INTEL TEACH INDONESIA

DEVELOPMENT CHALLENGE

In 2001, the Indonesian education system was decentralized to the local district level. Although the government has sought to support this transition through new education policies and regulations, local governments often lack funding for the programs that prepare students for the realities of the global economy. Without adequate resources, the education system has struggled to deliver education services that students and families consider a worthwhile return on the investment of their children's time.

BUSINESS CHALLENGE

To help Indonesia become competitive in the global marketplace, the next generation of workers need to learn how to use information technology. In Indonesia, Intel helps to provide students with the training and education necessary to lead the digital literacy movement and prepare an upcoming workforce on information technology.

APPROACH

The Intel® Teach Global Development Alliance (GDA) in Indonesia is working to incorporate technology into primary-level education to make curricula more accessible, engaging and relevant for students. Through this alliance, partners provide training that builds the capacity of teachers to use information and communication technologies as a pedagogical tool to enhance teaching and learning at the classroom-level. Using a localized version of the Intel® Teach Program – Getting Started course translated into Bahasa Indonesian, primary and secondary school teachers in six provinces learn to incorporate technology into lesson plans, create assessment tools that help teachers meet educational goals, and to train fellow teachers on the Intel® Teach Program.

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RESULTS

- Since launching the initiative, over 1,300 master teachers from 461 schools in five provinces have been trained.
- Master teachers trained during the first year of the alliance trained more than 2,500 Participant Teachers (PTs) at their respective schools before March 2008.
- By 2010, the alliance will have trained at least 15,000 teachers in Indonesia.
- Plans to expand the program to 505 schools in five provinces in the next phase will target 7,500 teachers.
