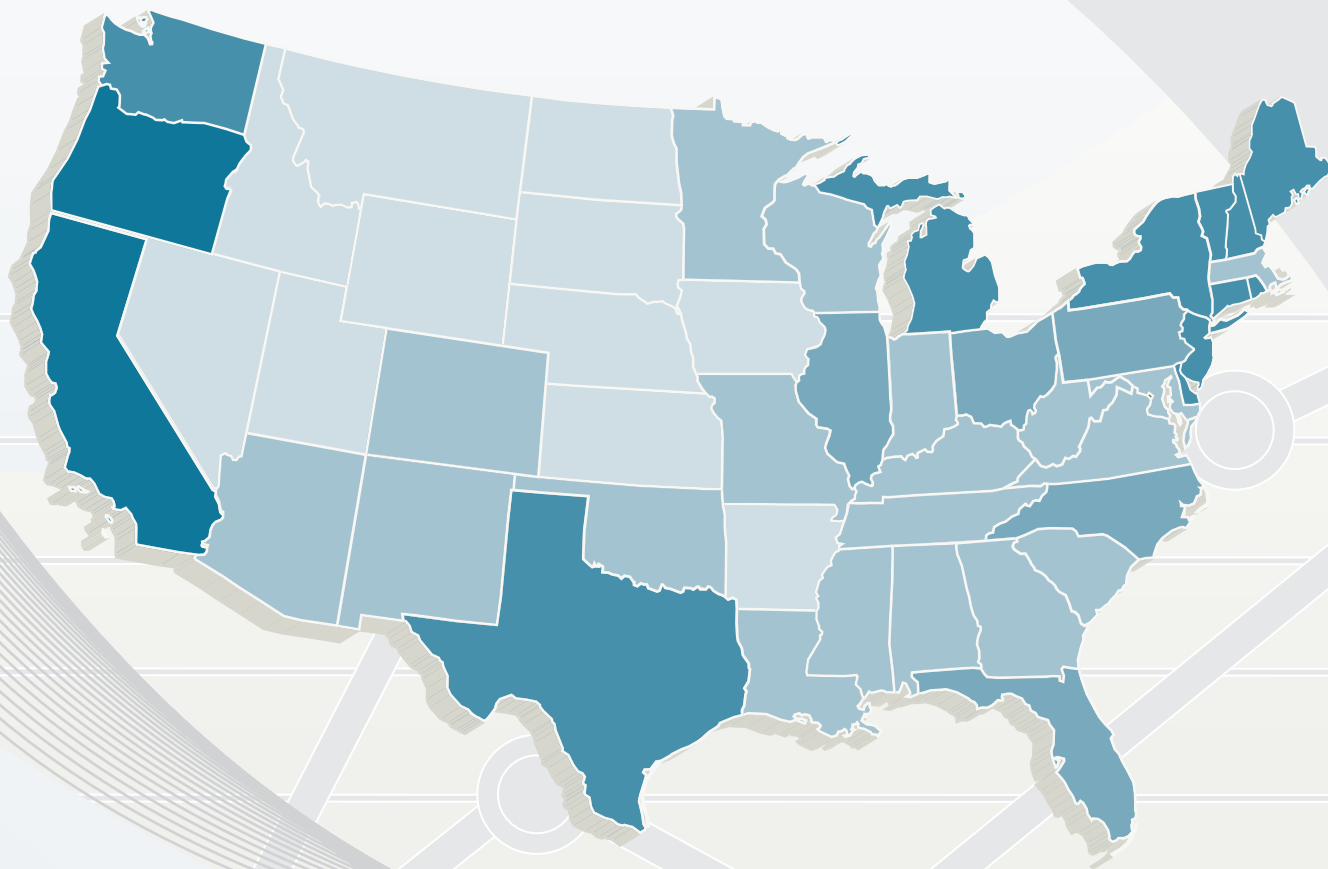

INTRODUCTION

The Purpose of This Report

The American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009—Recipient and Agency Reported Data 2009–2013 is a presentation of all data related to stimulus spending under the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA) for some 275 federal programs managed by 29 federal agencies. The data was collected from two sources: quarterly reports submitted by recipients of ARRA awards and the weekly Financial and Activity Reports from the federal agencies that received and distributed ARRA funds. This document was prepared as reference material and as a resource for those interested in the long-term historical impact of ARRA.

The American Recovery and Reinvestment Act

On February 17, 2009, in response to the worst domestic economic crisis since the Great Depression, President Barack Obama signed into law the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act, which had three primary goals:

- Create new jobs and save existing ones;
- Spur economic activity and invest in long-term growth; and
- Foster unprecedented levels of accountability and transparency in government.

The landmark legislation intended to achieve those goals by pumping \$840 billion into the economy in the form of:

- Tax cuts and benefits for millions of working families and businesses;
- Expansion of entitlement programs, such as Medicare, Medicaid, and extended unemployment and health insurance benefits; and
- Federal contract, grant, and loan awards to entities, state governments, universities, and nonprofit organizations.

While many ARRA awards were focused on jumpstarting the economy immediately, others, especially infrastructure improvements, were expected to contribute to economic growth for many years.

In addition to appropriating funding, ARRA laid out several stipulations that were firsts in the federal government. The most important was to require all recipients and sub-recipients awarded more than \$25,000 in ARRA funds to report quarterly on how they spent the money and how many jobs were funded by their ARRA projects. Then all of this recipient-reported data was to be displayed on Recovery.gov for the American public to access.

In addition, ARRA created the Recovery Accountability and Transparency Board (the Board) to provide transparency of the funding and prevent fraud, waste, and abuse of the funds.

The Board

On February 23, 2009, President Barack Obama appointed Earl E. Devaney, the Inspector General of the Department

of the Interior, to be the first Chairman of the Board. Upon Mr. Devaney's retirement in December 2011, President Obama appointed Kathleen S. Tighe, the Inspector General of the Department of Education, as Chair. Including the Chair, 12 Inspectors General made up the Board.

One of the Board's main responsibilities as mandated by ARRA was to build Recovery.gov, a public-facing, user-friendly website to track all ARRA awards. The Board quickly recognized that the initial Recovery.gov was not robust or scalable enough to display the large amounts of data that the recipients would report. In May 2009, the Board made the decision to rebuild Recovery.gov with greater data intake and display capabilities.

Recipient Reporting

Collecting the Data

Recipients of ARRA awards were required to submit detailed status reports in the first 10 days following each calendar quarter (January, April, July, and October). The data was then displayed on Recovery.gov 30 days after the close of the quarter. The Office of Management and Budget (OMB) determined that recipients were to report for the first time beginning on October 1, 2009, for the period February 17, 2009, through September 30, 2009.

However, within the federal government, there was no data collection or reporting system that could handle the massive volume of information that was expected. OMB initially thought that somewhere between 40,000 and 250,000 reports would be filed, and each report included information on approximately 99 data elements, including:

- Award amounts and amounts received and expended;
- Descriptions of the awards;
- Jobs funded by the award; and
- The completion status of the award.

The Board opted to create a centralized reporting system—FederalReporting.gov—instead of having each federal agency collect data from their individual recipients. For the first time, standardized data on the use of federal contracts, grants, and loans was collected in a single place from a wide variety of users and stakeholders—states, industries, mid-sized corporations, universities, and small businesses.

The Board successfully collected and displayed data from prime and sub-recipients for every reporting quarter from October 2009 through December 31, 2013. In January 2014, Congress passed, and the President signed, the Omnibus Spending Act of 2014, which repealed recipient and agency reporting. October–December 2013 was the last quarter that the recipients reported on their awards. The agencies filed their final Financial and Activity reports in January 2014 for the period ending December 31, 2013.

