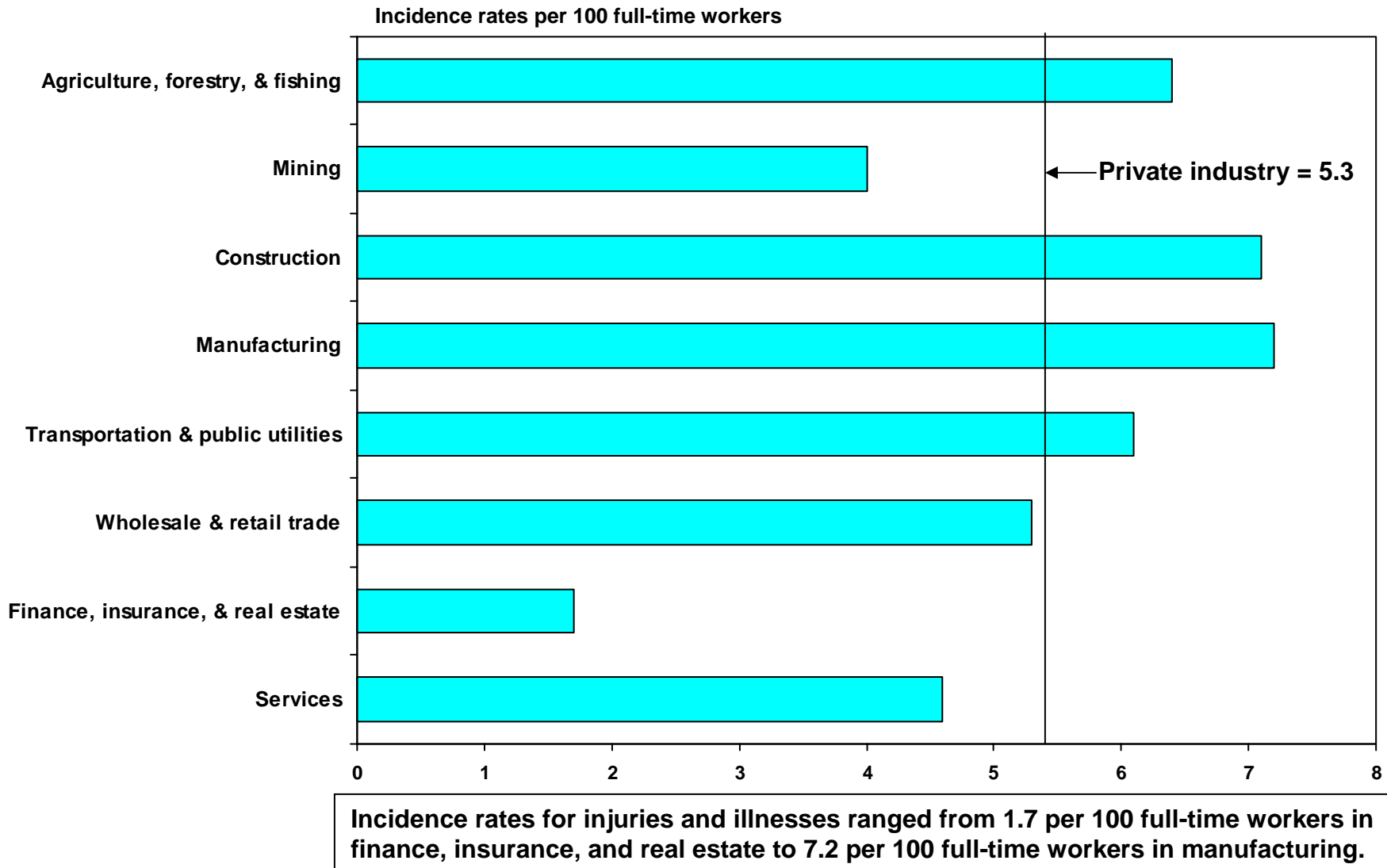

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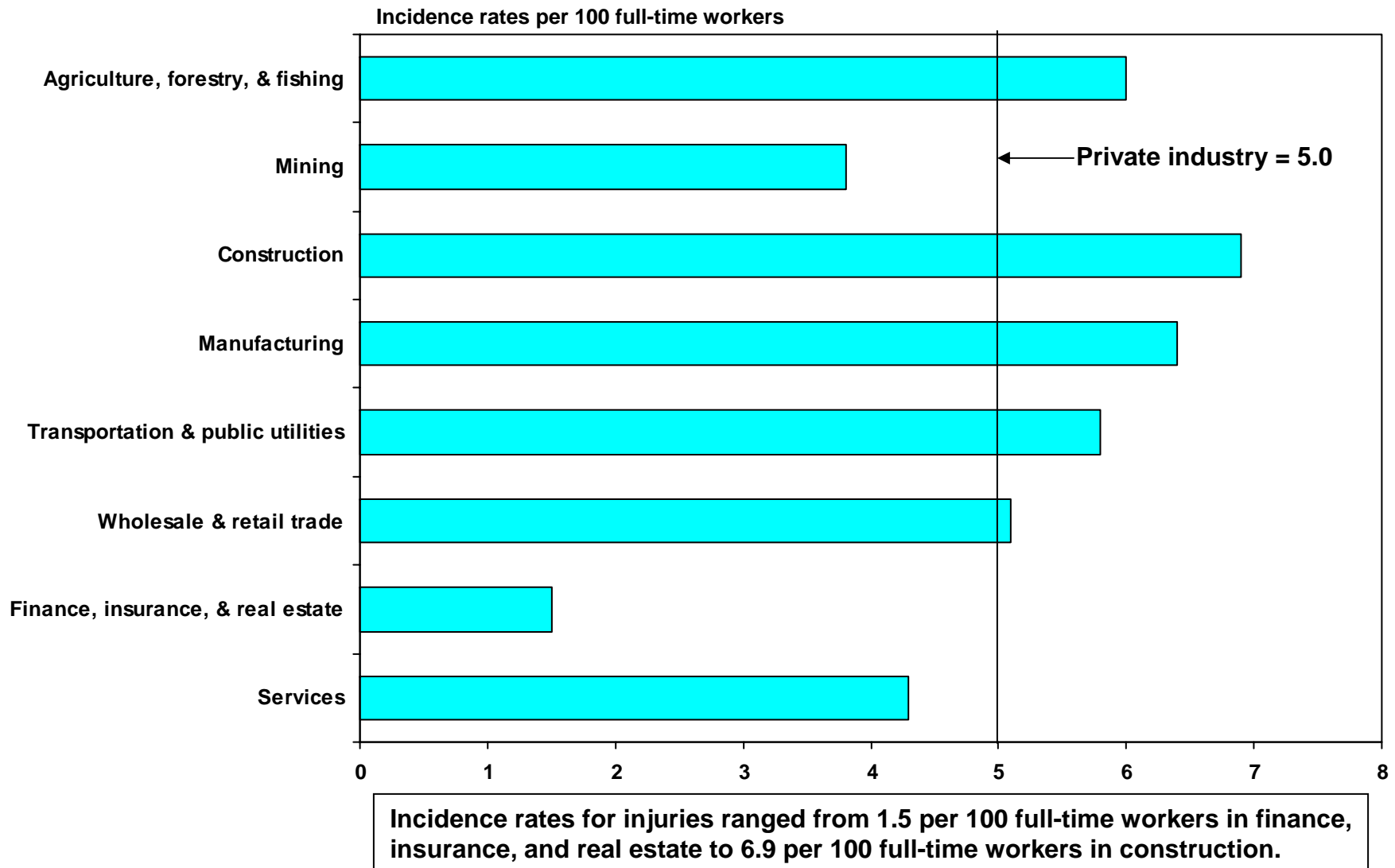

