TCOM Class of 2009 Residency Matches

March 16 was "Match Day" for medical students seeking <u>Accreditation Council for Graduate Medical Education</u> (ACGME) residencies across the country, including 116 here at the Texas College of Osteopathic Medicine. our military students received their residency matches in December, and medical students choosing an <u>American Osteopathic Association</u> residency learned their matches in February. In all, our 128 graduating TCOM physicians will once again move to residencies all over the country after graduation on May 16.

Speaker Straus and Rep. Geren tour UNTHSC

'Living Legacy' starts as part of Master Plan focus on greening campus

The Health Science Center's new Living Legacy program provides a way to remember a lost loved one, commemorate a special event like a birth or marriage, or mark any occasion by planting a tree or sponsoring a flower bed on campus. Facilities Management, sponsor of the program, has planned an Earth Day celebration for a kickoff tree and flower bed planting on April 22. Fees must be paid by April 20 to participate in the Earth Day celebration.

Trees and flower beds will be available for purchase and commemoration any time. Fees and types of trees available are listed on the <u>Living Legacy Web site</u>.

All proceeds will be used for the Living Legacy program, and any profits made from tree sales and bed adoptions will be used to offset costs incurred by the Health Science Center for the trees. Facilities will provide \$100 toward the cost of any of the largest 95-gallon trees purchased through Living Legacy.

Living Legacy plantings will be marked with an 8.5-by-11-inch oak plaque bearing the name of the person honored. After a year, the plaque will be removed and given to the purchaser.

Living Legacy trees and beds will be planted in designated areas on campus so Health Science Center visitors know where to find the live memorials. The trees and beds are part of the planned greening of the Health Science Center campus, as designated in the Master Plan.

Income tax withholding changes began with April 1 paycheck

New withholding tables may reduce the amount of income tax withheld from your wages. The new tables, prescribed by the U.S. Department of the Treasury, reflect the <u>Making Work Pay credit</u> and other changes resulting from the <u>American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009</u>. No action on your part is necessary to get the automatic withholding change.

If you do not want your withholding reduced (because, for example, you have more than one job or you are married and your combined income places you in a higher tax bracket), you may want to file a new **Form W-4** with the Payroll Office. You may claim fewer withholding allowances on line 5 or request additional amounts to be withheld on line 6. For additional help, get <u>IRS Publication 919</u>, "How Do I Adjust My Tax Withholding?" Or visit the IRS website at *www.irs.gov* and use the <u>Withholding Calculator</u>.

To view your W-4 tax Information, log onto the <u>EIS Portal</u> and click on Employee Services in the HSC Human Resources box. This is the same place you view paychecks.
