

Dear Murray Parents and Guardians,

With the second quarter coming to an end, Murray Primary School students are roaring for success! Many of our students are positioned to show growth in all academic areas. Teachers administered mid-year assessments with the hope of seeing growth in reading and math. These results will be shared in our next newsletter and during my next Principal-Parent Forum (Heart to Heart) on February 14th. The following information captures the design of our mathematics program and its components.

Mathematics: A strong math connection between home and school is a sure, solid approach that will help improve our students' achievement. Our connection comes with parents working with their child on math homework or class projects. Parental involvement is vital to our students' success. A growing body of research supports the conclusion that parents' attitudes towards mathematics can impact their child's success in mathematics. Adults frequently make comments such as "I am not good at math" or "I don't like math." A parent is a child's first role model, and thus sets the child's mindset toward mathematics. Here a few key points to keep in mind:

- > It is important for parents to realize that how they feel and talk about mathematics can influence their child's thinking and confidence in learning mathematics.
- > More importantly, parents need to realize that literacy in mathematics or being numerate (able to think and express oneself effectively in quantitative terms; being able to count) is equally as important as reading literacy.

Our math program, *Everyday Math*, is a structured, rigorous, and proven program that helps our students learn mathematical reasoning and develop strong math skills. *Everyday Mathematics* not only teaches basic skills. but also expands beyond traditional drills. The program encourages children to understand why math is **important** and how they reach their answers, so they internalize what they are learning. As a result, students find it easier to remember basic skills, to apply what they know in order to solve problems, and to think mathematically.

Murray Primary School students learn and practice all of their basic math facts, and they do it in multiple ways, including paper-and pencil exercises, hands-on use of math manipulatives, and skills-based mathematics games. *Everyday Mathematics* is a solid, rich curriculum that provides our students with the tools and skills they will need to live and work in a technologically complex world. In an increasing competitive global economy, our students will need mathematical skills that go beyond basic arithmetic, skills that include the ability to problem solve, to handle complex data, and to process information using higher-order thinking skills. We are fortunate to have such a powerful, results-oriented curriculum like *Everyday Math* in our schools. I invite you to observe this program in practice. Check with your child's teacher on the time she teaches math and continue to use the *Everyday Math* Home Connection booklet to help your child extend his or her learning beyond the classroom to home.

Pre-Kindergarten News



Pre-Kindergarten classes have spent the past month working on a **Clothing Study**. We have looked at clothes to wear in the winter versus what to wear in the summer. We've read such books at "The Mitten," "The Hat," "Caps for Sale" and "Llama Llama Red Pajama." Starting in February, the classes will begin the Buildings Study, where we will learn about building materials, constructing with blocks while working on adding detail and height, using tools, etc. Books we will read include "Buildings, Buildings." The Pot that Juan Built," "The True Story of the Three Little Pigs," and "Buildings, Buildings, Buildings." Teachers ask that you keep working on letter and number recognition with your children, counting objects using one-to-one correspondence, and problem solving. Puzzles are a great way to work on problem solving with Pre-Kindergarten children!



February is full of fun and community service in Kindergarten!

We will begin by celebrating the <u>100th Day of School</u> on February the 7th. We are also participating in a **community service project with the Fayetteville Animal Protection Society**. Our goal is to collect 100 cans of dog and cat food to help this non-profit shelter feed animals in their care. If each class can get 14 - 15 cans we will meet the goal of 100. On February 11th all Kindergarten classes will be participating in a parade to celebrate the Chinese <u>New Year</u>. This year, 2013, is the year of the snake. <u>Valentine's Day</u> is right around the corner. We are asking **all** Kindergarten students to create a box to be used for exchanging valentines. Please check with your teacher for the due date. Our kindergartners will also have the opportunity to visit each Kindergarten class and learn about <u>Black History</u>.





It's wonderful to know that you read to your children, or read along with them. But did you know that talking with your children before, during, and after you read together is also an important part of their learning?

As you and your children discuss what you read, know that:

- You help your child further develop their oral communication skills while naturally bridging oral language to written language.
- You encourage them to make connections between the text and something in their own lives. Making connections like these is an essential part of learning -- it helps children see written text come to life.
- You provide an environment which makes reading a natural part of your pleasant social interaction. Don't underestimate the power of your positive relationship to encourage and enhance your children's learning. Research suggests that we learn best when we like the person who is teaching us.
- You greatly facilitate their comprehension of the book in a natural, enjoyable way.

What do we mean by **"talking about the written text?"** We find that asking open-ended questions usually generates lively discussion. Give it a try, and see!

Remember that we are referring to talking *with* your children --not just talking *at* them. We want children to be active, not passive participants in their learning.

STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Art, Math)

"How tall are you?" "How tall am I?"

Children are often very curious about how tall they are compared to others. Here is a chance for them to help measure the entire family! They can graph the results too!

Have each member stand against a wall or door jamb. Make a light pencil mark at the top of their head on the wall. With a measuring tape, measure from the pencil mark to the floor. You could measure in both centimeters and inches.

When each family member has been measured, create a bar graph. Use names across the bottom (X axis) and heights, in feet or inches, along the left side (Y axis). Each family member's height can be colored in with a different color.

School Nurse News

February is Dental Health Month: How to Care for Your Child's Teeth

A child's primary teeth, sometimes called "baby teeth," are as important as the permanent adult teeth.

- Primary teeth typically begin to appear when a baby is between age six months and one year.
- Primary teeth help children chew and speak.
- Primary teeth hold space in the jaws for permanent teeth that are developing under the gums.

The ADA recommends that a dentist examine a child within six months of the eruption of the first tooth and no later than the first birthday.

- A dental visit at an early age is a "well baby checkup" for the teeth.
- Besides checking for tooth decay and other problems, the dentist can demonstrate how to clean the child's teeth properly and how to evaluate any adverse habits such as thumb sucking.
- Twice daily tooth brushing and daily flossing are recommended, with parental assistance until about age six.
- Regular Dental Cleanings and check-ups as recommended by your Dentist.

This is a new year and I would like to start by thanking you for all the help, support and communication throughout the year. Our students have studied a variety of cultural traditions in our class. We have contrasted the Three Kings' Day (Wise-Men Day) in our Spanish countries with Christmas Day in the United States. The fantasy and dreams are the same in both cultures, but we celebrate them on different dates, December 25 and January 6.
