INITIAL DECISION BARS WILLIAM C. MILLER

LIBRARY

Administrative Law Judge Edward B. Wagner has filed an initial decision barring William C. Miller from association with any broker or dealer, except that after an eighteen month period Miller may apply to the Commission for reinstatement in a nonproprietary and supervised capacity. The decision is subject to Commission review or petition of a party or on the Commission's own initiative.

The decision is based upon findings that Miller in 1972 aided and abetted violations of the net capital rule and of the early warning rule by Project Securities & Co., Inc. of Union, New Jersey.

TRADING SUSPENSIONS

TRADING SUSPENDED IN SECURITIES OF TWO COMPANIES

Over-the-counter trading has been suspended in the securities of Kootenay Gold Mines, Ltd., located in Las Vegas, Nevada and Chemex Corp., located in Denver Colorado for & ten-day period beginning March 11 and terminating at midnight (EDT) on March 20, 1975.

The suspension of Kootenay was initiated because of the unavailability of current reliable financial and other material information concerning the company and because of questions raised concerning recent trading activities.

The suspension of Chemex was initiated to allow for dissemination of information contained in a press release issued by Chemex Corp. on March 10, 1975 which refuted rumors that Chemex Corp. had discovered a cure for cancer. (Rel. 34-11289 and 34-11290)

ADDITIONAL ACTION ON THREE TRADING SUSPENSIONS

The SEC has announced the suspension of exchange and over-the-counter trading in the securities of American Agronomics Corp., and over-the-counter trading in the securities of Winner Industries, Inc. and Royal Properties, Inc. for the further ten-day period March 14 - 23, inclusive.

COURT ENFORCEMENT ACTIONS

COMPLAINT NAMES GULF OIL CORPORATION, CLAUDE C. WILD, JR.

> The Commission announced the filing of a complaint in the U.S. District Court for the District of Columbia against Gulf Oil Corporation (Gulf) and Claude C. Wild, Jr.

The Commission's complaint alleges that defendants Gulf and Wild and others violated the reporting and proxy provisions of the securities laws by filing annual reports and proxy statements with the Commission soliciting proxies from Gulf shareholders without disclosing that Gulf, Wild and others had diverted corporate funds by means of false entries on the books or records or that there had been maintained a secret fund from which illegal political contributions had been made.

Defendant Gulf consented to the entry of an order of permanent injunction which restrains it from further reporting or proxy violations, from using corporate funds for illegal political contributions or other similar unlawful purposes, from making materially false or fictitious entries on its books and records and from maintaining any secret funds of corporate monies. (SEC v. Gulf Oil Corporation, et al., U.S.D.C. D.C). (LR-6780)

DOUGLAS V. HALTER SENTENCED

On March 7 Donald S. Voorhees, U.S. District Judge for the Western District of Washington, sentenced Douglas V. Halter, formerly of Auburn, Washington, to five years confinement on each of two counts of selling unregistered securities in violation of the registration provisions of the securities laws, the terms to run concurrently. Sentence was imposed on Halter's plea of guilty to each count. A 16-count indictment returned against Halter at Seattle on June 20, 1974 charged him and one William C. Joines with a scheme to offer and sell to investors in Washington and California loan agreements convertible into fractional interests in famds to be generated from the manufacture and sale of a supposedly novel type of motor vehicle storage battery, employing misrepresentations as the use of the proceeds of investment and other matters. Joines, also under indictment, is a fugitive. (U.S. v. Douglas V. Halter, et al., W.D. Wash., No. Cr-74-185). (LR-6774)

CARIB INVESTMENTS, INC., OTHERS ENJOINED

The Washington Regional Office announced that on March 6 the federal court in Washington, D.C. entered orders permanently enjoining Carib Investments, Inc. and Caribbean Development Co. of America, both of Rockville, Maryland; Donald J. Ryan of Barbados, West Indies; Peter R. Peluso of Arlington, Virginia; and David R. Lawson of Bethesda, Maryland from violations of the securities registration and antifraud provisions of the securities laws in the offer and sale of limited and general partnership interests. The defendants consented to the entry of the orders without admitting or denying the allegations of the Commission's complaint. (SEC v. Carib Investments, Inc., et al., U.S.D.C., D.C., Civ. Action No. 74-0198). (LR-6775)