The Board made the decision to give recipients and agencies an extended period of time to review the reports and

make necessary changes or corrections. The final date for recipients to make corrections was March 19, 2014; agencies had until March 31, 2014, to review and correct their recipients' reports. On May 1, 2014, the recipient data on Recovery.gov was updated for the last time.

Data Quality

Data quality was always a central focus of the Board, however, the Board made it very clear that it was not the owner of the data—the recipients were; therefore, all changes and corrections to reports had to be made by the recipients—not by a federal agency, the Board, or OMB.

In order to ensure accurate reporting, the Board arranged for a combination of training materials, webinars, meetings, user manuals, detailed reporting guidance, and a help desk. After the first reporting period, the Board also implemented a series of edit checks to prevent recipients from inputting incorrect information. For example, a recipient could not choose a congressional district or zip code not associated with the state code the recipient chose as the place of performance. Additional edit checks prevented recipients from marking a report as final if no funding had been received or expended, nor could they report spending more than the amount of the award. The Board and OMB also worked closely to resolve issues regarding award IDs reported by recipients that did not match agency records. As a result of all these measures, the reliability of recipient reported data was considered high.

Recovery.gov

When Recovery.gov 1.0 went live in February 2009, the only available data to display was agency information on federal contracts from the Federal Procurement Data System and on federal grants and loans displayed on USASpending.gov. Data from the agencies' weekly Financial and Activity Reports and Funding Notification Reports that were being submitted to the General Services Administration was also displayed.

In May 2009, the Board made the decision to rebuild Recovery.gov from the ground up in order to provide a robust system for all the new recipient data. Recovery.gov 2.0 was launched on September 28, 2009, to meet the deadline for displaying the recipient data on October 30, 2009. After the launch, cutting-edge technological improvements were added to address stakeholder feedback and provide context to the data.

Map Gallery

In order to meet the user-friendly requirement of ARRA, all the recipient and agency data was displayed in interactive charts and graphs, but most importantly, the Recipient Project map allowed users to see ARRA funding on a national level and right down into their own neighborhoods. Using an array of filters, the users could look at

awards by state, county, agency, or categories, such as education, energy, and job training.

The Comparison Heat maps displayed the amount of funding against a specific need down to the county level—for example, ARRA funding for unemployment as compared to the levels of unemployment, or the funding for the Community Oriented Policing Service program compared to crime rates.

The Lights On map designed and created by Edward Tufte—appointed by President Obama to the Advisory Board and dubbed the “Galileo of graphics” by *Business Week*—gradually lit up to show the distribution of ARRA awards from February 2009 through December 31, 2013.

Additional Enhancements

The Looking For feature provided direct access for specific users—citizens, press, data mashers—to links that would answer specific questions that the individual group might be looking for. For example, interested citizens could link directly to the map where they could find ARRA funding in their zip codes. The press had access to pages that answered questions about the Board, State Totals by Agency, and a Fact Sheet about ARRA.

To give context to where and how the money was being spent, stories on ARRA projects, such as road, hospital, and high-speed rail construction across the country were featured, along with updates on benefits available under ARRA, including COBRA and unemployment insurance, and the distribution of tax benefits. Inspectors General's reports on the management of ARRA programs by the federal agencies and investigations into fraud related to ARRA funds were also featured.

Recovery.gov Firsts/Awards

In May 2010, the Board moved Recovery.gov to the cloud making it the first government-wide system to do so.

In addition, the site won 14 awards, including Best Government website, and two Official Honoree Webbies.

Social Media

To foster public engagement around the Board's mission and inform the public of issues related to that mission, the Board instituted a strong social media strategy on Twitter, Facebook, Flickr, and YouTube. As of December 31, 2014, Twitter followers numbered more than 32,800 and Facebook fans were close to 7,000.

Conclusion

With end of recipient reporting after the January 2014 reporting period and the Board's term ending on September 30, 2015, this is the final American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 data book that the Board will publish.

SUMMARY OF METHODOLOGY

Report Coverage

The tables in *The American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009—Recipient and Agency Reported Data 2009–2013* are derived from prime recipient reports for contracts, grants, and loans funded by ARRA. Data from sub-recipients or vendors is not included. The data covers awards received between February 17, 2009, and December 31, 2013.

A federal contract is an award made directly to an independent recipient (not a state or government) by a federal agency. A federal grant is financial assistance awarded by a federal agency for a public project or service authorized by federal law. Grants are awarded to government and education organizations, for-profit and nonprofit organizations, small businesses, and individuals on their own behalf through an application process. Federal loans are funds provided to a recipient by a federal agency and will eventually be paid back by the recipient. The federal government issues loans for a variety of purposes including paying for education, providing disaster relief, insuring mortgages, and assisting farmers and rural communities.

Source of Data

The recipient reported data was collected from the Download Center of Recovery.gov on May 1, 2014, to include cumulative data from February 17, 2009, through December 31, 2013. October through December 31, 2013, was the last quarter that recipients of ARRA awards were required to report on the status of their awards.

This dataset contained information submitted by award recipients via FederalReporting.gov. The Data Dictionary (www.recovery.gov/arra/FAQ/OtherDLFiles/Download%20Center%20User%20Guide.pdf) and in the CD-ROM version of this publication, provides the layout and content of the raw data file.

The charts and graphics related to the taxes and entitlements portions of ARRA come from the Office of Tax Analysis at the Department of the Treasury for taxes and the agencies' Financial and Activity Reports for entitlements.

Table Descriptions and Special Notes

All the data displayed in the tables is from the recipient data reported cumulatively from February 17, 2009, through December 31, 2013. October through December 31, 2013, was the last quarter that recipients of ARRA awards were required to report on the status of their awards. The "other" row at the end of Tables 1–10 refers to awards with places of performance outside the United States and its territories. While only U.S. nationals could apply to receive ARRA funds, the expending of the awards could take place internationally.

Table 1: Total Awards

ARRA awards by type (contract/grant/loan) and by geography. Data is rounded to the thousands of dollars.

Table 2: Awards by Awarding Agency

All ARRA awards by major awarding agency and geography. This table was created using the first two digits of the four-

digit awarding agency code in the raw dataset. Awarding agencies that were not listed separately were rolled up into the "Other" column at the end of the table. This procedure was done for Tables 2–5. The list of agencies combined into the "Other" category includes:

- The Legislative Branch
- Government Accountability Office
- Dwight D. Eisenhower Memorial Commission
- Executive Office of the President
- United States Tax Court
- Federal Mediation and Conciliation Service
- State Justice Institute
- Railroad Retirement Board
- Overseas Private Investment Corporation
- Export-Import Bank of the United States
- U.S. Postal Inspection Service
- Other Independent/Small Agencies

Table 3: Contracts by Awarding Agency

ARRA contracts by awarding agency and geography. This table lists only those federal agencies that awarded contracts; therefore, the columns included in this table may differ from those in Tables 2, 4, and 5. Data is rounded to the thousands of dollars.

Table 4: Grants by Awarding Agency

ARRA grants by awarding agency and geography. This table lists only those federal agencies that awarded grants; therefore, the columns included in this table may differ from those in Tables 2, 3, and 5. Data is rounded to the thousands of dollars.

Table 5: Loans by Awarding Agency

ARRA loans by awarding agency and geography. This table lists only those federal agencies that awarded loans; therefore, the columns included in this table may differ from those in Tables 2, 3, and 4. Data is rounded to the thousands of dollars.

Table 6: Award Summary by Congressional District

A summary of ARRA awards by congressional district. Included in the table are the awarded, received, and expended ARRA amounts by the recipients.

This table is based on the congressional district boundaries of the 113th Congress. Data is rounded to the thousands of dollars.

