ATENDED JOBLESS BENEFITS oting 289-112, the House on hursday sent President Barack bama a bill, HR 4851, providing bout \$12 billion to pay for an extension until June 2 of jobless hecks for hundreds of thousands f people whose benefits expired fter April 4. Costing \$18 billion everall, the bill also would provide hort-term funding of COBRA ealth insurance for the jobless, ransportation projects, national ood insurance, small-business- pan programs and Medicare pay- ments to doctors, among other heasures. his vote occurred as the House and Senate negotiated a separate ill that would extend eligibility for obless benefits until the end of the year. Hunter R  darrell Issa R  ADIO SPECTRUM o'coting 394-18, the House on lednesday sent the Senate a ill, HR 3125, requiring a govern- ment inventory of radio-spectrum censes. This would guide the re- llocation of underused bandwidth	to create space for mobile Internet access. Covering frequency bands between 225 megahertz and 10 gigahertz, the inventory would be conducted by the National Telecommunications Information Administration, which oversees the federal government's use of spectrum, and the Federal Communications Commission, which oversees nonfederal and commercial use. Yes No NV  Brian Bilbray R	Voting 399-9, the House on Wednesday sent the Senate a bill, HR 4994, changing several Internal Revenue Service rules for taxpayers. In part, the bill eliminates record-keeping requirements on those who make private calls on business cell phones, requires taxpayers to be notified when the IRS suspects they are victims of identity theft, reduces from 45 days to 30 days the time the Treasury has to send refunds without adding interest, and exempts tax-return preparers with religious objections from having to file returns electronically.
	ESTUARIES PROTECTION  Voting 278-128, the House on Thursday sent the Senate a bill, HR 4715, renewing the National Estuary Program through fiscal 2016 at a budget of \$50 million annually, up from the current \$35 million. Administered by the Environmental Protection Agency under the Clean Water Act, the program is designed to protect drinkingwater supplies, natural habitats and aquatic life in coastal areas where fresh water meets saltwater.
