoring hours by volunteers

**Coordination Plans:** The Legal Advocates coordinate services with 31 law enforcement jurisdictions and three court systems and are considered essential members of the criminal justice system that helps ensure justice for sexual assault victims.

### 1. Statement of the Problem (15 percent of 100)

According to Infonet Reports (a state wide data 'the 15th largest county in the U.S.) has 34% of all legal collection system) 2008. provides service to 80% of those cases (27% of state advocacy cases in the State, and works with over 500 primary victims of sexual assault. total). At any one time. 8-person legal advocacy staff has been funded by King County for the past three years. Due to the county's unprecedented \$90 million budget shortfall, these funds are slated to be eliminated as of January 1, 2010, and the positions will be lost. These funds account for 15% of: total operating budget and come on top of several other funding cuts. 3 legal advocacy services result in tremendous economic benefits to society. Services increase victims' access to the criminal justice system and increase the likelihood that they will file a case and that offenders will be convicted (thus reducing chances of re-offense). Legal advocates also greatly reduce the burden on prosecutors and detectives by providing oneon-one emotional support and information to victims and their non-offending family members. If county personnel had to provide these same services, the costs (at county pay scale) would at least double. Legal advocacy also links victims to other support and treatment services, which result in additional economic benefits, such as reduced likelihood of related mental health issues and other complications which lead to problems such as unemployment. If funded, will immediately retain 8 full-time positions that would otherwise be eliminated due to funding cutbacks. The positions and structure are already in place, so activities

will also create one position, a Court Watch Specialist, to

fit into the existing service structure. The project will contract for 50 hours with a programmer to update the Client Tracking System to develop specialized reports for the contract.

### 2. Program Design and Implementation (30 percent of 100)

The goal of the proposed program is to sustain and strengthen Legal Advocacy Services for victims of sexual assault. Objectives are to:

- Preserve 8 full-time Legal Advocate jobs that will otherwise be terminated 1/1/2010.
- Create one (1) full-time Court Watch Specialist position to design and implement a volunteer initiative that improves services to victims.
- Promote economic recovery by maintaining the current level of legal advocacy services to approximately 500 sexual assault victims per quarter and by increasing the depth of legal advocacy services through a new Court Watch Program. Legal Advocacy is one of four essential services provided by (others are a 24-hour Crisis Line; Support Services and Counseling for Individuals and Families; and Prevention).
- Promote economic recovery by <u>maintaining current collaborative partnerships</u> with 3 court systems and 31 law enforcement jurisdictions and by <u>establishing new collaborative</u> <u>partnerships</u> with community organizations to provide volunteers.
- Enhance initiatives that improve services to approximately 500 victims per quarter through continued implementation of the Legal Advocacy Program and through the new Court Watch Program. These two initiatives are described below:

A) LEGAL ADVOCACY INITIATIVE: team of 8 full-time Legal Advocates (already in place) works with approximately 500 primary victims at any one time to provide information about the criminal justice process; accompany victims to all interviews; trouble-shoot cases; secure protection orders; and assist in trial preparation, court accompaniment, and

sentencing accompaniment, including assistance with victim impact statements. Legal advocates work with 3 court and 31 police jurisdictions and provide a scope and complexity of service unmatched anywhere else in \_\_\_\_\_\_ State. The Legal Advocacy Team is unique in that the advocates specialize in serving specific client bases, including Spanish-speaking populations, vulnerable populations (elderly and those with physical, mental or developmental disabilities); cyber crime victims; adult rape victims; and child/youth victims. Each team member networks extensively with relevant community organizations, crime victim agencies, and the criminal justice system to enhance services for their respective client base.

