## 2015 Grant Announcement

The Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) San Antonio District has awarded grants to six organizations for improving safety and bringing awareness to the residents of San Antonio and the surrounding area.

Three grants were funded through the Selective Traffic Enforcement Program (STEP), which focuses on speed, safety belts, Driving While Intoxicated (DWI) and Intersection Control (ITC). The STEP program promotes additional law enforcement and protection on our highways and roadways. Three other grants awarded concentrate on the No Refusal Initiative, DUI Adjudication and training of regional law enforcement on effective investigations of impaired driving cases. In addition, the Alamo Area Metropolitan Planning Organization (AAMPO) received a grant to increase education of motorists, bicyclists and pedestrians regarding their shared roles in achieving the goal of fewer motor vehicle-related pedestrian and bicyclist fatalities.

### Community Collaboration: Working Together to Stop Drunk Driving




On November 4, 2014 a collaboration of community partners met in the City of San Antonio for the annual Texas Impaired Driving Summit. In attendance were representatives from law enforcement agencies from across Texas, Traffic Safety organizations and nonprofits working together to stop drunk driving.

Included in the prestigious list of speakers was General Joe Weber, Executive Director, Texas Department of Transportation. General Weber's goal is to provide and maintain a safe and reliable transportation system for the 27

million people who call Texas home and support transportation as an economic development tool that makes Texas the best destination for businesses and visitors.

Ms. Georgia Chakiris, Regional Administrator, National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, Region 6 began the session by stating: "Impaired driving is a choice and we need to help people make the right choice." Many other topics were touched on such as The State of the State: Are We Making Progress? Collaborating to Eliminate Drunk Driving, and Civic Fusion: How Communities Address Tough Challenges through Collaboration.





## Making A Difference

For the past 30 years, the Executive Women in Texas Government (EWTG) have been coming together in the spirit of building careers and developing leaders to create positive results in Texas state government. EWTG was founded in 1984 by six visionary women who recognized the need for women in higher levels of state government to have an educational and networking support group. The first meeting was announced by word-of-mouth and over 100 women attended.

This year hundreds of women came to San Marcos to attend the 28<sup>th</sup> Annual Professional Development Conference. To kick off the conference we all enjoyed a night of poetry to which the audience cheered, laughed and enjoyed the readings.

The following morning our keynote speaker was Ms. Amy Henry. Ms. Henry captured our attention as she described how her life has changed since her experience as a contestant on the 2004 *The Apprentice*. She made it further than any other female contestant and was one of the final four to face Mr. Donald Trump in the boardroom. To this day Ms. Henry holds the record for the most wins on *The Apprentice* by a female contestant.

Ms. Henry has gone on to write a book "What It Takes, Speak Up, Step Up, Move Up" with the forward written by Mr. Trump. Ms. Henry believes strongly in several things that have helped her career develop and she shared them with us:

- Build relationships with superiors
- Speak up on behalf of your needs and accomplishments
- Step up to challenging assignments that demonstrate your skills
- Use rather than hide your charm and intuition
- Value your work and ask for the money you deserve
- Let objectivity rather than emotions guide your workplace behavior
- Make yourself and your achievements known

The crew checked in our appointments, if they were late Toni Cantu was calling them to confirm their participation.

The whole system ran so smoothly that time flew by. Pearsall Fire Department were on hand to finger print and register the children. And the Pearsall Current Newspaper also came out to cover our event.
