

## 2006 ACS Group Quarters Type Codes and Definitions

<b>Federal Detention Centers</b>	<b>101</b>	<p>These are stand alone, generally multi-level, federally operated correctional facilities that provide "short-term" confinement or custody of adults pending adjudication or sentencing. These facilities may hold pretrial detainees, holdovers, sentenced offenders, and Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) inmates, formerly called Immigration and Naturalization Services (INS) inmates.</p> <p>These facilities include:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li><input type="checkbox"/> Metropolitan Correctional Centers (MCCs),</li> <li><input type="checkbox"/> Metropolitan Detention Centers (MDCs),</li> <li><input type="checkbox"/> Federal Detention Centers (FDCs),</li> <li><input type="checkbox"/> Bureau of Indian Affairs Detention Centers,</li> <li><input type="checkbox"/> ICE Service Processing Centers, and</li> <li><input type="checkbox"/> ICE contract detention facilities.</li> </ul>
<b>Federal and State Prisons</b>	<b>Fed. = 102 State = 103</b>	<p>Adult correctional facilities where people convicted of crimes serve their sentences. Common names include: prison, penitentiary, correctional institution, federal or state correctional facility, and conservation camp. The prisons are classified by two types of control: (1) "federal" (operated by or for the Bureau of Prisons of the Department of Justice) and (2) "state." Residents who are forensic patients or criminally insane are classified on the basis of where they resided at the time of the interview. Patients in hospitals (units, wings, or floors) operated by or for federal or state correctional authorities are counted in the prison population. Other forensic patients will be interviewed in psychiatric hospital units and floors for long-term non-acute patients. This category may include privately operated correctional facilities.</p>
<b>Local Jails and Other Municipal Confinement Facilities</b>	<b>104</b>	<p>Correctional facilities operated by or for counties, cities, and American Indian and Alaska Native tribal governments. These facilities hold adults detained pending adjudication and/or people committed after adjudication. This category also includes work farms and camps used to hold people awaiting trial or serving time on relatively short sentences. Residents who are forensic patients or criminally insane are classified on the basis of where they resided at the time of interviewing. Patients in hospitals (units, wings, or floors) operated by or for local correctional authorities are counted in the jail population. Other forensic patients will be sampled and interviewed in psychiatric hospital units and floors for long-term non-acute patients. This category may include privately operated correctional facilities.</p> <p>Patients, in hospitals (units, wings, or floors) operated by or for local correctional authorities, are included in jail GQ code (104). Other forensic patients may also be sampled in psychiatric hospital units and on floors for long-term non-acute patients.</p>
<b>Local Jail</b>	<b>104</b>	<p>This type code name has changed to Local Jails and Other Municipal Confinement Facilities.</p>
<b>Correctional Residential Facilities</b>	<b>105</b>	<p>These are community-based facilities operated for correctional purposes. The facility residents may be allowed extensive contact with the community, such as for employment or attending school, but are obligated to occupy the premises at night.</p>

<b>Halfway House</b>	<b>105</b>	This type code name has changed to Correctional Residential Facilities.
<b>Military Disciplinary Barracks and Jails</b>	<b>106</b>	Military Disciplinary Barracks and Jails are correctional facilities managed by the military to hold those awaiting trial or already convicted of crimes.
<b>Privately Operated Correctional Facilities</b>	<b>107*</b>	<p>Privately operated adult correctional facilities operate under contract with federal, state, local, American Indian or Alaska Native tribal governments to house people convicted of crimes. Privately operated adult correctional facilities are type coded back the contract under which they fall.</p> <p>A determination of whether sample GQs with type code 107 are contracted at a state or local level will be made at the time of interview.</p> <p>When determined that the facility houses all or primarily federal inmates, code 170 Privately Operated Federal Correctional Facilities is assigned to the GQ. When determined that the facility houses all or primarily state inmates, type code 103 is assigned to the GQ. And when determined that the facility houses all or primarily local inmates, type code 104 is assigned to the GQ.</p>
<b>Other Correctional</b>	<b>107</b>	This type code name has changed to Privately Operated Correctional Facilities (federal).
<b>Privately Operated Correctional Facilities (Federal)</b>	<b>170</b>	<p>Includes only privately operated correctional facilities that primarily house federal inmates that were assigned type code 107 in Census 2000 operations.</p> <p>Privately operated facilities that primarily house state or local inmates are assigned type code 103 or 104.</p>
<b>Group Homes for Juveniles</b>	<b>201</b>	<p>Includes community-based group living arrangements for youth in residential settings consisting of three or more clients of a service provider. The group home provides room and board and supportive services, such as assistance with daily living skills, and social, psychological, or behavioral problems. Clients are generally not related to the caregiver or to each other.</p> <p>Examples are maternity homes for unwed mothers, orphanages, and homes for abused and neglected children in need of services. Foster care homes are included in this category if the foster parent is an employee of the service provider. Group homes for juveniles do not include residential treatment centers or group homes operated by or for correctional authorities.</p>
<b>Juvenile long-term care, public</b>	<b>201</b>	This type code has been collapsed into 2006 type code 201, Group Homes for Juveniles.
<b>Residential Treatment Centers for Juveniles</b>	<b>202</b>	<p>Residential Treatment Centers include facilities that serve youth that provide services on-site in a highly structured live-in environment for the treatment of:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li><input type="checkbox"/> mental illness,</li> <li><input type="checkbox"/> emotional or behavioral disorders, and</li> <li><input type="checkbox"/> drug or alcohol abuse.</li> </ul>

