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The Stufft Family Closes in on 100 Years of Service!

In October of 1992, Ruby Stufft incredible commitment to the National Weather

Service mission was recognized when she was presented with a new award named in her honor: the Ruby Stufft Award.

The Stufft Award is presented to a Cooperative Weather Observer who has completed 70 years of service.

Ruby completed 70 years of service in 1989. In 2000, Ruby's son Lester, accompanied by other family members, had the honor of presenting the Ruby Stufft Award to John Kortes in Medicine Bow, WY.

John began taking weather observations

in 1930 and is one of very few Observers who have reached 70 years of service.

Curt Stufft began taking weather observations at the Stufft Ranch, which is 40 miles southwest of Ainsworth, NE, in June of 1911. Eight years later the duties were handed down to his son, Ruby's husband Foster. Ruby quipped when reminiscing after being presented an award for 65 years of service, "My husband didn't want any part of it, so of course, being green, I said I would take it, and I have had the job ever since."

She was just 19 years old when she started, and continued another 76 years until she passed away at the age of 95.

Her son Lester, who had been her backup Observer for many years, then became the full-time Observer, and he continues taking observations at Ellsmere to this day.

Lester has the same passion for the weather as his mother. He also adds remarks to his observations describing the weather in more detail and calls in storm and snowfall reports.

These reports are vital to the NWS North Platte, NE, office because few

observations come from areas that are as remote as the Stufft Ranch.

The weather station at the Ranch was once known as Koshopah 7NE, but it was decided to change the station name to Ellsmere 9ENE when the town of Koshopah had just one vacant building remaining.

Ruby recorded maximum and minimum temperatures, cloud cover, color of the sunrise and sunset, and daily rainfall and snow. She especially enjoyed the beautiful sunrises and sunsets over the Sandhills of Nebraska, and

in her many letters to the regional office, she would often describe them in detail.

At the end of each month, she sent three copies of her weather records to NWS North Platte and another copy to the local newspaper. Her weather information was also broadcast over the local radio station.

When she was presented with the John Campanius Holm Award in 1966, Ruby sent a letter to the NWS Central Region Cooperative Program Manager (CPM) thanking him for his part in making it possible for her to receive the award.

She said, "I get a lot of enjoyment in making out the reports. Words cannot express what the award really means to me. Thanks again." In another letter to the regional office when plans were being made to visit her Coop station, Ruby said, "If I knew when you were coming I would be so glad to have dinner ready."

The two most prestigious awards presented to Observers are the Thomas Jefferson and John Campanius Holm Awards. Ruby was honored with these awards in 1966 and 1976, and Lester in 1999 and 2008. NWS had never presented both awards to two generations of the same family before.

According to Lester, the biggest and most important award awaits, and that is the Family Heritage Award, which is presented to families who have served 100 years. To Lester, it is not about personal achievements, but working together as a family to continue the legacy of weather observations taken at the Stufft Ranch. \diamondsuit

Volunteer State Flooded with Observers

Tennessee State Parks include a weather program in their educational nature offerings. Local city park nature centers in Nashville and Fairview also are part of the Coop network and make taking observations part of their educational programs.

Montgomery Bell State Park was right in the middle of the May 2010 flood in Middle Tennessee, recording almost 13 inches of rain in a 24-hour period. The park's rainfall report was essential for monitoring the flooding conditions along the Harpeth River.

Fall Creek Falls State Park, the first Tennessee State Park to join the Coop program, tracks the weather to ensure its visitors have a safe and enjoyable time outdoors. This increased

awareness of weather conditions gives the park managers more vital information to help keep Tennessee State Parks safe.

The official Coop program site locations are set up on a 25-square-mile grid, which

leaves a lot of land and people between each site. After a disastrous flood occurred in Fort Collins, CO, that missed the official rain gauges, Nolan Doeskin, the Colorado state climatologist, developed a program that would help fill in the gaps between official measuring

locations. The Community Collaborative Rain, Hail, and Snow (CoCoRaHS) network was born. The idea was to recruit motivated individuals with a quality rain gauge to report the precipitation in their backyard.

The CoCoRaHS program came to Tennessee in April 2007, just in time to document one of the worst droughts in recent history. Tennesseans lived up to their heritage as the "Volunteer State" by stepping up and developing one the largest and most active CoCoRaHS programs

Tennessee was the first state in the Southeast to adopt the program and became the model for many other states to follow. Rain or shine, Tennessee averages more than 325

in the nation.

CoCoRaHS reports a day. Many Observers haven't missed a report from the time they started. More observers are still needed to increase the observation resolution statewide and nationwide. There still isn't much we can do about the weather, but thanks to the dedicated volunteers of the Coop program and the CoCoRaHS program, we are beginning to understand the daily and long term influence it has on all of our lives. \heartsuit


The site is only accessible by ferry or seaplane. Ft. Jefferson, known as the "Gibraltar of the Gulf of Mexico," was constructed over a 30-year period as a strategic bastion to guard the important shipping routes from ports between the Gulf of Mexico and the East Coast.

During the Civil War, the fort served as a military prison for captured deserters and

housed four men convicted of complicity in Abraham Lincoln's assassination, including Dr. Samuel Mudd.

In its latest incarnation, Ft. Jefferson serves as a Research Natural Area. It encompasses 46-square miles of park as a "no take ecological preserver."

Observers live at the park during their volunteer stint. The park is self-sufficient in water and electricity and receives supplies about every other week. Tree Gottshall, the Chief Maintenance Officer, oversees the staff and volunteers in this truly unique National Park Service location.








