

# Lajes Airman surprises family after seven-month deployment

August 4, began like every other day for Melissa Drago, spouse of a 65th Security Forces Squadron

deployed defender. After a long hike which took almost all day, in the evening she planned to go to the airport to welcome the "Tibbals" family, a staff sergeant, named Alfred, his wife and two children.

As the 65th SFS Key Spouse, welcoming a new family to Lajes is a crucial tradition for Melissa, so she had to make herself available, even though the arrival notice was said to be "last-minute."

She arrived at the airport holding a welcome card for the Tibbals in one hand, and

her 11-month-old daughter in the other. Suddenly, the visit took a dramatically different turn. She was surprised to see her husband, Master Sgt. Nikki Drago, who had been deployed for seven months and was expected back home in a few weeks.

"I was shocked! So happy, so surprised--I hadn't suspected a thing," Melissa said. "He was standing next to me talking to our daughter in my arms, and I had to focus and realize that I had been waiting for this moment for seven months now...to see her reaction to her daddy, and I was missing it because I was in such a shock!"

Drago and the 65th SFS first sergeant, Master Sgt. Daniel Guzman, planned the surprise reunion.

After Drago requested to surprise his wife with his return, Guzman and the unit's sponsor program coordinator cooked up a story about an inbound family coming in from Germany.

"I requested for our key spouse, Melissa, to come out and help us welcome the new family into our unit," Guzman said. "She bought into it since this is the summer PCS season, and we have lots of families coming and going from Lajes. Melissa is also

a very involved key spouse, and I figured she would make every effort to attend and be there to welcome in the new security forces family."

Melissa's neighbor, Cory, wife of the 65th Medical Group first sergeant, Master Sgt. Dominic Dumbra, was also an accomplice in the plan to ensure she was available at the airport on that day for the new members' arrival.

After the shock factor, all Melissa could say was, "You got me!"

"I felt 'punked' completely," Melissa said.

Because of her surprise, Melissa can't remember her first words to her husband, but she recalls saying, "I thought you were in a tent with poor internet?"

But her husband only smirked and said, "That's why I haven't talked to you today--I've been flying for two days."

And Melissa gave their 11-month-old daughter to her husband. "I know I said 'Carmen this is your daddy, say hi daddy, welcome home."



## US band rocks Lajes audience

When a band from the United States took center stage in Praia to perform for the local community, hundreds of Lajes members attended the show, which was held as part of the events to celebrate Praia Fest, Aug. 2.

The band, Hoobastank, is an American rock band that was formed in 1994 in Agoura Hills, Calif., and best known for their 2004 hit "The Reason."

The band's lead singer, Doug Robb, said though they had performed in various international shows, Praia Fest is a show that drives a bigger audience, and they enjoy entertaining the servicemembers.

"It's really cool to be here," said the lead singer. "There are places in the world I never really thought that music is going to take me ... Lajes is one of those places."

Praia Fest is a tradition in the Azores, which first began in 1978.

It is celebrated with a food fair, featuring restaurants from Terceira Island and other neighboring islands, such as São Miguel.

Music concerts are organized with the main one, like Hoobastank, taking place in the area behind the Yacht Club.

According to the band, when they were invited to perform at Praia Fest, they didn't realize that they would be giving back to those who

#### A brief history of Portugal's forcados

The "forcados," or the "suicide squad" as Americans here call them, are a group of brave young men who challenge the bull with their bare hands, grabbing it by the horns and neck in the arena bullfights, with the objective of immobilizing the animal.

The forcados are unique to Portugal, and unlike the matadors and horsemen (cavaleiros), they are not professionals.

They fight the bulls because they enjoy doing it, and want to continue a very old Portuguese

The forcados have been part of the Portuguese arena bullfights for many years and it's uncertain why or when this type of bullfighting originally started.

The exploits of forcados have even been used in films, including the 1951 movie "Quo

Vadis," a classic film about ancient Rome and an imperial soldier's struggle to save a Christian woman he loves from the wrath of Emperor Nero. A Portuguese renowned forcado, named Nuno Salvação Barreto, appeared as the stunt double for actor Buddy Bear, who played the role of Roman gladiator "Ursus," and fought a bull alone in the arena.

Traditionally, the forcados are asked to jump inside the arena and seize the bull after it has just been fought by the cavaleiro (horseman). The leading forcado, wearing a green or brown cap on his head, starts walking toward the bull and tries to grab it by the horns and neck with the help of the other members of the group.

When the bull is to face the horsemen and the forcados, his sharp horns are covered with a protection made of leather so the horse and the forcados are not injured, but unfortunately injuries still do happen sometimes.

The name forcados comes from the word "pitchfork" in Portuguese, which the forcados use to carry in their hands when appearing in

Terceira Island has two groups of forcados, one from Praia and the other from Angra, who usually perform during the arena bullfights that take place throughout the summer months.