Nonfatal workplace injury and illness incidence rates by industry division, 2002



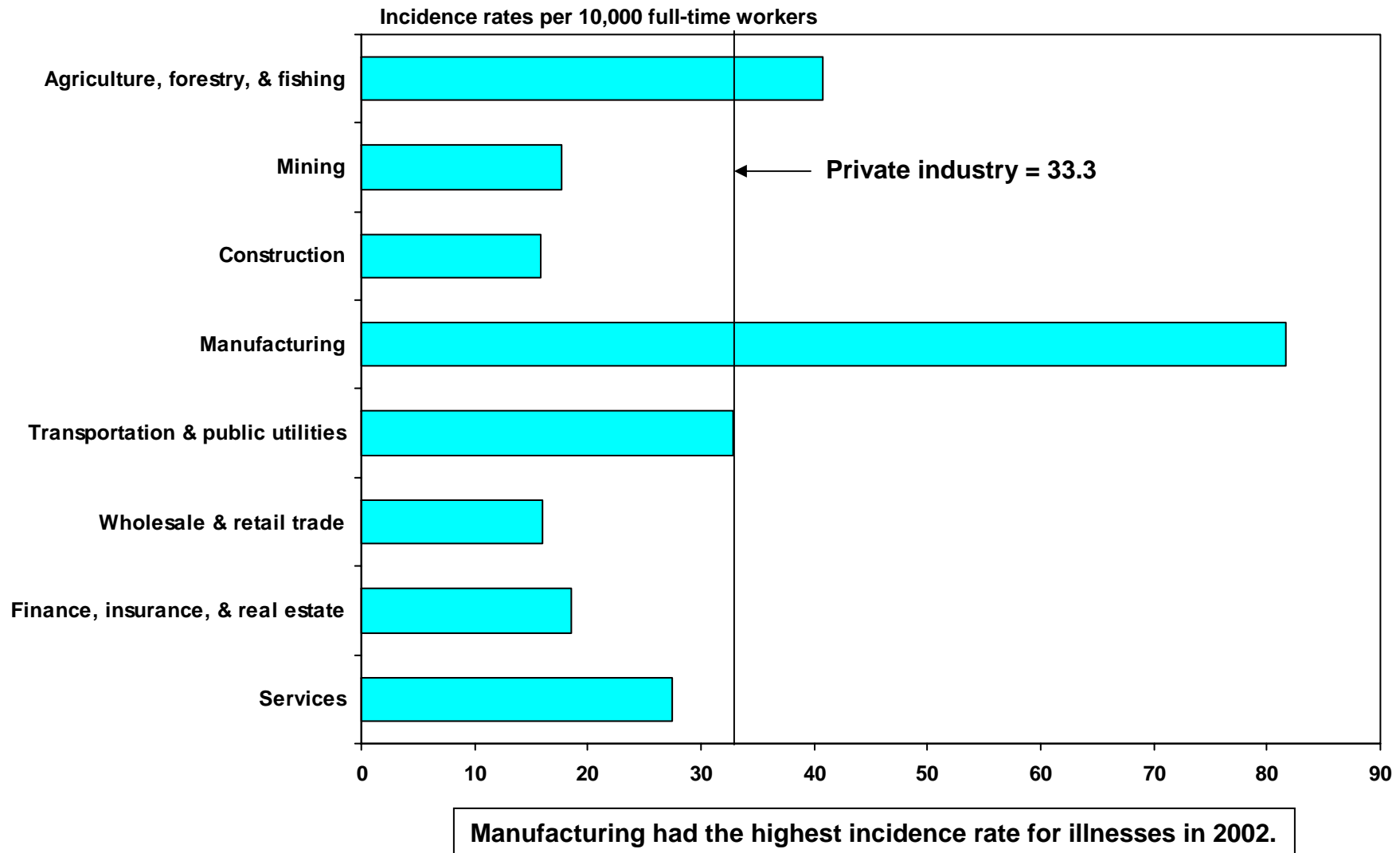

Nonfatal workplace injury incidence rates by industry division, 2002

