The Recovery Act added two additional target groups (veterans and disconnected youth) to the categories of new hires for which employers can receive tax credits through the Work Opportunity Tax Credit (WOTC). As there had been a pre-Recovery Act change in the WOTC program which required implementation changes, on March 25th DOL issued a TEGL, #12-08, Change 1 which notified State Workforce Agencies and employers that forms currently in use for requesting certification of new hires will remain in effect, (be extended) until new forms and guidance reflecting the full ARRA changes can be approved.	In San Francisco from March 31-April 2, ETA's Office of Apprenticeship (OA) will host the third in a series of Action Clinics to help support and advance states efforts to leverage Registered Apprenticeship as a key talent development strategy and better Register Apprenticeship programs to effectively partner with the workforce system to aid in economic recovery and green jobs efforts. Previous Clinics were held in Chicago and Dallas.
The ETA ARRA Implementation team attended a meeting with staff from the House Ways and Means and the Senate Finance Committees. The discussion focused on the options for the New Trade Office referenced under the ARRA of 2009.	
On March 26th, DOL announced the certification of \$206,823,364 in unemployment insurance (UI) modernization incentive funds to the state of New Jersey. New Jersey qualified for the funds available under the ARRA by making state unemployment benefits available to part time workers, extending benefits for UI beneficiaries in training and allowing workers to use their more recent earnings to qualify for benefits. New Jersey's approved application will be posted at the department's Employment and Training Administration Web site.	Next week the Secretary will contact five additional states to inform them of the certification of their applications for UI Modernization funds.
Employee Benefits Security Administration (EBSA)	
On March 24th, EBSA conducted a ARRA Compliance Webcast for 3,100 attendees. An archive of the webcast was posted on March 25th and has since received over 2600 visits. Another webcast will be scheduled soon.	On April 2, 2009, EBSA's local office will conduct a one hour train-the-trainer session sponsored by the Missouri AFL-CIO for a 12-member transition team in Springfield that will provide services to approximately 100 employees impacted by a lay off at Interstate Bakeries. Staff will discuss COBRA and the impact of the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act, HIPAA, and pension distribution issues.
From March 23rd-27th, EBSA responded to 6500 inquiries regarding the COBRA changes under ARRA, bringing the total to 28,000 since ARRA was enacted.	
On March 24th, EBSA conducted a Congressional briefing for Representative Tim Holden (17th District of PA) and his staff.