		These facilities are staffed 24 hours a day. The focus of a residential treatment center is on the treatment programs.
<b>Juvenile long-term care, private</b>	<b>202</b>	This type code has been collapsed into 2006 type code 201, Group Homes for Juveniles.
<b>Correctional Facilities Intended for Juveniles</b>	<b>203</b>	Juvenile Facilities include specialized facilities that provide strict confinement for its residents and detain juveniles awaiting adjudication, commitment or placement, and/or those being held for diagnosis or classification. Also included are correctional facilities where residents are permitted contact within the community, for purposes such as attending school or holding a job. Examples are: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li><input type="checkbox"/> Residential training schools and farms,</li> <li><input type="checkbox"/> Reception and diagnostic centers,</li> <li><input type="checkbox"/> Group homes operated by or for correctional authorities,</li> <li><input type="checkbox"/> Detention centers, and</li> <li><input type="checkbox"/> Boot camps for juvenile delinquents.</li> </ul>
<b>Juvenile long-term care, unknown</b>	<b>203</b>	This type code has been collapsed into 2006 type code 201, Group Homes for Juveniles.
<b>Emotionally Disturbed Children</b>	<b>204</b>	This code has been collapsed into the 2006 type code 202, Residential Treatment Centers for Juveniles
<b>Delinquent Children, Public</b>	<b>205</b>	This type code has been collapsed into the 2006 type code 203, Correctional Facilities Intended for Juveniles.
<b>Delinquent Children, Private</b>	<b>206</b>	This type code has been collapsed into the 2006 type code 203, Correctional Facilities Intended for Juveniles.
<b>Delinquent Children, Unknown</b>	<b>207</b>	This type code has been collapsed into the 2006 type code 203, Correctional Facilities Intended for Juveniles.
<b>Juvenile Short-Term Care, Delinquent</b>	<b>208</b>	This type code has been collapsed into the 2006 type code 203, Correctional Facilities Intended for Juveniles.
<b>Type of Juvenile Care Unknown</b>	<b>209*</b>	This type code will no longer be assigned to a GQ.
<b>Nursing Facilities/Skilled Nursing Facilities</b>	<b>301</b>	Includes facilities licensed to provide medical care with seven day, twenty-four hour coverage for people requiring long-term non-acute care. People in these facilities require nursing care, regardless of age. Either of these types of facilities may be referred to as nursing homes.
<b>Nursing home, federal ownership</b>	<b>301</b>	This type code name has changed to Nursing Facilities/Skilled Nursing Facilities.
<b>Nursing home, state/county/city ownership</b>	<b>302</b>	This type code has been collapsed into the 2006 type code 301, Nursing Facilities/Skilled Nursing Facility.
<b>Nursing home, unknown ownership</b>	<b>303</b>	This type code has been collapsed into the 2006 type code 301, Nursing Facilities/Skilled Nursing Facility.
<b>Nursing home, private not for profit</b>	<b>304</b>	This type code has been collapsed into the 2006 type code 301, Nursing Facilities/Skilled Nursing Facility.
<b>Nursing home, private for profit</b>	<b>305</b>	This type code has been collapsed into the 2006 type code 301, Nursing Facilities/Skilled Nursing Facility.
<b>Nursing home, unknown or not for</b>	<b>306</b>	This type code has been collapsed into the 2006 type code 301, Nursing Facilities/Skilled Nursing Facility.