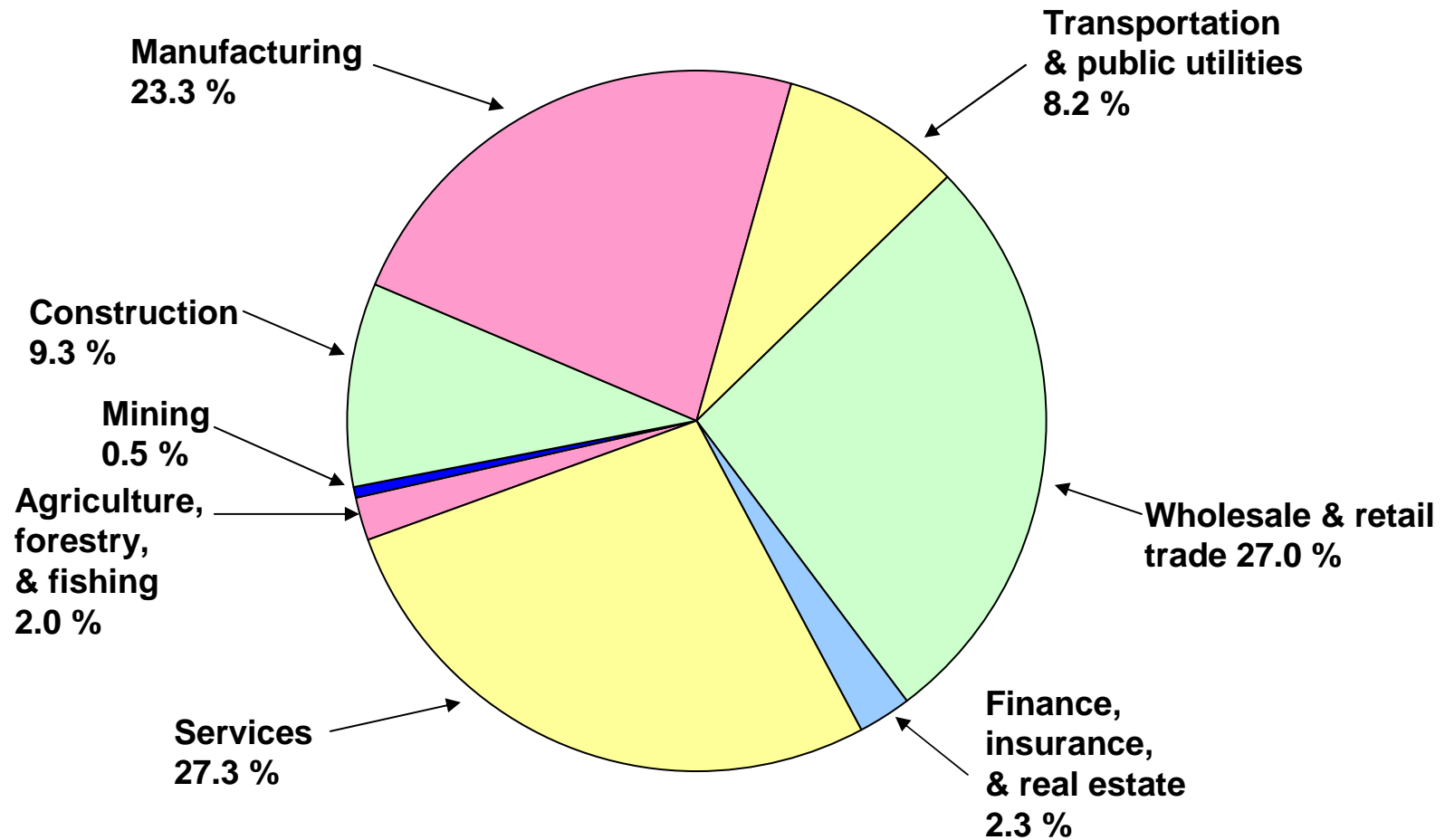

Nonfatal workplace illness incidence rates by industry division, 2002

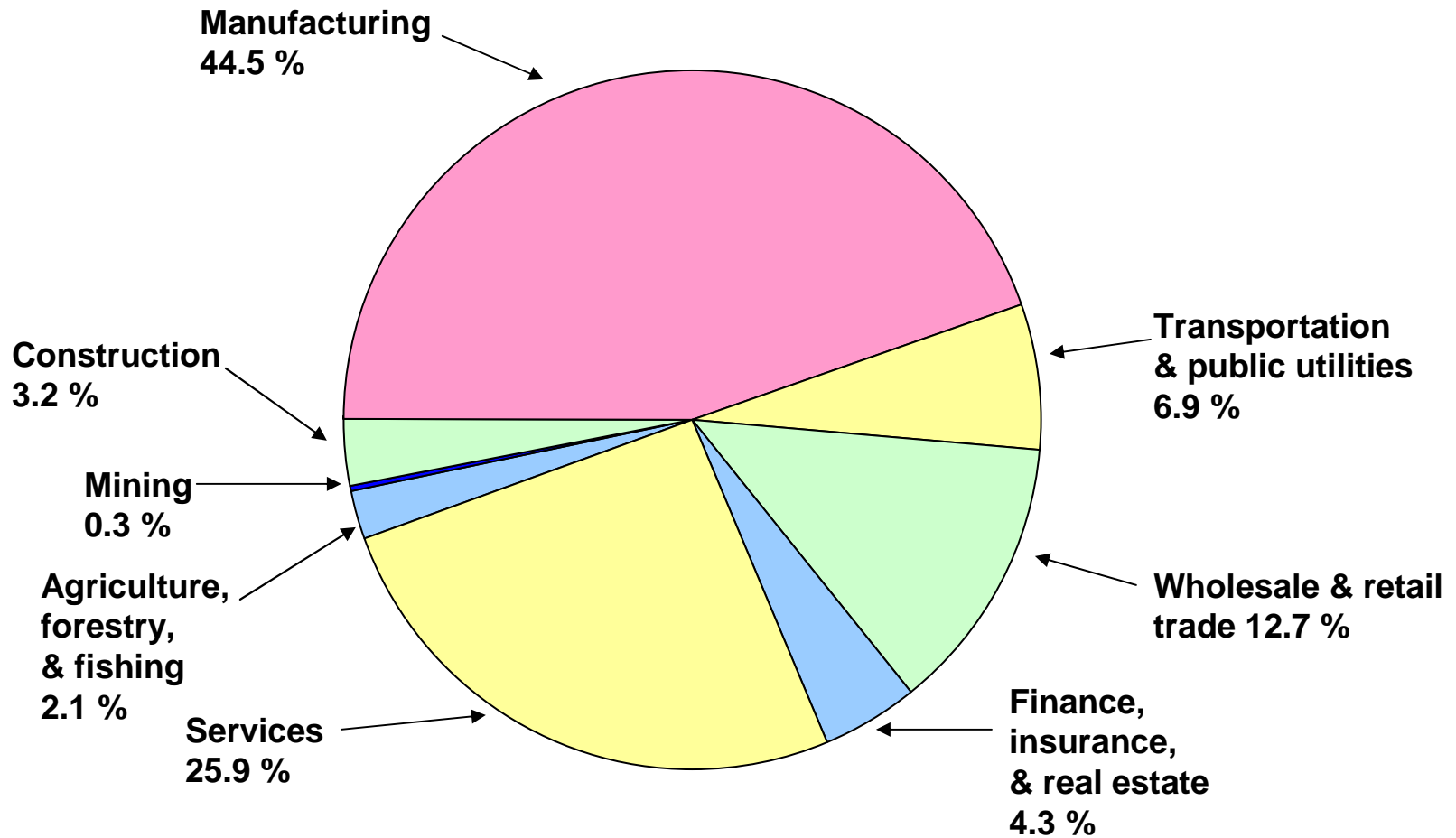


Percent of nonfatal workplace injuries by industry division, 2002