COURT CITES RONALD G. E. SMITH

The New York Regional Office announced that on February 14 the Honorable Herbert J. Stern, U.S. District Judge, District of New Jersey approved and "so ordered" a stipulation and order which provided that defendant Ronald G. E. Smith, of New York, N.Y. without admitting or denying the allegations in the Commission's complaint, will refrain from acting or serving in the following capacities unless he secures prior written permission of the Commission: (a) as an officer, director, member of any advisory board, investment adviser, employee or depositor of any registered investment company and (b) as principal underwriter of any registered investment company which is an open-end company, unit investment trust, or face amount certificate company. For further details see Litigation Release Nos. 6610 and 6623. (SEC v. Dynavest Fund, Inc., Joseph J. Rega, Jr., Michael W. Rega, Ronald G. E. Smith, D. N.J., 74C-1807). (LR-6776)

UNIVERSAL UNDERWRITING SERVICE, INC., OTHERS ENJOINED

The Denver Regional Office announced that on February 20 the U.S. District Court in Salt Lake City, Utah issued an order of permanent injunction against a Salt Lake City broker-dealer firm, Universal Underwriting Service, Inc., and its officers, Grant E. Mann and Gordon O. Bigler, restraining violations of rules relating to broker-dealers' minimum net capital requirements of the securities laws. The defendants consented to the entry of the order without admitting or denying the allegations contained in the Commission's complaint. (SEC v. Universal Underwriting Service, Inc., et al., U.S.D.C., Utah, C-74-368). (LR-6777)

HOWARD R. TACKITT ENJOINED

The Denver Regional Office announced that on February 24 Judge Robert Van Pelt, U.S. District Court for the District of Nebraska, entered an order enjoining Howard R. Tackitt from violating the registration and certain of the antifraud provisions of the securities laws. The defendant consented to the entry of the order without admitting or denying the allegations contained in the Commission's complaint. (SEC v. Technical Poultry Processing Equipment, Inc., et al., D. Nebr., Civil Action No. 74-L-184). (LR-6778)

TEMPORARY RESTRAINING ORDER NAMES TWENTIETH CENTURY MOTOR CAR CORP., OTHERS

The Los Angeles Regional Office announced the signing on March 6 of a temporary restraining order by Federal Court Judge E. Avery Crary in Los Angeles, California, against Twentieth Century Motor Car Corporation (Nevada), Twentieth Century Motor Car Corporation (Texas), G. Elizabeth Carmichael, Leonard Katz, Samual Schlisman, Edward J. Comstock, Andrew Ray Farrell, Burton White, and Jay Gardner restraining those parties from violating the registration and antifraud provisions of the securities laws. This order was entered upon an application by the Commission following the filing the prior day of a complaint against these parties alleging that they violated those provisions

of law and seeking an injunction against them from further violations of those laws, a receivership and an accounting for funds received. Included in the restraining order is a protective order against destruction of records of the corporations involved; an order against dissipation of the assets or monies of those corporations; and an order against dissipation by G. Elizabeth Carmichael or Samuel Schlisman of their bank accounts or funds. The securities alleged to have been offered and sold by the defendants include the common stock of 20th Century Car; promissory notes of 20th Century Car convertible into stock of that corporation; promissory notes of Carmichael secured by stock of 20th Century Car in the name of Carmichael into which these notes are convertible; evidences of indebtedness, investment contracts and interests and instruments commonly known as a security in the form of so-called "dealerships" and "options" for delivery of automobiles. In regard to the fraud charges the complaint alleges that the defendants have been engaged in a fraudulent course of conduct involving the acquisition of the development rights to a three-wheeled motorcycle, falsification of the characteristics, development of, and ability to produce this vehicle, and "development" activity aimed more at promotional purposes than at actual development of an operating vehicle as described to the public, all for the purpose of raising funds for the personal benefit of the defendants through the sale of securities of the corporation formed as the unbrella under which this activity concurred. AMERICAN DIVERSIFIED INVESTORS FUND

A notice has been issued giving interested persons until April 4 to request a hearing on an application by American Diversified Investors Fund, Inc., for an order declaring that it has ceased to be an investment company. (Rel. IC-8713 - Mar. 11)

HOLDING COMPANY ACT RELEASES

CONSOLIDATED NATURAL GAS COMPANY

The SEC has extended through December 31, 1975, the effectiveness of its order of January 31, 1975 (Rel. 35-18792) insofar as that order approved the sale to Consolidated by CNG Producing of \$50 million of long-term notes. (Rel. 35-18854 - Mar. 10)

GEORGIA POWER COMPANY

A supplemental order has been issued authorizing Georgia Power Company subsidiary of The Southern Company, to increase its bank borrowings through March 31, 1975, from \$250 million to \$300 million. (Rel. 35-18855 - Mar. 10)