Table 7: Awards by County

A summary of the ARRA awards by county. Recipients were not required to report the place of performance county; therefore, the county information used to create this table was derived from the street address and zip code + 4 of the place of performance as reported by the recipient. When the derived county data conflicted with an element of recipient reported data (state code, country code), we elected to use the recipient reported data and disregarded the derived county information. There were very few awards where

this occurred (approx. 0.035 percent), however, there were instances of awards not being able to be placed into a specific county; therefore, the sum of the counties in Table 7 may not equal the state total.

The U.S. Resident Population information in this table is based on the 2013 population estimates from the U.S. Census Bureau. Monetary data is rounded to the thousands of dollars.

Table 8: Awards With Infrastructure Expenditures
ARRA awards with infrastructure expenditures by grant or loan, and geography. Infrastructure data was required of ARRA grant and loan recipients only. Monetary data is rounded to the thousands of dollars.

Table 9: Jobs by Quarter
Number of jobs reported by recipients for each quarter since October 2009. ARRA required recipients to report jobs “saved or created” by the ARRA award. Following the first reporting cycle in October 2009, OMB changed the definition to mean jobs “funded” by the ARRA award, regardless of whether the employee was an existing employee or newly hired. Recipients calculated the funded jobs in the following manner: if a normal full-time schedule is 40 hours a week, multiply 40 hours x 52 weeks = 2,080 total hours per year; divide 2,080 total hours by 4 to equal 520 regular quarterly hours. If two full-time employees each worked 520 hours (1,040 hours) for the quarter and another half-time employee worked 260 hours, the total hours for the three employees is 1300 (520 + 520 + 260 = 1300); divide 1300 by 520 to equal 2.5 ARRA funded jobs during that quarter. The results generally do not contain whole numbers.

For each quarter, recipients provided the total number of jobs funded by quarter. A job funded in one quarter may or may not be the same job that is funded in the next quarter. For that reason, this data should not be summed up into a cumulative total.

Table 10: Awards by North American Industry Classification System (NAICS) or National Taxonomy of Exempt Entities (NTEE) ARRA awards by the NAICS sector or the NTEE core code.

The NAICS is the standard used by federal statistical agencies to classify business establishments for the purpose of collecting, analyzing, and publishing statistical data related to the U.S. business economy. The NTEE system is used by the Internal Revenue Service and National Center for Charitable Statistics (NCCS) to classify nonprofit organizations. Recipients were allowed to enter up to ten different NAICS or NTEE codes when submitting quarterly reports. Eighty-five percent of recipients chose to enter only one code. Due to the relatively small percentage of those entering multiple codes and the difficulties factoring in multiple activity codes, Table 10 was created using only the first activity code the recipients entered. This was also the case for the data used to create Appendix 1.

Approximately 0.5 percent of recipients entered only a “supporting” NTEE code and did not provide the necessary core code to allow classification of their awards. Supporting NTEE codes provide only target demographic or generic function information and do not provide a descriptive activity area. Awards with supporting codes only were allocated to the “unassigned” column in Table 10 and the “unassigned” row in Appendix 1. Data is rounded to the thousands of dollars.

Special Notes

There was one award with a street address, city, and zip code that conflicted with the state code provided by the recipient. For that record, the state code was changed from ND to MD to correspond to the rest of the information reported by the recipient. This affects Tables 1–10 of this publication.

Noncompliers

Quarterly reporting was mandatory for all prime recipients receiving ARRA awards. The rate of noncompliance since the first reporting period in October 2009 was exceptionally low. In that first reporting period there were 130,000 awards reported on and 4,359 awards that recipients did not report on. In Quarter 4, 2013, the number of awards not reported on had dropped to 312, with only 78 awards that had not been reported on in three or more reporting periods. At the end of each reporting period, the noncompliers list was posted on Recovery.gov.

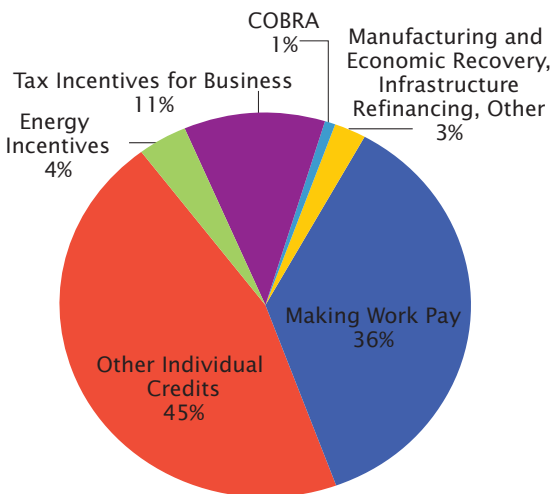

ARRA Tax Benefits

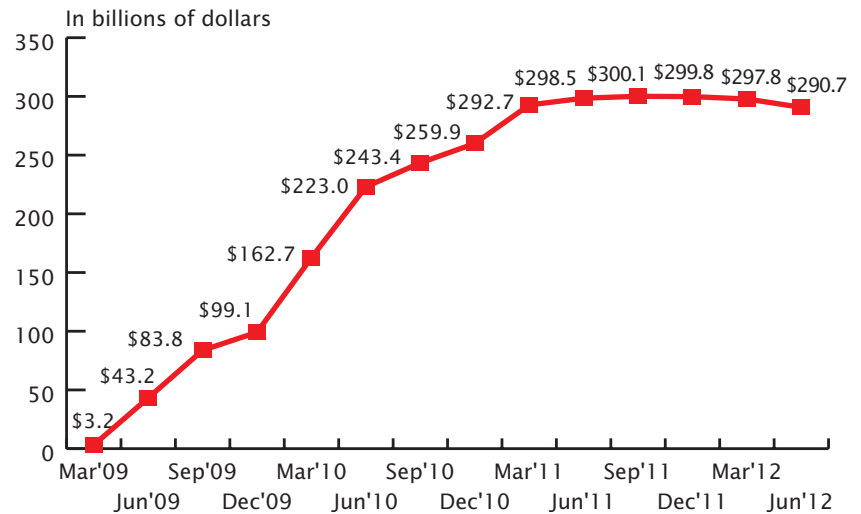
In addition to federal contract, grant, and loan awards and entitlements, Recovery funds are distributed through tax benefits for individuals, businesses, and state and local governments. The First-Time Homebuyers program, credits to businesses for renewable energy facilities, and Build America Bonds are several examples of these tax benefits. Most of the tax credits authorized under the Recovery Act have expired. The Office of Tax Analysis submitted final data as of June 2012.