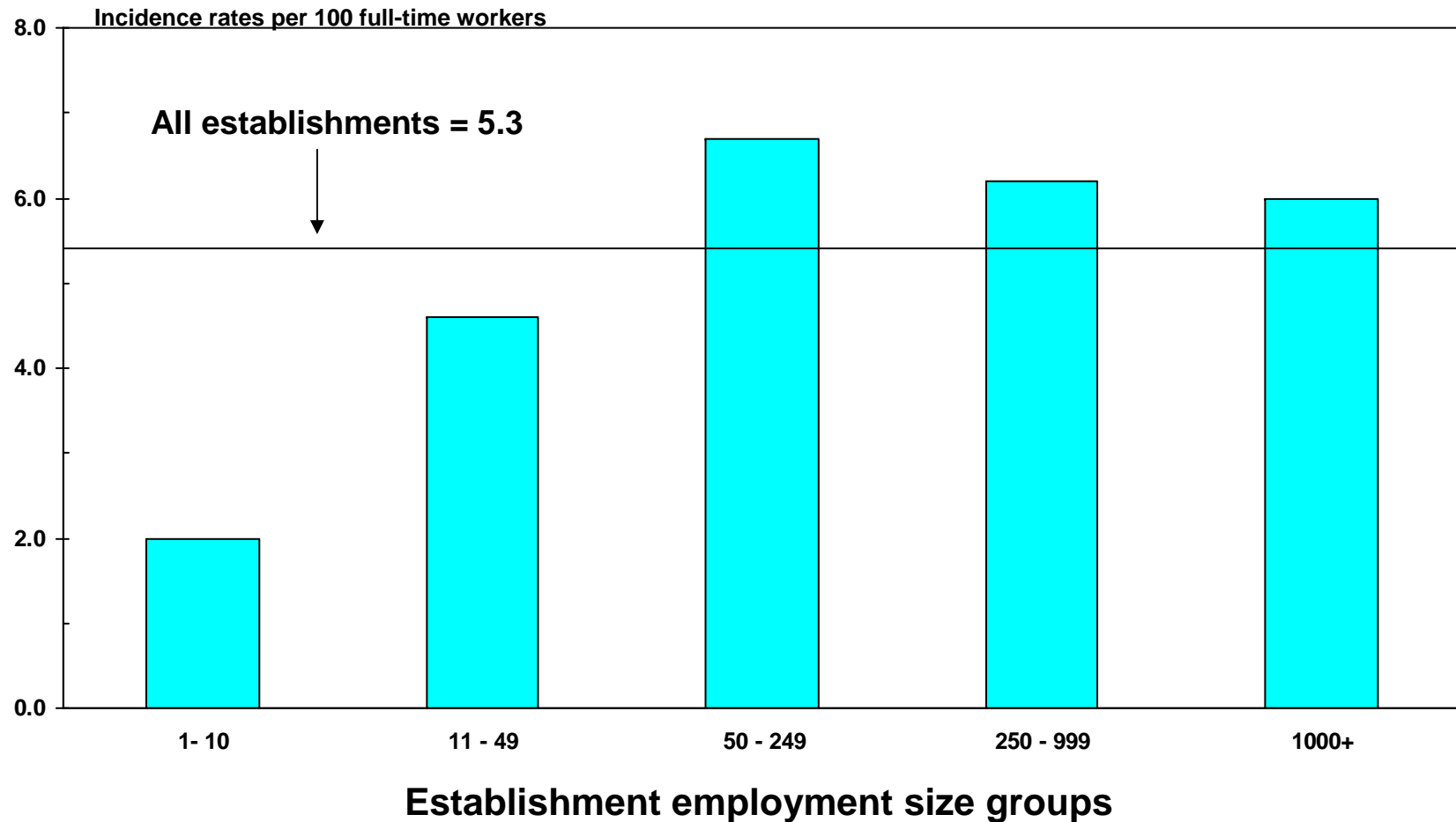
Services, trade, and manufacturing combined accounted for just over 75 percent of all reported occupational injuries for private industry in 2002.

