## From the Principal– Dr. McBroom

Pope Parents,

The end of the first semester is quickly approaching, as the staff and students of Pope Elementary School continue to strive for excellence. I am so proud of the Pope community for their partnership as an integral part of the academic growth and success of our students. I ask that you continue to volunteer in our school as often as possible. We provide a multiplicity of support opportunities designed to meet the needs of our students and staff.

The second nine week period ends Thursday, January 24<sup>th</sup>. Report cards will go home on February 5<sup>th</sup> and an award ceremony is scheduled for Thursday, February 7<sup>th</sup>. There is not a scheduled Parent -Teacher Conference Day on the calendar for the second nine week grading period, but do not hesitate to contact your child's teacher if you have concerns.

Attendance is very important for the success of your child's education. According to the *New DoDEA Attendance Policy*, students will be counted absent if they miss ¼ or ½ of a school day. If students check in after 9:30 a.m., they will be counted absent for that portion of the day. If students check out before 2:00 p.m., they will be counted absent for that portion of the day. Starting the third nine week period, any students absent for any portion of the day will not receive a perfect attendance award during the Nine Week Period.

## Nurse's Notes

A sniffle. A cough. A sore throat. Children come down with illnesses big and small. Some are contagious, some are not. How do you know when to keep your child home from school?



Fever is the body's way of destroying the germs making it sick, and it's a common symptom of infections such as flu. Keep your children home if their temperature is 100° F or higher. Wait until children are fever-free for 24 hours, without medication, before letting them return to school.

Diarrhea is often the result of infection, food poisoning, or a side effect to medications like antibiotics. Keep children home until stools are formed and your doctor gives the okay. Make sure your sick child stays well-hydrated.

Vomiting is another way for the body to rid itself of the germs making it sick, and is usually caused by a stomach virus or stomach infection. Keep children home if they've vomited in the last 24 hours. They can return to school after symptoms clear up or your doctor says they're no longer contagious.

Severe cough and cold symptoms should keep kids home from school. A serious cough could be a sign of contagious conditions like whooping cough, viral bronchitis, or croup. It can also be a sign of asthma or allergies.

Sore throats can be a symptom of strep or a common cold. If your child has been diagnosed with strep throat, keep your child at home for at least 24 hours after starting antibiotics. If your child has a mild cold, it's okay to go to school.

Headaches can be a symptom of contagious conditions like viral gastroenteritis, flu, meningitis, and strep throat. Opinions differ on whether a child should be kept home. If your child doesn't have any other signs of illness, and feels okay, your child can go to school.

Mild cold or respiratory symptoms are no reason to keep children at home so long as their nasal drainage is clear and their cough is mild.

## Music Notes– Mrs. Evans



Earlier in the school year, I taught your children about “Peter and the Wolf” a musical story written by Sergei Prokofiev. I used several versions of the musical story; an Academy Award winning claymation released worldwide a few years ago, Disney, a Jim Gamble puppet show and a live action film. We used a compare and contrast graph to discuss the differences and similarities. The students also listed their favorite versions.

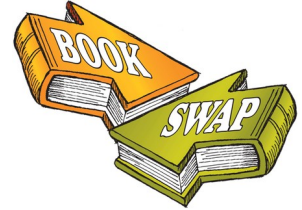
We are now learning how to read rhythms using quarter & eighth notes. Pope students are becoming musically smart!

We are trying to ensure that there are enough books on each grade level.)*
4. Only students who bring in books will be allowed to participate in the book swap.
5. Either Dr. McBroom or Mrs. Ray has the final say on which books will be accepted.

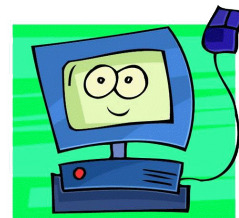


## ESL Notes– Mrs. Robinson

What an honor!! Pope's 4<sup>th</sup> grade students have been selected to represent schools across our state and the nation by participating in the National Assessment of Educational Progress (NAEP). NAEP is given by the National Center for Education Statistics within the U.S. Department of Education and tells us what our nation's students know and can do in key subject areas. It is the largest continuing and nationally representative assessment. Individual student scores are not reported; instead the results are published in a report called The Nation's Report Card, which provides information about student achievement to educators, parents, policymakers, and the public. ## Safety Report— Mr. Surmann

Safety of your children while at Pope ES is a top priority. To provide this safety we conduct a 100% ID check of each individual who enters the school. Everyone is required to sign in and exchange their ID for a School Visitors Badge which is to be worn at all times while in the school.

We conduct various drills throughout the year to ensure the students well being in the event of a fire or tornado. Additionally as the year progresses we conduct drills for Shelter-in-Place and Lockdown. All of these drills are conducted to give students and staff actual experience of evacuating the building quickly, moving to a designated safe area in the school or securing themselves in their classroom.

Another way we look out for your children is the requirement for them to travel in pairs whenever they leave the presence of their teacher, such as going to the restroom, to see the school nurse or drop off items to the Main Office.

In the event they become separated from their class or do not know where the class has relocated to they are told to report to the Main Office where they will be reunited with the rest of their classmates and teacher.

Please talk to your children about what type of safety they experience in school. They may not even be aware that they are practicing safety every day.