In addition to federal contract, grant, and loan awards and tax benefits, ARRA funds are distributed through 22 entitlement programs—payments made directly to individuals. The chart below lists how much each entitlement program was estimated to receive:

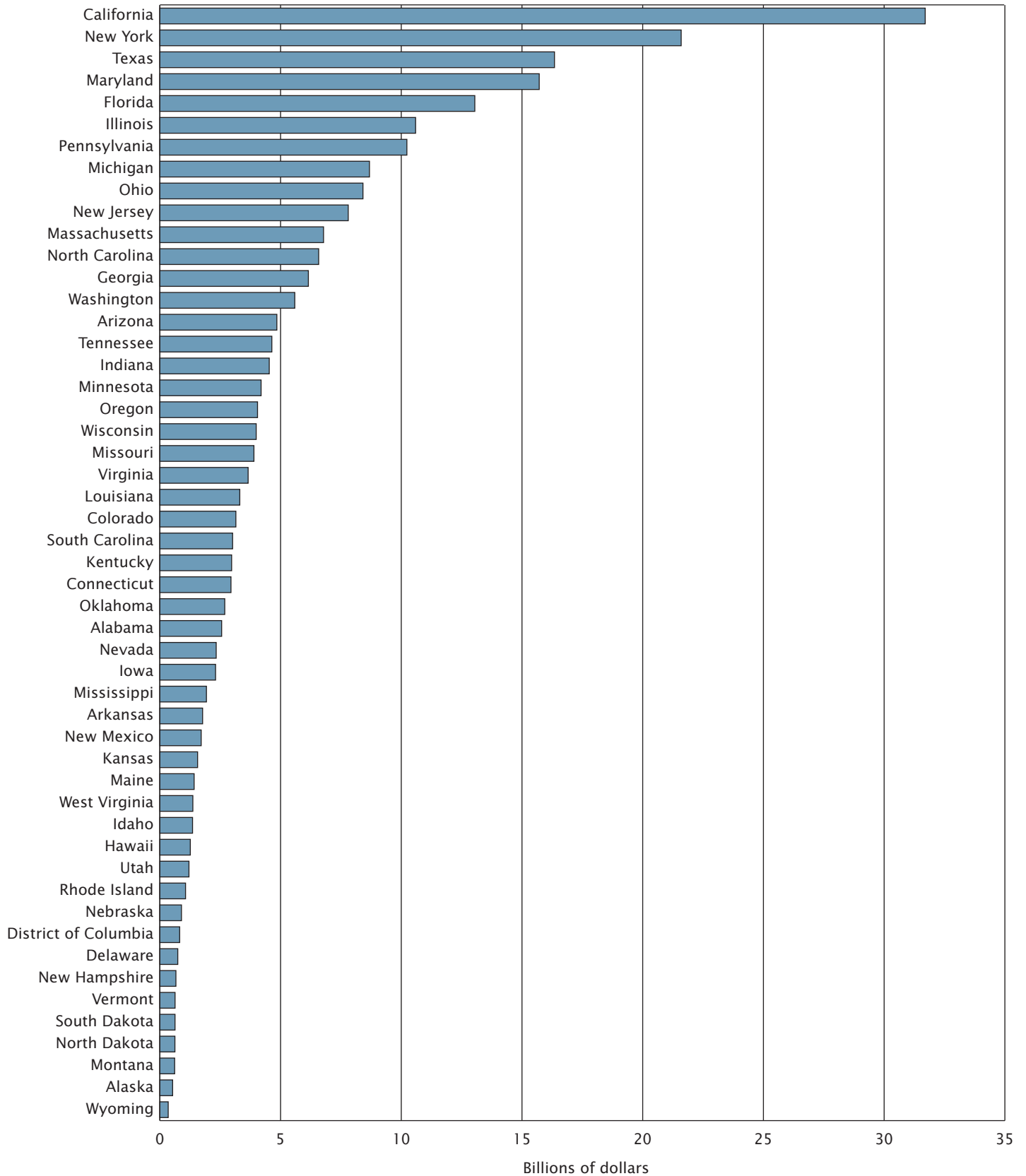

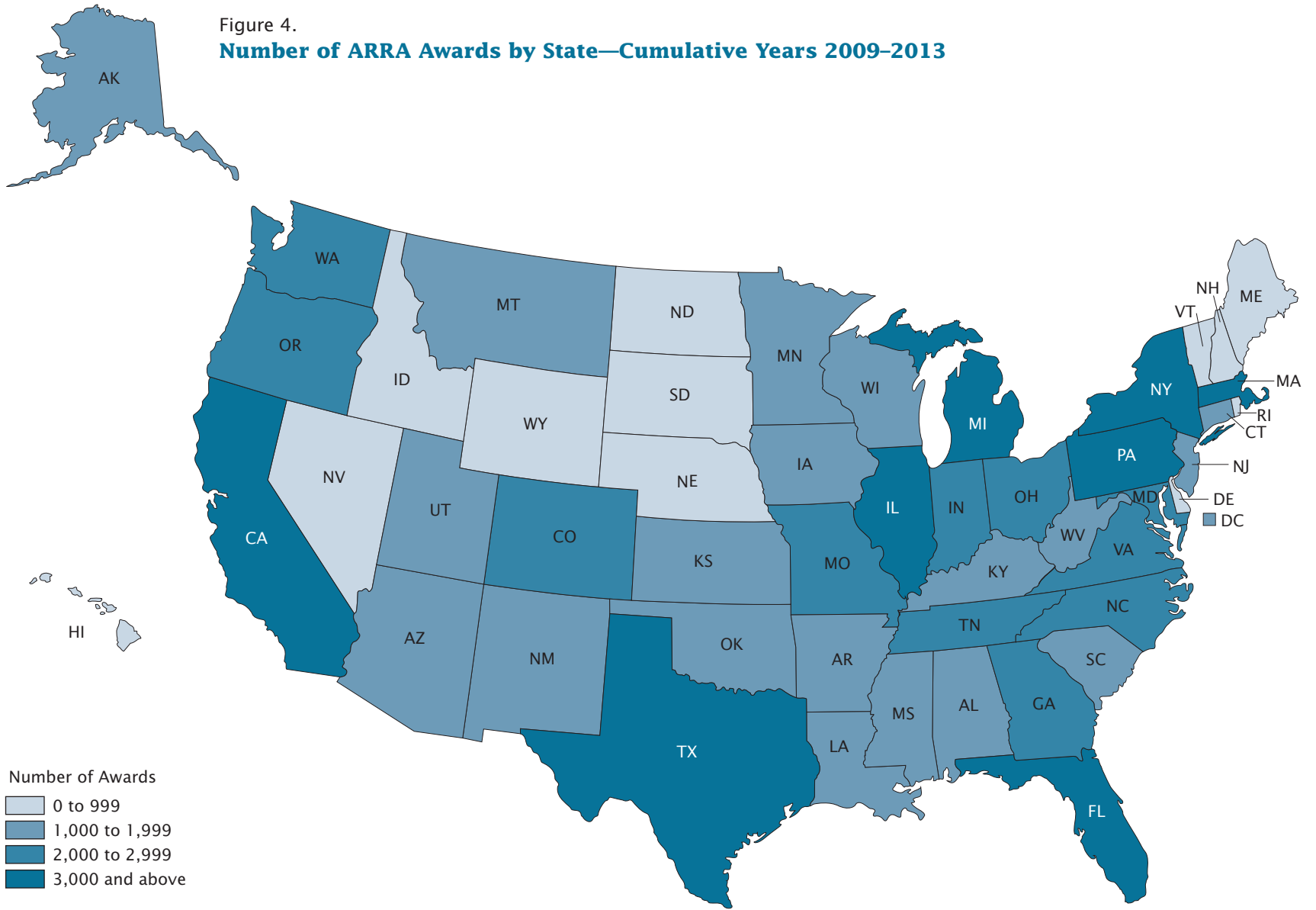

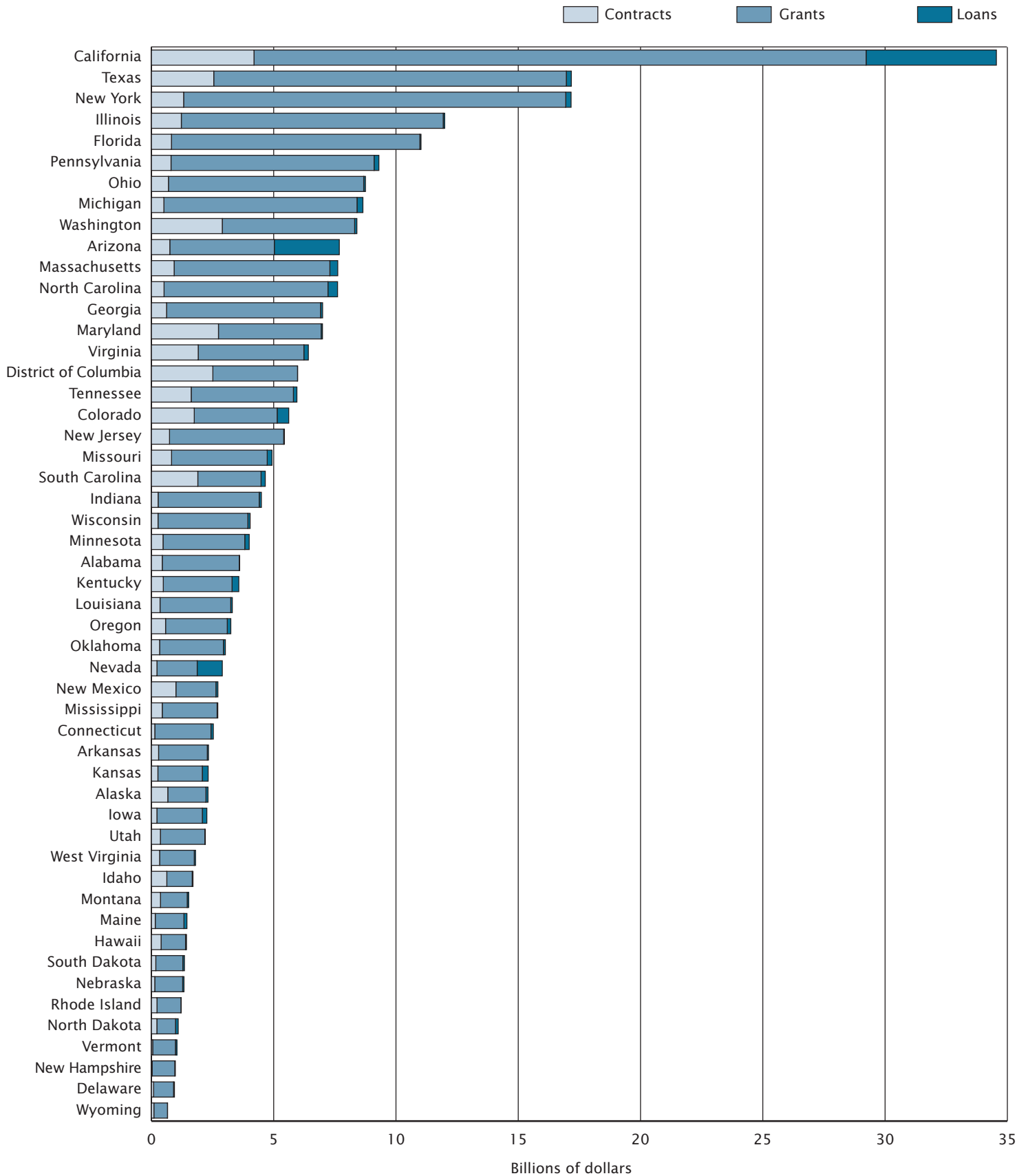

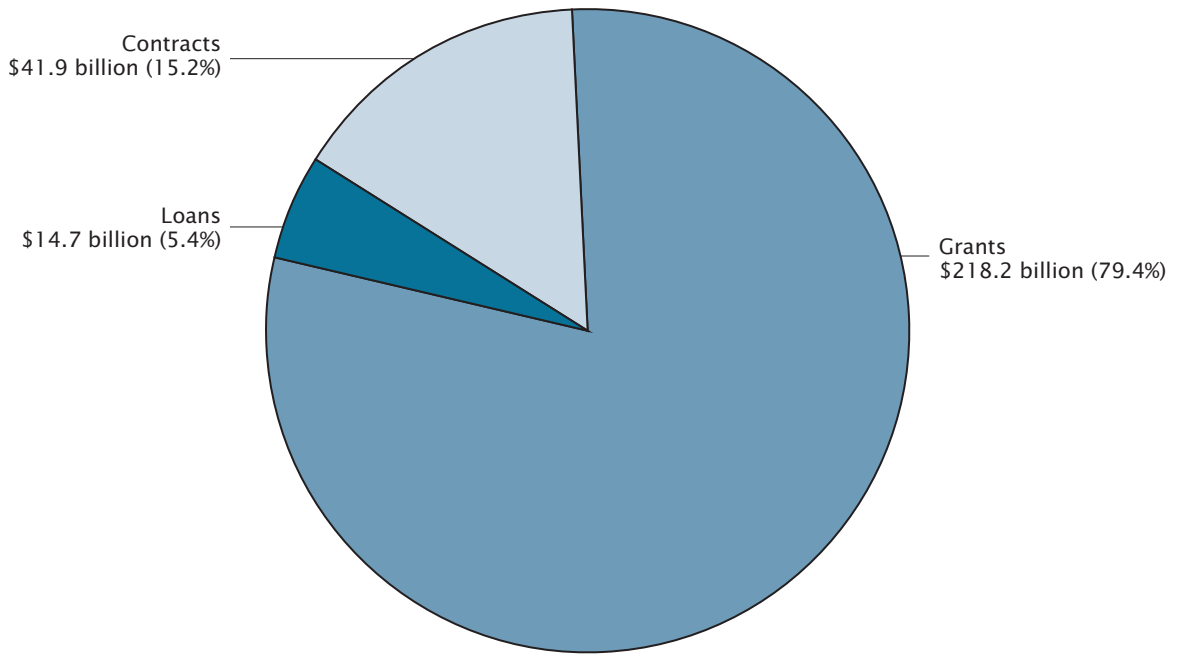

ARRA Award Amounts by State and by Type—Cumulative Years 2009–2013



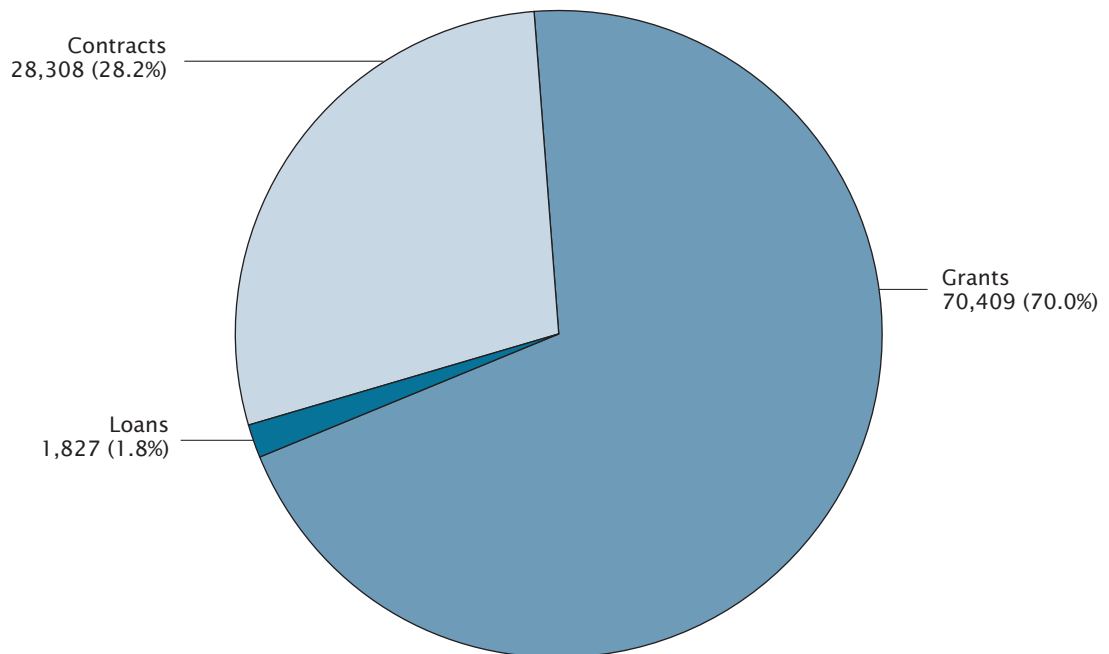

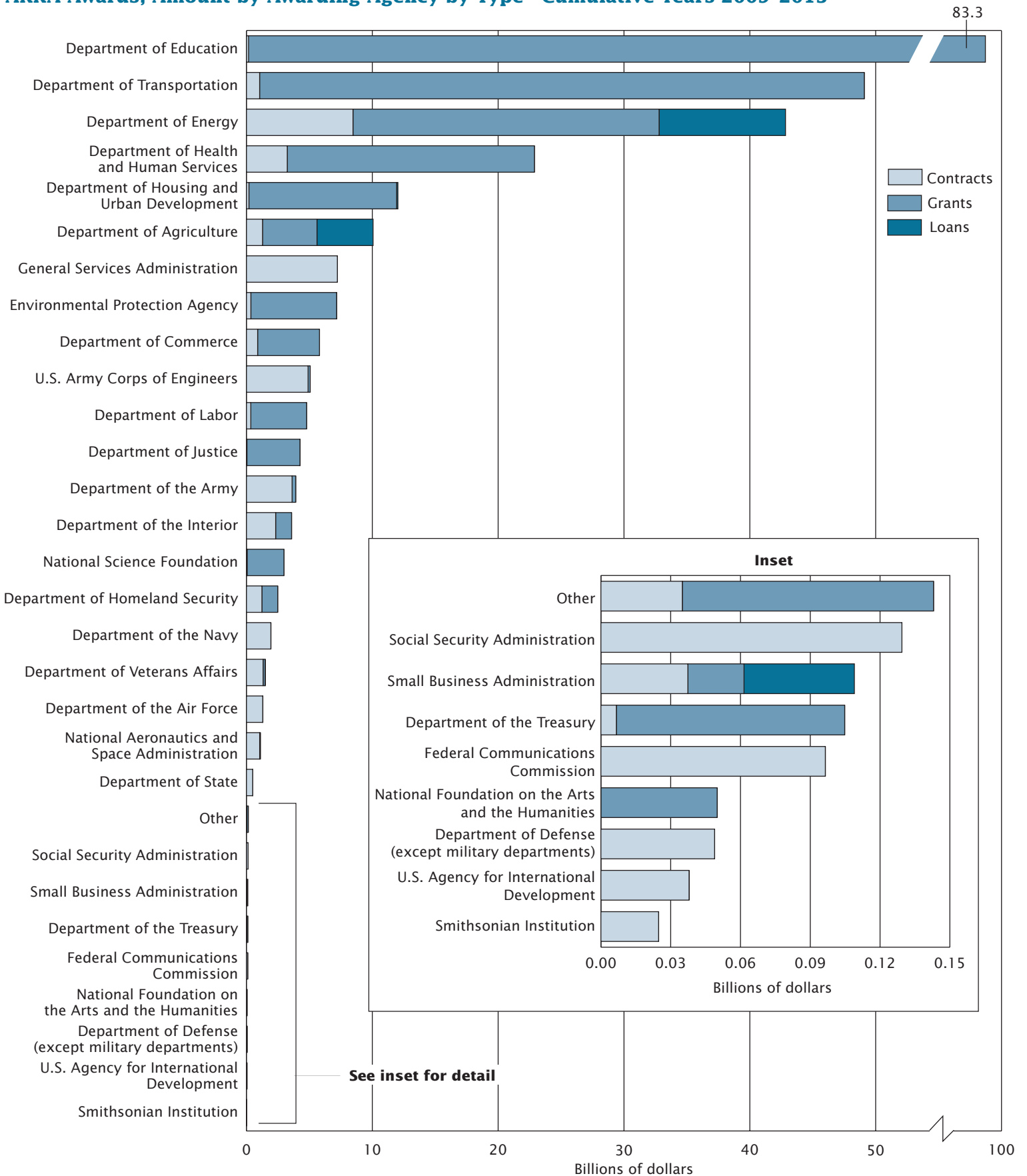

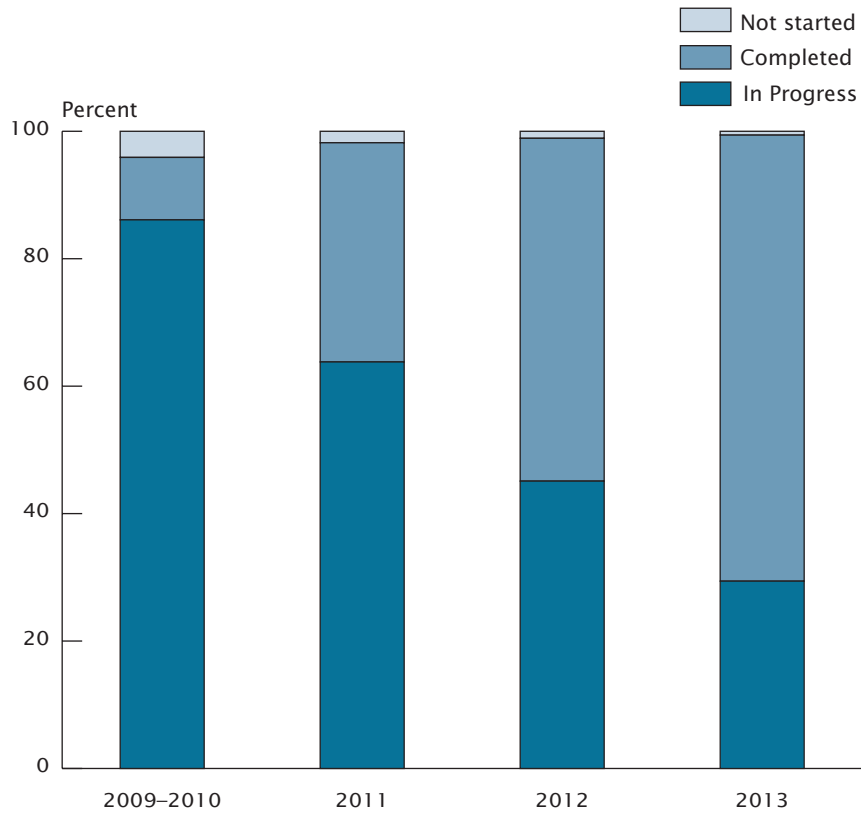

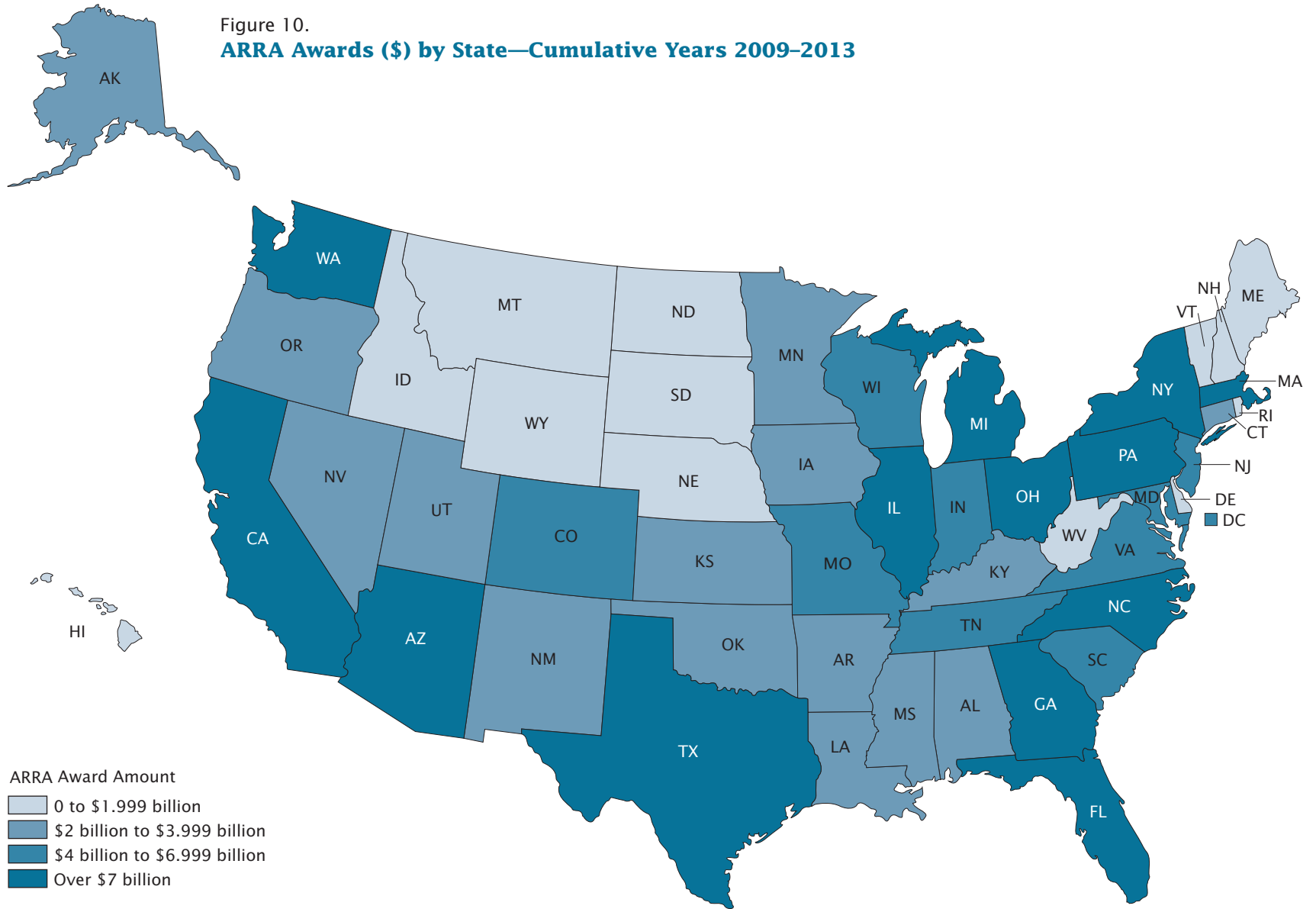

2013 Featured Stories

Recovery Funds Rural Health Care Facilities in Nebraska

1-16-2013

Nearly \$70 million of Recovery awards from the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) have helped build one hospital and funded needed renovations at four others in rural areas of Nebraska with populations of 20,000 or less.

The awards, a mix of Recovery loans and grants, augmented a USDA Rural Development program that has been funding critical access hospitals in rural areas since 2006. The five hospitals bring the program's overall total for Nebraska to 18 that have received federal assistance.

The Recovery-funded facilities are:

- Memorial Community Health, Inc., in Aurora: an \$18.3 million loan and grant combination for additions and renovations;
- Community Hospital, in McCook: \$32 million loan for an addition and renovations;
- Providence Medical Center, in Wayne: a \$6 million loan for an addition and renovations;

- Fillmore County Hospital, in Geneva: \$12.6 million loan to build a new hospital; and