Percent of nonfatal workplace illnesses by industry division, 2002



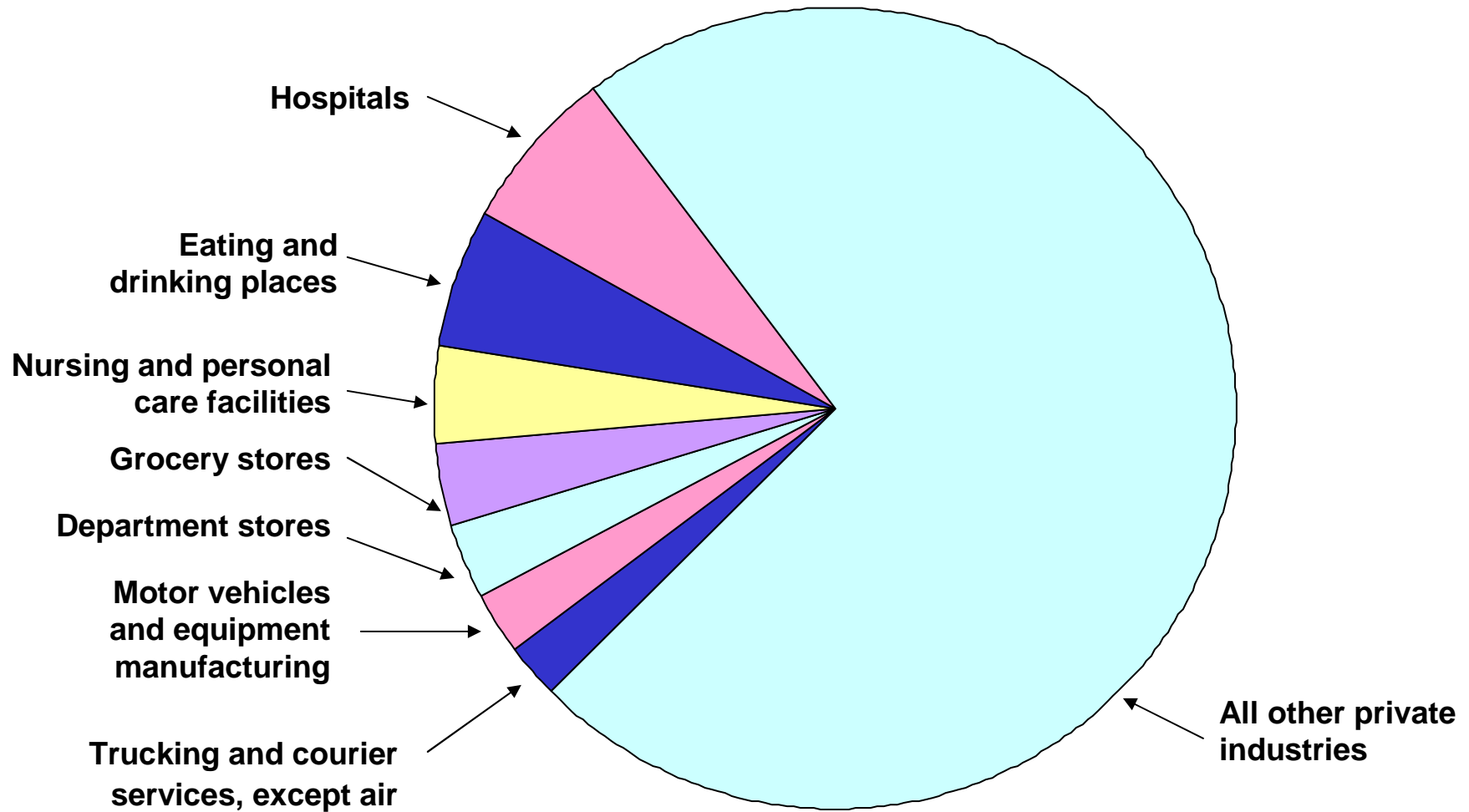
Manufacturing and services combined accounted for 70 percent of all reported occupational illnesses for private industry in 2002.

Total recordable case incidence rates for injuries and illnesses by establishment employment size group, private industry, 2002



