

What Teaching Military Children Means To Me By Ms. M, Fort Jackson Counselor

Teaching Military Children means that I was able to fulfill my destiny. I began my life at the old hospital in 1956 on the Fort Jackson Army base. Both my parents had ties to Fort Jackson. My dad completed his basic training, and my mom worked in Procurement for 28 years. I followed in their footsteps and have taught and counseled military students at Fort Jackson for 36 years.

Teaching military children means fulfilling my passion. As a teacher and now counseling military children, it means that I have had the opportunity to give back to the soldiers by being there for the military parents' child while he/she serves our country. As a teacher, I observed military children and families face huge obstacles in their lives. The military child scarifies, too, so their parent can protect and keep us safe. If I can be there for the military soldiers' child, then the military parent will know their child is being taken care of.

Over the many years I have taught military children, I am amazed how resilient the children are. I have never moved out of Columbia, SC. Most military children move many times during their life as a military child yet he/she walks in a classroom and starts their school day like they never moved.

Teaching military children is a real-life culture and geography lesson right in your class. There are different cultures and geographic locations they have experienced. The military child and parent are readily available to share their wealth of knowledge with other military children and me. Through these experiences, I have learned so much from teaching the military child. The military child has taught me the importance of understanding diversity as a teacher and counselor. My family and friends tell me they can't believe I have worked at the same job for 36 years. Teaching military children is always changing, brings in new knowledge from the military child's life experiences, teaches current events, and keeps me active and involved.

I am grateful for my job, cherish the memories, and will add more memories as I continue working with military students.
