


GEORGE GANGI AWARD WINNER



World War II Army Veteran Wayne Field of Colorado Springs, Colo., started swimming 31 years ago at the tender age of 55. Today, at 86 years of age, he has won more than 200 medals in 23 appearances at both the National Veterans Golden Age Games and the National Veterans Wheelchair Games. He also competed in the National Senior Games five times where his best finish was fourth in the 100 meter.

While this Purple Heart recipient's athletic ability and accomplishments are outstanding, what is really amazing is that he has achieved these feats with no feeling below his knees. Shortly after the Battle of the Bulge, Field's platoon was shelled knocking him unconscious. His legs froze in the snow resulting in peripheral neuropathy in both extremities. After the war he walked with forearm crutches for many years before finally requiring use of a wheelchair. His wife, Marie, believes swimming is one of the main reasons he still has both legs.

Field is this year's recipient of the George Gangi Inspiration Award that recognizes the "most inspirational" athlete of the National Veterans Golden Age Games.



His coach Recreation Therapist Adeline Velasquez said, "It's an inspiration to see him progressing even as he ages. I use him as an inspiration to the team. He's been through so much and he sees his physical limitations as just a minimal hurdle."


This year he helped mentor two new swimmers on his VA Eastern Colorado Healthcare System team. "What better tutor could you have than someone who's been swimming for so many years and is in a power wheelchair?" added Velasquez.

Field, who speeds around the venues in a motorized wheelchair compensates in the water by adjusting his arm strokes to power through to the finish. He follows a strict practice regimen swimming three days a week and doing water aerobics on his off days.

"Whomever I beat, it's probably not because I'm better than him," he said, "it's because I practice more."

Competing has become even more challenging for Field in recent years. In addition to his peripheral neuropathy, he has also overcome rotator cuff surgery in one shoulder and ligament surgery in the other.

Velasquez, who has known him for 12 years, added, "He has gained independence through his therapies. I just love to watch him in the water."



VCS 2012 CHALLENGE AWARD WINNER

Since 2004, the Veterans Canteen Service (VCS) has awarded the Challenge Award to a first-time participant in the Games who demonstrates the characteristics of a true athlete. The winner exhibits determination, sportsmanship, camaraderie and strives for personal bests whether or not they go home with a medal.

This year's 2012 Challenge Award Winner Harold "Lee" Uhey Jr., 56, of Grand Junction, Colo., wishes he could compete in all of the sports at the Games.

"Come one time and you're hooked," the former Navy Seabee said. "It brings back years of playing sports showing that an old guy can still do it."

And do it, he did. Instead of playing cards, he is playing sports. In his first competition he threw a javelin 22.88 meters and won a gold medal.

His coach Henry Bullock said, "He's like a kid in a candy store." He supports other team members at events when he's not competing. "You can't come here expecting to win without putting forth effort," said Uhey. "There is a lot of camaraderie in being a soldier and an athlete. It's great to feel young again!"

Toni's team consists of 36 Veterans, one who happens to be her brother who served in the Marines during Vietnam. All of her Veterans have shown significant improvement in their health using recreation therapy.