**B) COURT WATCH INITIATIVE:** Funding will create a full-time Court Watch Specialist position to recruit, train, and supervise approximately 30 community volunteers to monitor and observe court hearings in order to recommend systematic improvements in the justice system and promote accountability. A recent study of a similar program in Minnesota demonstrated that court monitors have a positive impact on the criminal justice system, with 89% of judges, 69% of County Attorneys, 80% of Victim/Legal Advocates, and 81% of probation officers reporting positive impacts (such as improved court room environment and improved treatment of both victims and defendants). State currently has no sexual assault-specific court watch programs. staff have already received the training to put this program in place. Significance of program to improve functioning of the criminal justice system: Legal Advocacy helps improve public safety by helping victims of sexual assault participate in the criminal justice system. If victims don't come forward, there can be no criminal case, and offenders are not held accountable. Although little to no research exists on sexual assault legal advocacy, studies of domestic violence legal advocacy show that this service results in

significantly less re-abuse, both physical and psychological, and that translates to less pressure on the criminal justice system, both among first responders and the courts.<sup>2</sup> Legal advocacy also results in improved general well-being which serves as a protective factor from re-abuse.<sup>3</sup>

Advocacy produces immediate benefits for the criminal justice system by reducing the burden on prosecutors and detectives. For example, according to Prosecutor, "Because of the number of case [we handle], we cannot maintain contact with the victims, so we rely heavily on the Advocates." Advocates assist detectives when cases are "stuck" and victims or their family members are not cooperating. Victims are often more comfortable talking to legal advocates than to law enforcement. Legal Advocacy enables law enforcement and prosecutors to focus on their unique jobs and roles.

How approach is data-driven & evidence based/extent of coordination: recently embarked on a comprehensive research and evaluation effort, in conjunction with

University (SPU), to measure the impact of its Legal Advocacy services. While several studies have focused on legal advocacy and *domestic violence*, no studies exist on legal advocacy related to *sexual assault*. The evaluation will provide data on the effectiveness of sexual assault legal advocacy in helping victims follow through on court proceedings that hold offenders accountable and thus reduce the likelihood of re-offense. Preliminary data will be available by 9/30/2009. Leading into this study, undertook an extensive review of the literature related to domestic violence legal advocacy, which has proven effective (see above).

legal advocacy takes place within the criminal justice system and thus relies on extensive coordination with the 3 court and 31 law enforcement jurisdictions in its service area.

Evidence-based program: N/A – No definitive studies have been conducted on sexual assault

legal advocacy programs. \_\_\_ is undertaking the first such study, as described above.

### 3. Capabilities/Competencies (25 percent of 100)

Applicant & staff capabilities/competencies: Founded in 1976, is the largest sexual assault victim's service organization in State. purpose is to alleviate, as much as possible, the trauma of sexual assault for victims and their families. The organization's mission is to give voice to victims, their families, and the community; create change in beliefs, attitudes, and behaviors about violence; and instill courage for people to speak out about sexual assault. services (in English & Spanish) include a 24-hour crisis line; legal advocacy; individual and family support; and prevention. Last year, served over 2,700 victims and 5,000 individuals through prevention and community advocacy.

legal advocacy program is unique *in the country* for its depth and specialization of service for vulnerable populations. has been a leading force in bringing \ 1 State to the forefront of services for sexual assault victims. For example, in 1995, became the first state in the country to develop standards for the provision of sexual assault legal advocacy and for training to its providers.

All Legal Advocates have completed a 40 hour, state-mandated, core training program.

They have a minimum of a Bachelor's degree; extensive experience in the field and with their specialty populations (e.g., experience with mental illness, older adults); strong problem solving abilities; and ability to work in high pressure situations with many different kinds of people. A Legal Advocacy Program Manager reports to 'Deputy Executive Director and directly supervises 8 full-time advocates and will supervise the new Court Watch Specialist.

Partners: Legal Advocates partner with 3 court and 31 law enforcement agencies to maximize access to justice for sexual assault victims. Together, these partners have

created county-wide protocols for legal advocacy and meet regularly to discuss and modify protocols and address other issues.

Tracking drawdowns & grant expenditures: maintains a standard accounting system utilizing MIP Fund Accounting software, which enables tracking and reporting on multiple funds across multiple budget periods to meet reporting requirements and demonstrate accountability. The system tracks expenditures and revenue by activity and funding source and will enable to track grant expenditures separately from other federal funding. An independent annual audit has consistently confirmed that is operating with appropriate internal controls.