<b>Nursing home, unknown</b>	<b>307</b>	This type code has been collapsed into the 2006 type code 301, Nursing Facilities/Skilled Nursing Facility.
<b>Drug/alcohol abuse ward in hospital</b>	<b>400</b>	This type code has been collapsed into the 2006 type code 402, Hospitals with patients who have no usual home elsewhere.
<b>Mental (Psychiatric) Hospitals and Psychiatric Units in Other Hospitals</b>	<b>401</b>	Mental Hospitals and Psychiatric Units include psychiatric hospitals, and units or floors for long-term, non-acute care patients. The primary function of the hospital, unit, or floor is to provide diagnostic and treatment services for long-term, non-acute patients who have a psychiatric-related illness. Patients in these GQs are included in the ACS GQ sample.
<b>Chronically ill, military hospital</b>	<b>401</b>	This type code has been collapsed into the 2006 type code 402, Hospitals with patients who have no usual home elsewhere.
<b>Hospitals with Patients who have No Usual Home Elsewhere</b>	<b>402</b>	Hospitals with Patients who have No Usual Home Elsewhere include hospitals that have any patients who have no exit or disposition plan, or who are known as "boarder patients" or "boarder babies".  All hospitals are eligible for inclusion in this category <i>except</i> psychiatric hospitals, units, wings or floors operated by federal, state, or local correctional authorities. Patients in hospitals operated by these correctional authorities will be sampled in the prison or jail population.  Psychiatric units and hospice units in hospitals are also not included in this GQ type. Only patients with no usual home elsewhere are included in this group quarter's code.
<b>Chronically ill, other hospital</b>	<b>402</b>	This type code has been collapsed into the 2006 type code 402, Hospitals with patients who have no usual home elsewhere.
<b>In-Patient Hospice Facilities</b>	<b>403</b>	In-patient Hospice facilities include (both free-standing and units in hospitals) that provide palliative, comfort, and supportive care for the terminally ill patient and their families. All patients in these GQs are included in the ACS GQ sample.
<b>Chronically ill, hospice</b>	<b>403</b>	Name change from 2000 to 2006 to In-Patient Hospice Facilities. Still type code 403.
<b>Mentally ill (psychiatric) hospital</b>	<b>404</b>	This type code has been collapsed into the 2006 type code 401, Mental (psychiatric) hospital/psychiatric unit in hospital.
<b>Residential Schools for People with Disabilities</b>	<b>405</b>	Residential Schools for People with Disabilities are schools that provide on-site educational programs and care for students with disabilities in a live-in environment. The focus of a residential school for people with disabilities is on the educational programs.  These residential schools include programs for: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li><input type="checkbox"/> the blind,</li> <li><input type="checkbox"/> the deaf, and</li> <li><input type="checkbox"/> the developmentally disabled.</li> </ul>
<b>Mentally Retarded</b>	<b>405</b>	Name change from 2000 to 2006 to Residential schools for people with disabilities. Still type code 405.
<b>Physically handicapped, deaf</b>	<b>406</b>	This type code has been collapsed into the 2006 type code 405, Residential Schools for People with Disabilities.
<b>Physically handicapped, blind</b>	<b>407</b>	This type code has been collapsed into the 2006 type code 405, Residential Schools for People with Disabilities.

