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100 Year Family Heritage Award

In recognition of 100 years of dedication, NWS presented **Harold Thomson**, of Richmond, UT, a Family Heritage Award for outstanding service in the Cooperative Weather Observer program.

Vicki Nadolski, NWS Western Region Director and officials from NWS Pocatello, ID, honored Harold and his family at the Richmond city park. "Volunteers like Harold Thomson and his family are crucial to National Weather Service operations," said **Rick Dittmann**, Meteorologist-in-Charge (MIC), at NWS Pocatello. "Of more than 12,000 volunteer observers around the country contributing to the daily collection of weather data needed to maintain forecasting parameters and climatological records, only a select few have had the commitment to maintain records for 100 years or more."

The site was founded by **Joseph Thomson**, Harold's grandfather, in October 1911. The U.S. Weather Bureau furnished Joseph with official observing equipment. In 1956, Joseph transferred station responsibility to his son **Verno** and moved the station to his home, about 1,800 feet north. Harold took over in 1969 from his father and continues to observe from the same location. He plans to continue for many more years.

The Thomson family has provided the nation's with more than 36,000 daily precipitation and temperature observations. Harold received the John Campanius Holm Award in 2009. A maximum of 25 Observers receive this highly competitive and prestigious award each year.

Milking Weather for the Good of the Game

This year, the NWS office in Shreveport, LA, had to find a new location for its longtime Coop site at Louisiana Tech University in Ruston, LA. The site has been in existence since 1888, and since 1947 has been located at the dairy farm on Louisiana Tech's campus.

Tech University in the spring of this year stated that this dairy farm would be closing in late June.

The cows and equipment would be sold and the day-to-day dairy operations would cease so there would be no one to keep accurate records of daily high and low temperatures and precipitation amounts.

Losing a Coop site with so much historic grounding is a huge loss to NWS climate records.

NWS Shreveport turned to Louisiana Tech's campus police department for help. Since the campus police are on duty 7 days a week, they are an ideal organization to continue the daily observations.

Problems occurred, though, when NWS employees tried to find a new location for the equipment. Most of the campus is paved with concrete or asphalt and surrounded by tall trees, both problems for an observation site.

NWS and Louisiana Tech did not give up easily though. With the help of Assistant Police Chief **Bill Davis**, NWS worked with Louisiana Tech's Director of Recreation **Bobby Dowling**, who suggested that the University's golf course might be a suitable relocation for the weather equipment.

NWS visited the suggested site and found the golf course met all the requirements for proper site relocation. Despite the move, the climatological record will not be compromised because the new location is climatologically compatible with the dairy farm.

Meteorologist Intern **Jeffrey Hood** removed the weather equipment from the Louisiana Tech Dairy just a few days before the dairy cows and milking equipment were to be auctioned and installed the rain gauge at the golf course.

A few days later, Jeffrey and Observation Program Leader (OPL) **Aaron Stevens** returned to the golf course to install the Maximum/Minimum Temperature Sensor and Nimbus unit at the golf course's pro shop.

It was a unique experience for Aaron and Jeff. Instead of a truck or car, they used golf carts to ferry the equipment to the new location. In fact, after hearing about their experience, many people at the office gave the guys a hard time about spending a day on a golf course. Journeyman forecaster **Brandi Richardson** said, "Excellent cover for a day of golf on the clock!" But actually, with afternoon temperatures approaching the 100°F, the work was no "golf outing."

The NWS office in Shreveport would like to thank the employees of Louisiana Tech

University's dairy farm for their many years of weather observations and dedication in preserving an historic climatological record.

NWS Shreveport also thanks Bobby Dowling and his staff at the Louisiana Tech Golf Course for continuing the responsibilities of reporting daily weather observations and thereby maintaining a profound climatological record. \heartsuit

Paducah, in the northern low rolling plains of West Texas, about 100 miles east of Lubbock, is no stranger to searing summertime heat; but even here new heat records have been set during this exceptionally hot and dry summer of 2011.

In fact, Paducah claims the dubious honor of experiencing the hottest temperature so far this summer in the great state of Texas, when the mercury soared to 118°F on June 26.

This temperature tied the all-time high temperature in the town set in June 1994, and was only 2 degrees shy of tying the all-time record high of 120 degrees for Texas, set in August 1936 at Seymour.

From June 1 to June 30, Paducah's average daily high temperature has been

a blistering 106.6°F. The town easily broke records for the warmest June and July on record, with a monthly average temperature for June of 88.7°F and for July, 91.4°F.

In July, Paducah set a new all-time monthly record high of 113 degrees. With its many 100 degree days this year, Paducah has also set new records for the most 100 degree days in a year, and for the most consecutive days of 100 or above. Through August 2, the town has had 74 total days of 100 degrees or higher for the year and 42 consecutive days.

Paducah's Coop period of record dates back to 1954. NWS Lubbock would like to thank our Paducah Coop Observers Jean Bayne and Lester Mosley for their service and dedication. From June 1 to June 30, Paducah's average daily high temperature has been a blistering 106.6°F.








