DISTRICT PROFILE

The Wichita Falls District plans, designs, builds, operates and maintains the state transportation system in nine counties. The district primarily conducts asset preservation which results in varying challenges for maintenance crews and designers in order to maintain mobility and ensure the safety of the traveling public. The Wichita Falls District experiences varying weather conditions from extreme heat to sub-freezing temperatures. Blizzards, tornadoes, flooding, and wildfires are common in the region.

MAINTENANCE: We spent \$5.4 million annually on sealcoating projects and \$9.8 million on overlay jobs with contractors.

CORRIDORS: The Wichita Falls District has two Interstates running through it into Oklahoma and points North. I-44 and I-35 are two of the highest traffic generators for the region. But US 287 carries more traffic from South-East to North-West through the district.

SAFETY: Fully loaded semis transporting through our district led our employees to design a nationally recognized hotmix pavement that can handle the beating. Our engineers are challenged to design safer highways with wider lanes and shoulders to handle the mix of traffic. Rumble strips and post and cable barriers are standard to protect motorists. And our maintenance employees are skilled at battling the snow and ice that takes a toll on our roads and bridges as well as endangers motorists.