<b>Physically handicapped, orthopedic</b>	<b>408</b>	This type code has been collapsed into the 2006 type code 405, Residential Schools for People with Disabilities.
<b>General hospital for no UHE patients</b>	<b>409</b>	This type code has been collapsed into the 2006 type code 402, Hospital for patients who have no usual home elsewhere.
<b>Military hospital for no UHE patients</b>	<b>410</b>	This type code has been collapsed into the 2006 type code 402, Hospital for patients who have no usual home elsewhere.
<b>College/University Housing</b>	<b>501</b>	College, University, and Seminary housing includes residence halls and dormitories owned, leased, or managed by a college, university or seminary. Fraternity and sorority housing identified by the college or university are included as college housing.  Students attending the U.S. Naval Academy, the U.S. Military Academy (West Point), the U.S. Coast Guard Academy, and the U.S. Air Force Academy are <u>not</u> included in this category; they are included in the military group quarter's code, 601.
<b>College dormitory/frat/sorority</b>	<b>501</b>	This type code name has been changed to College, University, and Seminary housing.
<b>Military Living Quarters Barracks and Dormitories at Military academies</b>	<b>601</b>	Military Living Quarters are facilities on a base, such as a barracks, or similar quarters for unaccompanied personnel, (both enlisted and officer). There are only four academies in the U.S. that will receive the GQ type code of 601 for their dormitories and residence halls, they are:  Students attending the U.S. Naval Academy, the U.S. Military Academy (West Point), the U.S. Coast Guard Academy, and the U.S. Air Force Academy are <u>not</u> included in this category; they are included in the military group quarter's code.  No other dormitories or residence halls at any other military academy will be given this GQ type code.
<b>Military Barracks</b>	<b>601</b>	This type code name has been changed to Military Living Quarters Barracks and Dormitories at Military Academies.
<b>Military Living Quarters Transient</b>	<b>602</b>	Transient Quarters for temporary residents (military or civilian), these quarters are used to house military and civilian personnel who may be waiting for on base housing or are in the middle of transfer to another base. Transient quarters could be hotels on military bases or other buildings designated as transient quarters.
<b>Military Ships</b>	<b>603</b>	Populations living on military ships docked in their Homeport is defined as, the ship being stationed when in port, and this is where the Sailors spend (live) most of their time when they are not deployed to sea. "home port" ships are classified as type code 603.
<b>Military hotels, campgrounds</b>	<b>605</b>	This type code is OUT OF SCOPE for ACS data collection.
<b>Emergency and Transitional Shelters (with sleeping facilities) for People Experiencing Homelessness</b>	<b>701</b>	Facilities where people experiencing homelessness stay overnight. These include: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li><input type="checkbox"/> shelters that operate on a first-come, first-served basis where people must leave in the morning and have no guaranteed bed for the next night,</li> <li><input type="checkbox"/> shelters where people know they have a bed for a specified period of time (even if they leave the building every day),</li> <li><input type="checkbox"/> shelters that provide temporary shelter during extremely cold</li> </ul>

		<p>weather (such as churches).</p> <p>Examples of code 701 are:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li><input type="checkbox"/> emergency and transitional shelters,</li> <li><input type="checkbox"/> missions, hotels and motels used to shelter people experiencing homelessness,</li> <li><input type="checkbox"/> shelters for children who are runaway, neglected, or experiencing homelessness,</li> <li><input type="checkbox"/> transitional shelters where clients can stay for up to two years and obtain help to promote self-sufficiency.</li> </ul> <p>Hotels, motels, and similar places used entirely or partially for purposes listed in the examples, above, usually under contract with a local organization or government.</p> <p>This category does <u>not</u> include shelters that operate only in the event of a natural disaster.</p>
<b>Hotel/motel for no UHE persons</b>	<b>701</b>	This type code has been collapsed into the 2006 type code 701, Emergency and Transitional Shelters (with sleeping facilities) for People Experiencing Homelessness.
<b>Shelter for runaway/neglected/homeless children</b>	<b>702</b>	This type code has been collapsed into the 2006 type code 701, Emergency and Transitional Shelters (with sleeping facilities) for People Experiencing Homelessness.
<b>Shelter for abused women</b>	<b>703</b>	This type code name has changed to Domestic Violence Shelter and is OUT OF SCOPE for ACS data collection.
<b>Soup Kitchen</b>	<b>704</b>	This type code is OUT OF SCOPE for ACS data collection.
<b>Regularly Scheduled Mobile Food Van</b>	<b>705</b>	This type code is OUT OF SCOPE for ACS data collection.
<b>Targeted Nonsheltered Outdoor Locations</b>	<b>706</b>	This type code is OUT OF SCOPE for ACS data collection.
<b>Group Homes Intended for Adults</b>	<b>801</b>	Group homes are community-based group living arrangements in residential settings usually consisting of three or more clients of a service provider. The group home provides room and board and supportive services, such as assistance with daily living skills, and social, psychological or behavioral programs. Clients are generally not related to the caregiver or to each other. Group homes do not include residential treatment centers or facilities operated by or for correctional authorities.
<b>Group home – drug/alcohol abuse (&gt;10 persons)</b>	<b>801</b>	This type code has been collapsed into the 2006 type code 802, Residential Treatment Center for Adults.
<b>Residential Treatment Centers for Adults</b>	<b>802</b>	Residential facilities that provide treatment on-site in a highly structured live-in environment for the treatment of drug/alcohol abuse, mental illness, and emotional/behavioral disorders. They are staffed 24-hours a day. The focus of a residential treatment center is on the treatment program. Residential treatment centers do not include facilities operated by or for correctional authorities.
<b>Group Home – Mentally ill (&gt;10 persons)</b>	<b>802</b>	This type code has been collapsed into the 2006 type code 801 Group Home for Adults.
<b>Group Home – mentally retarded (&gt;10 persons)</b>	<b>803</b>	This type code has been collapsed into the 2006 type code 801 Group Home for Adults.
<b>Group Home – Physically handicapped</b>	<b>804</b>	This type code has been collapsed into the 2006 type code 801 Group Home for Adults.