5. Impact/Outcomes, Evaluation, Sustainment, and Data Collection (20 percent of 100)

Evaluation Certification: certifies its willingness and capacity to participate in an evaluation to be managed by the National Institute of Justice. As the largest sexual assault organization in 1 State, has the program maturity and stability to be involved in such an evaluation. collects data through a comprehensive proprietary software system and is currently working with Seattle Pacific University to conduct a comprehensive research project on the impact of its legal advocacy program.

How effectiveness will be demonstrated: To measure effectiveness, the study will measures the following: Self-efficacy and social support (at intake, 3 month intervals, and after case resolution); Client satisfaction (at 3 month intervals and after case resolution); and Stakeholder satisfaction (annual survey). This will be the first such study of its kind to specifically focus on sexual assault legal advocacy. will measure the effectiveness of the Court Watch Program based on the number of volunteers, number of courts monitored, and outcomes of monitoring (measured through a survey of participants in criminal justice system).

Significance of program's impact to improve criminal justice system: As described above, legal advocates are a critical component of the criminal justice system in creating access to justice for sexual assault victims. Without legal advocacy, victims are less likely to cooperate in criminal charges against offenders, so offenders are not held accountable and are free to victimize others. Legal advocates also provide critically needed social/emotional supports that enable overburdened law enforcement officers and prosecutors to focus on their jobs. Court monitoring programs can lead to tangible improvements in the criminal justice system.

Collecting data for performance measures: The following describes: 1) what data will be collected, 2) how it will be collected, 3) how it will be assessed/analyzed; and 4) the process for reporting the findings and outcomes, which will measure the impact of the proposed efforts:

- Retaining & Creating jobs: Will track the # of positions through payroll records.
- Promoting economic recovery: a) Percent of essential services maintained without

  disruption: To measure maintenance of legal advocacy services, will develop a special
  data report to collect data from its Client Tracking System on numbers of victims served. b)

  Percent increase of essential services: Same as above, but will measure the number of courts
  monitored and individuals served through the Court Watch Program. c) Number of collaborative
  partnerships established to avoid reductions in essential services & duplication: The Program

  Manager will compile a list of activities related to development and maintenance of collaborative
  partnerships on a quarterly basis (e.g., count of partnerships, count of meetings/networking).
- To enhance or implement initiatives to reduce the incidence of violent crime or improve services to victims: a) Percentage of planned initiatives implemented: KCSARC will document the number of planned initiatives implemented (1. maintenance of legal advocacy, 2. implementation of a Court Watch Program) through its Client Tracking System and volunteer

activity log. b) Percentage of individuals who completed (intended) programming:

will track the total number of individuals served per quarter and the total number of cases closed

per quarter through a special report run through its Client Tracking System. c) Cost Savings as a

result of new initiative implemented does not expect a cost savings, though it expects

to serve more victims with more effective service as a result of the new Court Watch Program.

The Legal Advocacy Program Manager will provide all data to the Finance Department, which compiles reports. The Executive Director signs off on all reports. Sustainability: has funded [ s entire Legal Advocacy department for several years because legal advocacy is essential to an effective criminal justice system. Law enforcement and the courts cannot provide these same services. Because the County considers Legal Advocacy services to be core to its ability to serve sexual assault victims, believes that the county will reinstate funding (though perhaps not fully) as the county recovers from the economic crisis. study of the effectiveness of legal advocacy for sexual assault victims (described above) is expected to provide further credence to legal advocacy as an "essential service" in the criminal justice system. Funding will provide needed bridge funding to keep this effective service operating during this crisis period.

The new Court Watch Program is an innovative component designed both to increase program effectiveness and develop the program's sustainability through the use of highly trained volunteers. To further support sustainability, is in the process of expanding its fund development office to more fully diversify funding for all of its programs. **Timeline for sustainability:** Year 1, Q1: Implement Court Watch Program; Year 1, Q1-4: Continue to expand fund raising/diversify sources; Year 1, Q4, Begin talks with county to reinstate funding.