- Rock County Hospital, in Bassett: \$76,830 grant for electronic medical records and generator equipment.



USDA Rural Development officials say that, in addition to improving health care for residents, the hospitals help recruit physicians, nurses, and support staff to their respective regions.

Recovery Funding Helps Build Rail Transit System in Hawaii

1-31-2013

Recovery Act funding is helping build the first rail transit system in Honolulu, one of the worst American cities for traffic congestion.

The 20-mile elevated rail line with 21 stations will connect riders to key education, business, and activity centers in Honolulu. The rail corridor links together West Oahu, Pearl City, Aloha Stadium, Pearl Harbor Naval Base, Honolulu International Airport, downtown Honolulu, and Ala Moana Center, Oahu's largest shopping center. The initial segment of the system, from Kapolei in West Oahu to Aloha Stadium, is slated to open in 2017.

Project officials expect the rail line will serve nearly 80 percent of Oahu's total population, including thousands of workers who commute into Honolulu every day from West Oahu and who will save as much as 30 minutes of drive

time in each direction. An estimated 40,000 vehicles will no longer be on Oahu's roadways once the project is complete and fully operational in 2019.

The Honolulu Authority for Rapid Transportation (HART), the agency overseeing the project, says that initial construction will resume in the fall of 2013, pending completion of archaeological surveys currently underway along the proposed rail corridor. HART suspended construction in late 2012 so the state Historic Preservation Division could review the surveys.



