Overview:

In 2010, the National Marine Fisheries Service (NMFS) announced a new competitive funding opportunity for federally recognized tribes to support the conservation and recovery of marine and anadromous species.

Grants awarded through this program can be used to support conservation efforts focused on Endangered Species Act listed species under NMFS or joint NMFS/USFWS jurisdiction (except Pacific salmon and steelhead, which are funded under the Pacific Coastal Salmon Recovery Fund), candidate or proposed species, as well as post-delisting monitoring of recovered species. The principal objective of the Species Recovery Grants to Tribes Program is to support recovery efforts that directly benefit eligible species. Recovery efforts supported by the program may involve management, research, monitoring, or outreach activities or any combination thereof.

Approximately \$1 to \$2 million may be available through this program to support new projects each year and selected projects can be supported for up to three years.

The Federal Funding Opportunity soliciting proposals is available on the NMFS website and Grants.gov. Applications are due in the fall of 2012 and awarded projects can begin in the summer of 2013.