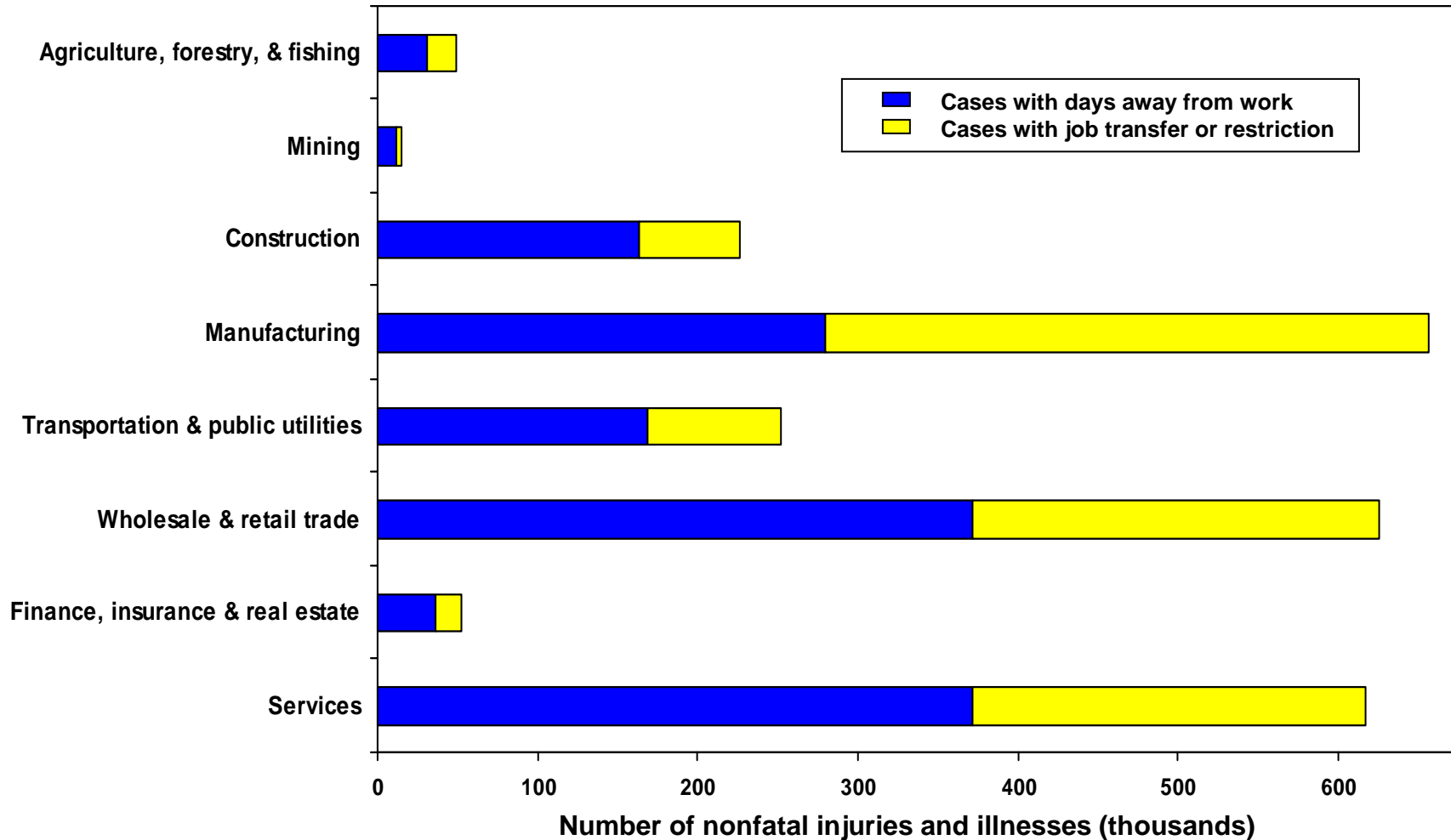
Nationwide, injury and illness rates generally were higher for mid-size establishments employing 50 to 249 workers than for smaller or larger establishments, although this pattern did not hold for all industries.