<b>Other group home (&gt;10 persons)</b>	<b>805</b>	This type code has been collapsed into the 2006 type code 801 Group Home for Adults.
<b>Group Home – drug/alcohol abuse (&lt;10 persons)</b>	<b>806</b>	This type code has been collapsed into the 2006 type code 802, Residential treatment center for adults.
<b>Group home – mentally ill (&lt;10 persons)</b>	<b>807</b>	This type code has been collapsed into the 2006 type code 801 Group Home for Adults.
<b>Group Home – mentally retarded (&lt;10 persons)</b>	<b>808</b>	This type code has been collapsed into the 2006 type code 801 Group Home for Adults.
<b>Group home – physically handicapped (&lt;10 persons)</b>	<b>809</b>	This type code has been collapsed into the 2006 type code 801 Group Home for Adults.
<b>Other group home (&lt;10 persons)</b>	<b>810</b>	This type code has been collapsed into the 2006 type code 801 Group Home for Adults.
<b>Crews of maritime vessels</b>	<b>900</b>	This type code is OUT OF SCOPE for ACS data collection.
<b>Workers' Group Living Quarters and Job Corps Centers</b>	<b>901</b>	<p>Includes facilities such as dormitories, bunkhouses, and similar types of group living arrangements for agricultural and non-agricultural workers. This category also includes facilities that provide a full-time, year-round residential program offering a vocational training and employment program that helps young people 16-to-24 years old learn a trade, earn a high school diploma or GED and get help finding a job.</p> <p>GQs included in this code are:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li><input type="checkbox"/> migratory farm workers' camps on farms</li> <li><input type="checkbox"/> energy enclaves in Alaska</li> <li><input type="checkbox"/> construction workers camps</li> <li><input type="checkbox"/> Job Corp centers and vocational training facilities</li> </ul> <p>See Chapter 8, Special Situations for classifying these types of GQ's.</p>
<b>Agriculture Workers Dormitory on Farm</b>	<b>901</b>	This type code name has changed to Workers' Group Living Quarters and Job Corps Centers.
<b>Religious Group Quarters</b>	<b>902</b>	<p>Religious Group Quarters are owned or operated by religious organizations that are intended to house their members in a group living situation. This category includes: convents, monasteries, and abbeys. It does <u>not</u> include the house occupied by a minister and his family.</p> <p>Living quarters for students living or staying in seminaries are classified as college student housing, not religious group quarters.</p>
<b>Other Workers Dormitory</b>	<b>902</b>	This type code has been collapsed into the 2006 type code 901, Workers' Group Living Quarters and Job Corps Centers.
<b>Job Corps Center or Vocational Training Facility</b>	<b>903</b>	This type code has been collapsed into the 2006 type code 901, Workers' Group Living Quarters and Job Corps Centers.
<b>Dormitory for Nurses/Interns in Military Hospital/Staff Residents of GQ</b>	<b>904</b>	This type code has been collapsed into the 2006 type code 901, Workers' Group Living Quarters and Job Corps Centers.
<b>Dormitory for Nurses/Interns in General Hospital/Staff</b>	<b>905</b>	This type code has been collapsed into the 2006 type code 901, Workers' Group Living Quarters and Job Corps Centers.

<b>Residents of Institutionalized GQs</b>		
<b>Religious Group Quarters</b>	<b>906</b>	This type code has been collapsed into the 2006 type code 902, Religious Group Quarters.
<b>YMCA/YWCA, Hostel</b>	<b>908</b>	These GQ's are not classified under any other GQ type code:  <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>q YMCAs,</li> <li>q YWCAs, and</li> <li>q Hostels.</li> </ul>
<b>Other Nonhousehold Living Situations</b>	<b>908</b>	This type code name has been changed to YMCA/YWCA, hostel.
<b>Natural Disaster</b>	<b>909</b>	This type code is OUT OF SCOPE for the 2006 ACS.
<b>Transient Location, RV Campground, Carnival, etc.</b>	<b>910</b>	This type code is OUT OF SCOPE for the 2006 ACS.
<b>Residential Care Facility- "protective oversight"</b>	<b>911*</b>	This type code is OUT OF SCOPE for the 2006 ACS.
<b>Dangerous Encampments</b>	<b>913</b>	This type code is OUT OF SCOPE for the 2006 ACS.
