A Russian An-124 stopped at Lajes Field, Azores, April 1, 2011 before continuing on their mission across the Atlantic.

In a true demonstration of international support, the Russian An-124, the world's largest cargo aircraft currently in use, were taxied by Lajes Field Airmen and fueled by a Portuguese fuel company.

The members of the 65th Operations Support Squadron

transient alert taxied the aircraft to its parking place.

"This was my first time in my 14-year career that I taxied a Russian An-124," said Tech. Sgt. Gerald Redd, transient alert shift supervisor

"It was like parking the Statue of Liberty," added Sergeant Redd. "Working with the Portuguese can be very rewarding and I truly enjoy it. We help each other support the mission here at Laies as we work hand in hand."

The aircraft received a total of approximately 30,000

Tragic events at Frankfurt remind us to stay vigilant

Like the rest of you, Betty and I were deeply saddened by the senseless attack at Frankfurt International Airport that claimed the lives of two of our Airmen and left two others seriously wounded. Our hearts and prayers remain with all those affected by this tragic event.

I've been touched by the outpouring of sympathy and support to the victims, their families, and their units from our Air Force communities at Ramstein Air Base, Royal Air Force Lakenheath, and around the Command. Your response makes me prouder than ever to stand beside you. I was humbled by the incredible response of our German and British hosts, and immensely thankful for our strong,

enduring partnership. I'd like to specifically thank the German police who responded to the scene of the shooting and the medical professionals who literally performed miracles treating our wounded warriors – thanks to them, and some excellent initial buddy care from the victims' Wingmen, our Airmen are on the road to recovery. The United States Ambassador to Germany and his staff were also immediately involved, caring for family members of the wounded, coordinating medical care with the hospital in Frankfurt, and providing translators for family members, escorts, doctors and security officers.

This attack is a grim reminder that we must stay vigilant. Force protection is part of our core business; it's everyone's

Force Shaping and Reduction in Force Boards are back

The Air Force is looking to get rid of about 5,750

people by fiscal year 2012. With the economy still lagging, retention is at a 15-year high. The Air Force has more than 335,000 airmen right now, well above its fiscal 2010 authorized active-duty end-strength of 331,700, service officials said.

In order to meet its end strength, Air Force officials are convening the 2011 Force Shaping Board May 9, the Reduction in Force board in September and Selective Early Retirement boards in October and January 2012. All boards will be held at the Air Force Personnel Center

"We know this is a tough time for our personnel right now," said Tech. Sgt. Selina Motu, Career Development NCOIC. "We are here to answer any questions folks have and to help them through this process."

The FSB will evaluate officers serving on the active duty list in the grades of first lieutenant and captain in the following competitive categories and year groups: biomedical sciences corps, 2008; medical service corps, 2006 through 2008; and line of the Air Force-judge advocate general, 2006 through 2008.

Officers with six or more years of total federal commissioned service by the mandatory separation date or who have 15 or more years of total active service as of the board convening date are also ineligible under the FSB. Retention recommendation forms must be completed for all board-eligible officers with less than 15 years total active federal service as of May 9 and must be forwarded to AFPC no later than April 8.

Air Force officials will also conduct a RIF board for mid-grade officers. Officer overstrength challenges will require officials to conduct SERBs for lieutenant colonels who have been twice deferred for colonel and for colonels with four or more years time in grade who have not met a SERB in the last five years. Guidance for these boards will be posted on the AFPC website.

The Lajes Airman and Family Readiness Center has several transition programs to provide support to any separating or retiring Airman.

"We host a Warrior three-day Transition Assistance Program seminar, which includes resumé writing classes and a well attended class called, 'Applying for Federal Jobs,'" said Jim McDaniel, TAP Program manager at the AFRC.

Online TAP services, a new resource, will be available to separating and retiring service

Lajes kicks-off multi-awareness month

Lajes kicked off the month of April with a 'Talk the Walk, Walk the Talk,' multi-awareness walk on April 1, 2011. The purpose of this event was to empower the 65th Air Base Wing community on subjects like autism, child abuse prevention, Sports Eye Safety, sexual assault, alcohol, public health, world health and Month of the Military Child.

The walk began at Lajes Elementary/High School with the high school chorus performing the national anthem, followed by a ribboncutting ceremony with Col. Jose Rivera, 65th Air Base Wing commander. The walk routed 226 participants along the streets of Nascer do Sol, where representatives at each table handed out information regarding the awareness month topics. Participants were given awareness questions, and those who answered them all correctly were entered for a prize drawing. Prizes were donated by the 65th Medical Operations Squadron Mental Health Clinic, 65th Force Support Squadron, Educational & Developmental Intervention Services, and the Army and Air Force Exchange Service to encourage the community to walk and become empowered.

This event originated out of the EDIS program back in January, 2011. The hope was to reach

out to the 65th Air Base Wing community and share the staggering statistical change in the prevalence of autism spectrum disorder. Based on the most recent report by the Autism and Developmental Disabilities Monitoring Network, an average of 1 in 110 children was identified with autism spectrum disorders, which translates to about 1 percent of children. This is very different from 4 or 5 out of 10,000 children prior to the year 2000. With April being Autism Awareness month, a time frame was established and the wheels were set in motion for the walk to happen.

When the idea for the autism walk was presented to the Inter-Delivery System members, it was determined this event could showcase the multiple awareness topics represented in April. A sub-committee was quickly formed to push this event forward. This initiative involved multiple agencies from the 65th Air Base Wing community, such as the Sexual Assault Response Coordinator, Alcohol and Drug Abuse Prevention and Treatment, Family Advocacy Program, EDIS, Public Health, Health and Wellness Center, Airman and Family Readiness Center and the 65th Medical Operations Squadron Optometry Clinic. I would be remiss not to point out that 5 of the 8 agencies participating were from the

"We work together every day to help aircraft with approach and take-off as well as tracking aircraft," said Ten. (1st Lt.) Nuno Silva, Portuguese air force radar and tower controller supervisor.

Talk with your family and friends about potential risks and threats and have an emergency response plan both at home and while traveling.

As we mourn our fallen colleagues and support the survivors, we must remain proud of who we are and what we represent. We're a strong family – we'll get through this, and together, we'll continue to Ensure Freedom's Future.

Why is this island called "Terceira"?



This island was named Terceira, which means third, because it was supposedly the third island to be discovered by the Portuguese navigators.

Other historians, however, contend this assertion saying that Terceira received its name because it's the third island in terms of distance from mainland, Portugal, and not necessarily the third island to be sighted by the Portuguese.

Terceira Island was probably discovered between 1439 and 1450. The island and the city of Angra do Heroismo in particular played an important role in the 15th and 16th centuries as a port of call for the galleons returning from the Americas, Africa and India, loaded with treasures and other goods.

Still in relation to the island, I've heard rumors that Terceira island's base tapers down below the ocean

surface into an hourglass or mushroom shape, causing the island to break off and sink into the ocean in case of a major earthquake! Fortunately, this is not true. According to the Volcanology Center of the Regional Service for Civil Defense of the Azores, the topographical maps of the island and the ocean floor show that the island's base is actually larger that the island itself.

Terceira, like other Azorean islands, is of volcanic origin and its base is an agglomeration of magma.

Terceira Island is also the third biggest in size after São Miguel and Pico, with a surface area of approximately 153 square miles. It is the second most populated island of the Azorean archipelago with approximately 56,000 inhabitants.