Industries with at least 100,000 nonfatal workplace injuries and illnesses, 2002



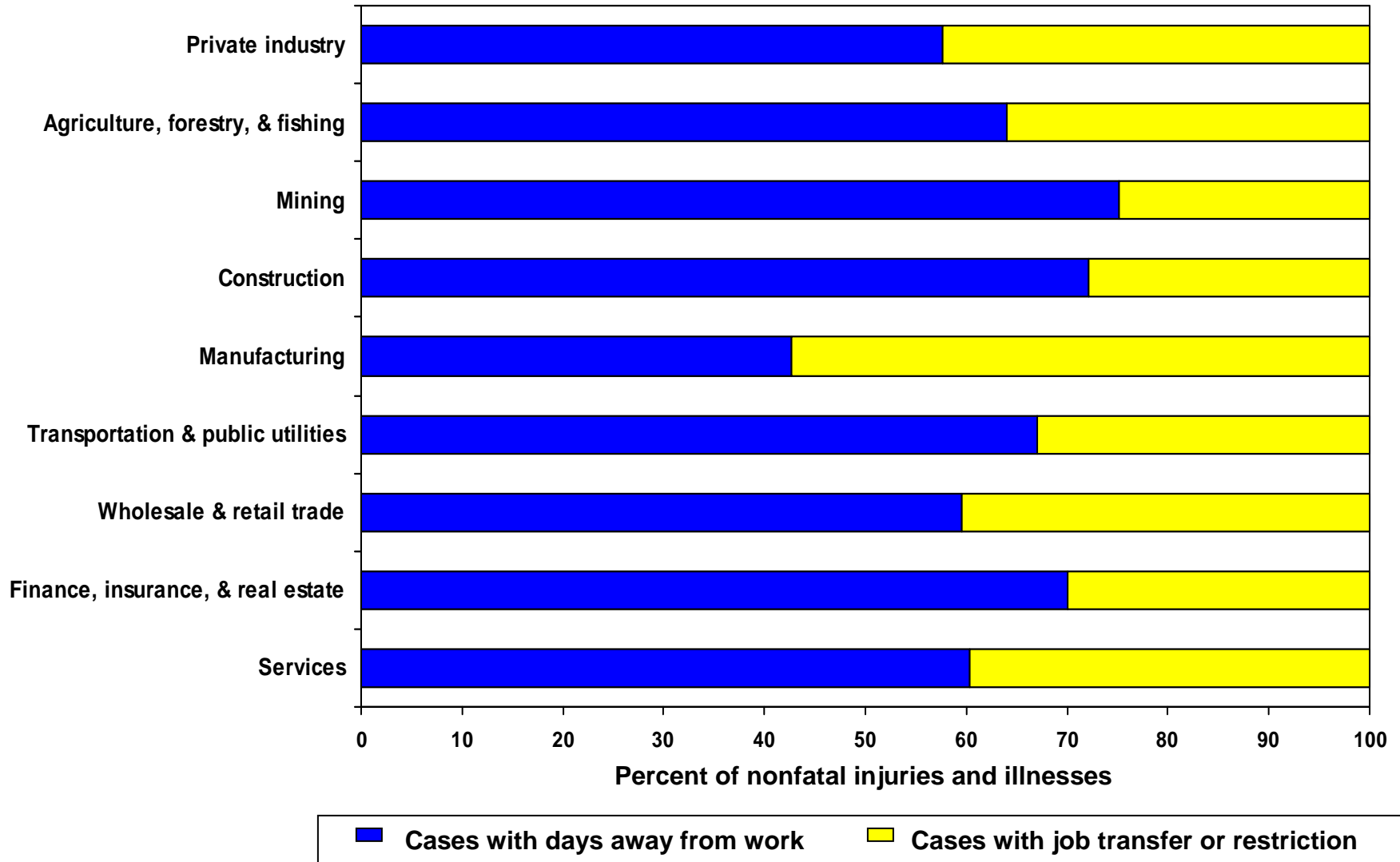
Seven industries, each having at least 100,000 injuries and illnesses, accounted for about 1.3 million injuries and illnesses, or 27 percent of the 4.7 million total cases.