The Department of Transportation's Federal Transit Administration is providing just under \$1.8 billion in federal funds along with \$4 million in Recovery Act funds for the \$5.1 billion project.

San Francisco Highway Project Is Helped by Recovery Money

1-29-2013

Funded in part by more than \$120 million in Recovery money from the Department of Transportation, work is underway to complete the long-needed replacement of a key traffic artery connecting the north end of San Francisco with the Golden Gate Bridge. When finished, the new Presidio Parkway will consist of six lanes, a southbound auxiliary lane, a wider landscaped median, and better pedestrian access and will be, according to officials, safer and have greater capacity than Doyle Drive/Route 101, the 77-year-old road being replaced.

Time and nearly 100,000 drivers a day have taken a heavy toll on Doyle Drive, weakening the surface to the point of being vulnerable to seismic damage, which would force the closure of one of the Bay Area's major traffic corridors.

Local authorities have talked about somehow upgrading Doyle Drive since the 1950s, but only within the last 15 years were plans developed and enough funding amassed for the complex project. Because of the project's location near one of the most iconic bridges in America, as well as the Golden Gate National Recreation Area and the historic structures of the Presidio neighborhood, planners had to focus on designing a new roadway that would have minimal impact on the surrounding area's biological, cultural, and natural resources.

Phase One of construction involved building a temporary bypass, getting traffic off of Doyle Drive and onto a surface that is up to seismic code. Phase Two, now underway, will construct the new parkway. Completion is expected in 2015.

Twelve different funding sources, spanning federal, state, regional, and local governments, are financing the \$1 billion project. The Recovery funding allowed the project to begin a year earlier than planned.

IG Questions \$12 Million in Recovery-Related Costs

2-20-2013

Ineffective management of the Department of Energy's (DOE) Recovery-funded program to modernize the nation's power grid has led the agency's Inspector General (IG) to question more than \$12 million in associated costs, according to a new audit report.

DOE's Smart Grid program received \$4.5 billion in Recovery money—33 times more than the program's normal annual budget—to update the aging national power system with smart technology, such as wireless data networks that will improve efficiency of energy delivery and use. Nearly \$700 million was earmarked to fund proof-of-concept projects around the country.

The DOE IG audited 11 of those projects, involving \$279 million in Recovery funding, and found "weaknesses in financial management and incomplete and insufficient

cyber security plans, potentially jeopardizing achievement of Recovery Act goals."

Auditors concluded that DOE managers had improperly reimbursed project recipients for costs based on estimates rather than hard numbers, resulting in overpayments of approximately \$9.9 million. One recipient received reimbursement for nearly \$2.4 million without providing adequate supporting documentation.

