

Tennessee: Exports, Jobs, and Foreign Investment February 2013

Exports Support Jobs for Tennessee's Workers

Export-supported jobs linked to manufacturing account for an estimated 5.2 percent of Tennessee's total private-sector employment. one-fifth (19.6 percent) of all manufacturing workers in Tennessee depend on exports for their jobs (2009 data latest available).

Exports Sustain Thousands of Tennessee Businesses

A total of 5,074 companies exported from Tennessee locations in 2010. Of those, 4,264 (84 percent) were small and medium-sized enterprises with fewer than 500 employees.

Small and medium-sized firms generated nearly one-sixth (16 percent) of Tennessee's total exports of merchandise in 2010.

Foreign Investment Creates Jobs in Tennessee

In 2010, foreign-controlled companies employed 112,500 Tennessee workers. Major sources of foreign investment in Tennessee in 2010 included Japan, United Kingdom, Germany, and France.

Foreign investment in Tennessee was responsible for 5.0 percent of the state's total private-industry employment in 2010.

Tennessee Depends on World Markets

Tennessee's export shipments of merchandise in 2012 totaled \$31.1 billion.

The state's largest market was Canada. Tennessee posted merchandise exports of \$8.6 billion to Canada in 2012, 27.7 percent of the state's total merchandise exports. Canada was followed by Mexico (\$4.2 billion), China (\$2.2 billion), Japan (\$1.9 billion), and Belgium (\$1.3 billion).

The state's largest merchandise export category is

Transportation Equipment, which accounted for \$6.0 billion
of Tennessee's total merchandise exports in 2012. Other top
merchandise exports are Computer & Electronic Products
(\$4.7 billion), Chemicals (\$4.7 billion), Miscellaneous
Manufactured Commodities (\$3.7 billion), and Machinery,
Except Electrical (\$3.0 billion).

Tennessee's Metropolitan Exports

In 2011, the following metropolitan areas in Tennessee recorded merchandise exports: Nashville-Davidson--Murfreesboro--Franklin (\$5.9 billion), Knoxville (\$2.6 billion), Morristown (\$353 million), Jackson (\$348 million), Cleveland (\$207 million), Johnson City (\$130 million), Memphis (\$12 billion, portions of this MSA are shared with one or more other states), Kingsport-Bristol-Bristol (\$3.3 billion, portions of this MSA are shared with one or more other states), Chattanooga (\$1.6 billion, portions of this MSA are shared with one or more other states)