Number of cases with days away from work, job transfer, or restriction, by case type and industry division, 2002



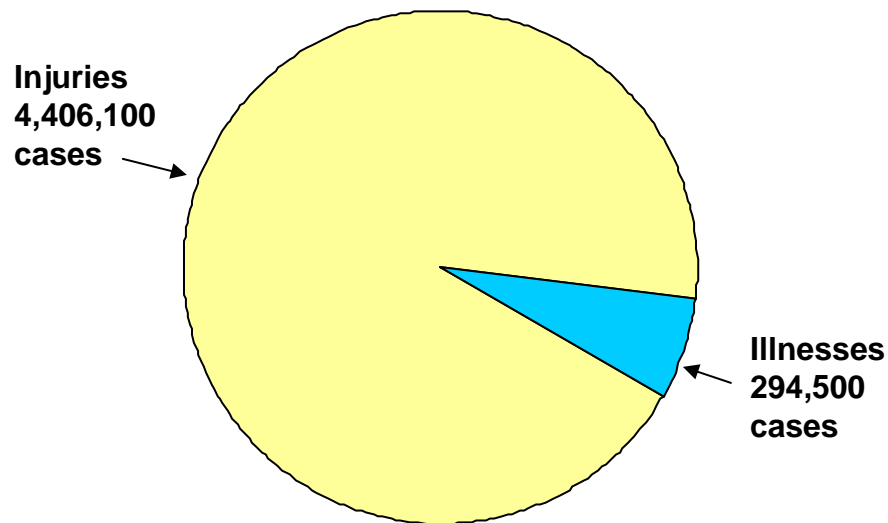
Among industry divisions, only manufacturing had more cases with job transfer or restriction than cases with days away from work.

Percent of cases with days away from work, job transfer, or restriction, by case type and industry division, 2002



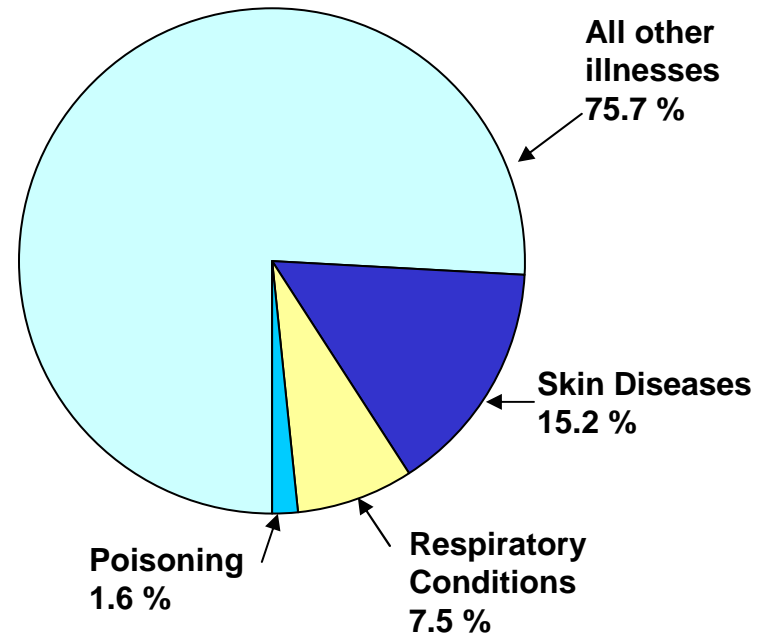
Total nonfatal cases in private industry, 2002: injuries versus illnesses

Of the 4.7 million nonfatal injuries and illnesses reported in 2002, 4.4 million were injuries. The remainder of these private industry cases (294,500 cases) were work-related illnesses. Just over three-fourths of the illness cases were reported in the "all other illness category."
