Mr. Gao was honored to be the first Chinese meteorologist ever to present an official cooperative observer an award. According to Mr. Gao, China has an extensive network of cooperative stations similar to ours. They are very vital to the forecasting of river stages and streamflow and also used in research studies conducted in his country. During a recent two-day whirlwind tour through west Texas with Jerry Wolfe, CPM/FTW; and Bob Manning, Chief, SR Coop



Program; Mr. Gao visited numerous cooperative stations and was treated with a meal at the Pitchfork Ranch near Guthrie, TX. He ate alongside real cowboys and rode a horse after lunch. Several cowboys taught him how to do some roping. On the return trip to Fort Worth, a stop was made at U.S. Congressman Charles Stenholm's office at Stamford, TX, where he was presented a cap from District Manager Bill Longley. She conducts tours for school children to explain her weather station and shares weather records for school projects. Her services are especially valuable in this remote, sparsely-populated area known for its severe winters.

Mrs. Newport was the telephone operator from 1940 to 1965, and the telephone switchboard for Arbon Valley was located in her home. That switchboard is now on display in a regional museum.

The National Weather Service is very grateful for Mrs. Gena Newport's outstanding service. The Holm Award is well deserved.

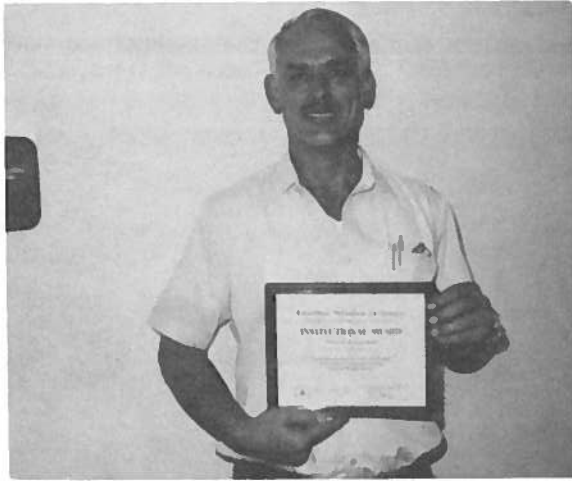

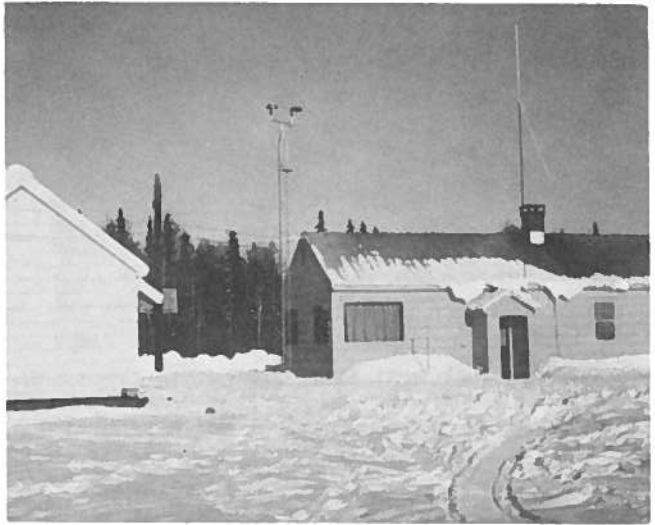
