Our Outreach Coordinator Sara Shumway has been working extremely hard to bring an exciting range of programs to our Mae J members -- every Wednesday, and other days as well! Don't believe us? Just look at what's been happening since our last newsletter:

July

7th: 15 students watched *GOAL! Soccer For A Better Future* and then answered a **Soccer World Cup guiz**, vying for the soccer ball prizes.

9th: 50 students attended a Science Café discussion on the science of music, featuring Sci-enza's Rudi Horak.

16th: 22 students entered the Mandela Day essay/poetry contest, writing on the best way to celebrate Nelson Mandela's birthday. The five winners each received a book on Mandela.

19th: **US Mission volunteers** provided homework and research assistance to 20 Mae J students on careers, cell biology, alcohol abuse, fossil fuels, and water purification.

28th: U.S. Embassy Environment, Science, and Technology Officer John Griffith spoke to 50 students on **energy and fossil** fuels, and showed excerpts from *A Crude Awakening*.

30th: Fulbright alumnus Dr. Edwin Moshia from the University of Pretoria's Department of Plant Production and Soil Science presented a practical session on **fertilization and soil** to 25 students.

August

4th: 40 students were treated to a hands-on physics session with Professor Chris Theron from the University of Pretoria's Physics Department.

6th: U.S. Embassy staffer Martin Matlebyane led a discussion on biodiversity with 25 students.

11th: We celebrated Women's Day with a talk by the Girls' Club on important women in SA history, and a discussion on women's health by the U.S. Embassy's health officials Dr. Grace Ramafi and Ms. Yumnah Hattas. 45 students took part.

13th: U.S. Navy Rear Admiral Wendi B. Carpenter spoke to 50 young people on her career as the first female pilot to make Admiral rank in the U.S. Navy.

18th: Ginny Stone, from the SA Association of Science and Technology Centres, showed 40 students how to use paper folds to solve mathematical equations. Yes, **geometry can be fun!**

25th: Sci-enza interns gave a presentation on volcano eruptions and other natural disasters to 45 students.

September

1st: Mr. Albert Tsipa, a Science Specialist at Osizweni Education and Development Centre in Secunda, Mpumalanga, gave a hands-on physics demonstration to 20 students. Mr. Tsipa was born and raised in Mamelodi.

8th: 50 students attended a presentation on **teen depression**, **academic anxiety**, **and suicide prevention** by guests from the South African Depression and Anxiety Group.

10th: Mr. Fred Swaniker and Ms. Lesego Sekano, recently returned from the **Presidential Forum** for Young African Leaders (PFYAL) in Washington, where they met Mr. Obama, gave a motivational talk to 50 students.
