Lajes varsity basketball team places third in DoDDS Europe tournament

Lajes Department of Defense Dependents School's varsity basketball team brought home the third place trophy Feb. 27, 2010.

The Lajes team defeated a team from England, Menwith Hill High School, 36-33 in overtime.

This happens to be the first time the Falcons are bringing back a trophy to Lajes from a DODDS-Europe Division III basketball competition.

"Our Lajes boys' basketball team has never placed in a European tournament," said Coach Carter. "Our boys' basketball team took fourth place my first year coaching in 2005, but the team has not won a single game at the tournament since then. Lajes is by far the smallest school in our division. This is a true underdog story, and it was a great experience to not only win some games, but to bring home a third-place trophy and put Lajes back on the map."

The first and second-place winners were the only two schools that defeated Lajes during the entire tournament.

"Our most difficult game was against Rota High School," the coach said. "They have a 6-foot-6-inches guard that is just amazing. He hit five threes in a row and played equally well on defense. Rota also ran a half

any other Lajes boys' basketball team," added the coach. "While the losses against Rota and Sigonella were tough, they held their heads high knowing they gave everything they could in the games."

The Lajes team came into the tournament seeded eighth out of eight teams, but according to the coach, this did not deter them from giving their best.

Team Captain Eric Merkison, son of Master Sgt. Eric Merkison of the Lajes Defense Media Activity Center, is also the team point guard. He said being a captain of the Falcons is a big responsibility. "You have to find the right tempo for (yourself and the team) so that everyone is on the same level," he said.

Since Lajes does not play other DoDDS schools during the regular season, it was a challenge to predict how the team would match up at the tournament. But Coach Carter said expectations were high because the team was well prepared.

Some of the parents noted their perseverance throughout the season.

SecAF, CSAF provide FY12 budget details

Secretary of the Air Force Michael Donley and Air Force Chief of Staff Gen. Norton Schwartz provided details on the service's fiscal 2012 national defense authorization budget request during a House Armed Services Committee hearing here Feb. 17.

Air Force officials are requesting \$150 billion in the baseline budget and \$16 billion in an overseas contingency operations supplemental appropriation, Secretary Donley said.

"Our budget request represents a careful balance of resources among the Air Force core functions necessary to implement the president's National Security Strategy and between today's operations and investment for the future," the secretary said.

General Schwartz said that the Air Force's FY12 budget request is sensitive to the current state of the economy.

"This budget request, fully appreciating the extraordinary fiscal condition that our nation faces, supports our Airmen and our continuing efforts to structure the force for maximum versatility across the full spectrum of operations for today's requirements and for tomorrow's challenges," the general said.

General Schwartz also said that despite development issues, the joint strike fighter remained a priority for the service, as does the procurement of a new tanker for the Air Force.

Another upcoming procurement for the Air Force that was discussed

was the new long-range bomber, set to be part of a family of systems. Secretary Donley said the Air Force expects to field the new aircraft in the mid-2020s.

In addition to discussing the next fiscal year's budget request, both leaders also emphasized the importance of passing the current fiscal year's budget, telling members of Congress that operating under an extended continuing resolution will stress the force.

"A decision to extend the continuing resolution at FY10 levels through the remainder of this year will delay our ability to reach the secretary of Defense's direct goal of 65 MQ-1 Predator or MQ-9 Reaper Combat Air Patrols by 2013 in support of operations in Afghanistan," Secretary Donley said.

The secretary added that a continuing resolution would cause a production break and a likely increase in the unit cost of the wideband global communications satellite, the Joint Air-to-Surface Standoff Missile, F-15 Eagle radar modernization and other programs.

General Schwartz similarly urged the committee members to pass the fiscal 2011 appropriations bill.

"In extending far beyond March 4 without a 2011 appropriations bill, we have to reduce flying hours, delay or cancel some weapon system sustainment and depot maintenance activity and disrupt other day-to-day operations, all of which will adversely affect readiness and impact our brave men and women who are preparing to serve or are serving in harm's way," the general said.

Carnaval, or Mardi Gras as it's called in New Orleans and other U.S. locations, will be celebrated throughout mainland Portugal, Madeira and the Azores Saturday through Tuesday (March 6-8).

The historical origin of Carnaval is vague but seems to relate to pre-Christian customs, i.e. the pagan Roman and Greek festivals.

On Terceira, Carnaval has a peculiarity of its own: the "Danças de Carnaval," or carnival dances. These are dancing groups that travel from town to town for three days and four nights, almost non-stop. These groups usually

include 12-24 dancers dressed in colorful play musical instruments.

styles. The island of Graciosa, for example, organizes masquerade balls in their community centers and clubs--the intention is to bring more tourists to the island.

Traditionally, Angra High School students organize a Carnaval parade through Angra's main street, followed by a comical bullfight in Angra's bullring. This year's parade is scheduled to start Sunday at 1:30 p.m., followed by the comic bullfight in the bullring at around 3 p.m. Some local nightclubs, pubs and bars will also organize either masquerade balls or other Carnaval-related events during the Carnaval days. In observance of this tradition, the Portuguese Officers Club on base will host a masquerade ball tomorrow (March 5) at 9:30 p.m. while the Sargentos Club will host a similar event tomorrow and Monday at 9:30 p.m. Tickets for these events can be purchased at the respective clubs or at the door.

A final caution for those who live off base or intend to watch the Carnaval activities: it's a local custom for kids and other participants, usually wearing masks, to throw water balloons at cars or passers-by during these days. So, make sure your car windows are rolled up and try to avoid those pranksters if you are walking.
