## Clinician's Corner

#### Rushing~Dragging: A Time-honored Tradition

If the old saying is right, then time is nature's way of keeping everything from happening at once. When you play your instrument or sing, how's your sense of time? Is the time spaced out evenly or is it inconsistent? The task of keeping steady time while still playing expressively should be practiced every day.

In a high school all-county band, I remember rehearsing a very rhythmic piece. The conductor had everybody speaking their parts in time, instead of playing, so we could learn how to put all the complicated rhythms together. The enthusiastic



euphonium section was getting carried away. Suddenly, the conductor stopped and accused us of intentionally rushing. The three of us didn't know what the conductor was talking about. A few weeks later, I finally got it. We had been carried away with our excitement. We were rushing so badly that we were pulling the whole band apart. I still use the lesson I learned: how I feel can really affect my perception of time. Here is a strategy that you can use to practice playing in time:

- Play simple rhythms with a metronome. Go from quarters to eighths to triplets and back again. Pay attention to your tendency to rush or drag the first couple notes of each different rhythm. Remember, different tempos can have opposite effects on identical rhythms!
- Play etudes and solos with a metronome. Ask questions: was there an awkward change of rhythm? Did you speed up because the fast fingerings made you nervous? Did you drag because you were carried away with the expression?
- Explore the literature. Working on solo repertoire will allow you to have some choices when solo opportunities come around. Whether you sing or play, there is a copious amount of music to keep you challenged all summer long.
- **Finally, take notes about live performance situations.** Play for your friends to simulate a live concert. They are in the best position to help and support you. If you miss a note or rhythm-don't worry--just keep going.

Keeping good time is not a skill that can be learned only once. It must be practiced every day, because we are emotionally changing people. To improve time and rhythm, constantly utilize a metronome. Seek to understand why and how the feeling of similar tempos and rhythms seems to shift from note to note, bar to bar and even year to year.



I enjoy biking, hiking, watching movies, reading and working on my house.


What's on your iPod?