"After being presented with the results of our audit, the Department initiated actions to resolve the \$12.3 million in questioned costs we discovered," the report stated. DOE officials said they were working with recipients to resolve reimbursements based on estimated costs in addition to tightening processes involving adequate supporting documentation.

2013 Featured Stories

Recovery Funds Provide Flood Protection

2-27-2012

A division of the Department of Agriculture (USDA) has used Recovery grants to help prevent chronic flood damage in parts of Tennessee and North Carolina.

In Tennessee, USDA's Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) awarded \$14 million in Recovery funds to remediate flooding that had eroded farmlands and damaged bridges around the town of Ripley. In North Carolina, NRCS awarded almost \$5.3 million to fund the final phase of a project to protect the village of Swan Quarter from flood waters so powerful that they once moved a church off its foundation.

Ripley, Tennessee

Rainstorms dumping water into Cane Creek led to the loss of tons of soil and farmland and also weakened bridges in this southwestern area of the state near Memphis. The \$14 million of Recovery funding was used to repair several degraded bridges, address massive erosion and flooding on prime farmland adjacent to the stream, and prevent flooding of nearby homes and businesses.

Local and state agencies worked with area conservation organizations and landowners to ensure that the project



would be not only thorough but environmentally sound. The nearly four-year project was completed in October 2012. USDA reports that more than 1,000 acres of prime farmland have been protected and six bridges rehabilitated.

Swan Quarter, North Carolina

This coastal village has a long history of flooding caused by heavy rains and storm surges. Indeed, in 1876, massive flooding lifted a newly built church from its foundation on a lot that had actually been the builders' second choice for location; the waters carried the church through town and deposited it on the patch that had been the builders' first choice because of its higher elevation.

Work on improving Swan Quarter's flood protections—building more dykes and tide gates, for example—originally began in 1965, but insufficient funding caused the project to drag. In 2002, county and state officials partnered with NRCS to upgrade the original plans. However, funding issues persisted, forcing the project to be completed in phases. Recovery Act



funding has allowed the 13th (and final) phase of the project to begin. Ultimately, total protections will include approximately 20 miles of dykes, 3 miles of waterway improvements, and 28 tide gates.

Research for Alcoholism Treatments Aided by Recovery Funds

3-13-2013

Medical research funded by the Recovery Act has identified a genetic link that could prove effective in treating alcoholism, a disease that afflicts 8 million Americans.

With the help of a \$2.5 million grant from the Department of Health and Human Services, scientists at the Mayo Clinic explored why only some alcoholics respond positively to acamprosate, a drug that reduces alcohol cravings by maintaining the brain's chemical balance during withdrawal.

Suspecting a genetic influence of some sort, researchers conducted experiments that revealed a particular gene affects the response to acamprosate.

The gene makes a protein called ENT1 that controls the flow of a chemical in and out of brain cells in response to alcohol. Everyone has the protein, but some people have a variation of it. Those who have a variation, the researchers found, are more likely to become alcoholics.

Experiments in mice revealed that acamprosate worked most effectively in reducing alcohol consumption in mice that lacked ENT1, but had no effect on mice that did have the ENT1 protein. Also, magnetic resonance imaging of the mice's brain area affected by addiction called the nucleus accumbens—which can't be imaged in humans—showed that acamprosate had a different effect on that area in mice lacking ENT1 than those having it.

The researchers also found that mice without ENT1 and people with the specific variant of ENT1 are more prone to the dangerous seizures that can accompany alcohol withdrawal in lifelong heavy drinkers.

Scientists believe the results of the research will help lead to development of treatments that will be more individualized and targeted, and thus more successful.

Recovery Tax Credits for Clean Energy

3-20-2013

The Department of Energy (DOE) and the U.S. Treasury recently announced that \$150 million in tax credits are available for clean energy manufacturers. The credits are part of the Advanced Energy Manufacturing Tax Credits program that provided nearly \$300 billion total in tax breaks and benefits.

Created by the Recovery Act, the program supports manufacturing of a range of clean energy products, from renewable energy equipment to energy efficiency products to advanced energy storage and carbon capture technology. The goal is to promote investment in domestic clean energy and energy efficiency manufacturing facilities through a competitively awarded 30 percent investment tax credit, which companies must apply for.

Ultimately, the program is intended to boost U.S. competitiveness in the global pursuit of clean energy, DOE officials said.

The initial round of awards in 2009 provided \$2.3 billion in credits to 183 projects across the country. However, because some projects did not go forward or changed scope, \$150 million was effectively left unused.

DOE said these remaining tax credits will be allocated based on the following: commercial viability, domestic job creation, technological innovation, speed of project completion, and potential for reducing air pollution and greenhouse gas emissions. Details are available on the IRS website.

Recovery Board Tracks Hurricane Sandy Relief Spending

4-11-2013

When the Disaster Relief Appropriations Act (H.R. 152) to aid the victims of Hurricane Sandy was passed and signed by the President in January 2013, Congress directed the Recovery Board to “develop and use information technology resources and oversight mechanisms to detect and remediate waste, fraud, and abuse” in the awarding and spending of the funds.

As part of this new oversight mission, the Board has begun posting on Recovery.gov information and data on the federal funds that 19 federal agencies are awarding through existing programs in the form of contracts, grants, and loans. To date, the Board has collected initial data on contract awards. As more awards are disbursed and states begin spending the funding, the Board will display that data as well.

In addition to the \$50.5 billion H.R. 152 bill passed in January, Congress also passed and the President signed H.R. 41 designating \$9.7 billion to increase the borrowing authority of FEMA for the National Flood Insurance Program. H.R. 152 provided emergency-relief funding to 19 federal agencies.

So far, FEMA has already paid out approximately \$9.4 billion to cover flood insurance and relief claims. The Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) has announced the first allocation of \$5.4 billion of the \$16 billion appropriation in Community Development Block Grants for disaster relief. The funds will be distributed when HUD approves the states’ respective internal plans for spending the money.

Congressional Redistricting Reflected on Recovery.gov

4-30-2013

As required by the Constitution, congressional districts were redrawn to reflect results of the 2010 Census and took effect with the start of the 113th Congress in January of this year. When Recovery recipients reported on their awards during the April reporting period, they were required to report the redrawn congressional districts for the place of performance for the project.

Reports submitted prior to April were not updated or changed because they accurately reflect the districts at the time of submission. Similarly, recipient reports for projects marked final and complete prior to April will not have updated congressional districts.

The maps will all reflect the new districts, but when drilling down to the Award Summary and in the National Cumulative file, it is very possible that you will see different congressional districts for the same Recovery-funded

project. For example, a recipient report filed for the final quarter of 2012 may show on the Award Summary or the National Cumulative file that the project is located in the state’s 2nd district; the Quarter 1, 2013, report for the same ongoing project may now list the project as being located in the 4th district, accurately reflecting the redistricting.

Finally, with redistricting some states lost districts, so reports filed in previous quarters may list a congressional district that no longer exists; conversely, some states gained districts, so recipient reports posted on or after April 30 will list congressional districts that did not exist previously.

The Recovery Board obtained multiple reference databases to ensure that the congressional districts shown on Recovery.gov accurately reflect all redistricting as it appears on Recovery.gov.

Total of Completed Prime Recovery Awards Surpasses 83,000

5-8-2013

At the close of April 2013 reporting period, prime recipients had submitted a total of 83,160 final reports on their respective Recovery awards—more than 80 percent of the total 101,672 prime recipient Recovery awards.

Work on the projects funded by the awards has been completed, and no additional reports on the project or award status will be submitted.

The table below shows the number of final prime recipient reports that have been submitted quarterly since the inception of the Recovery initiative. (Sub-recipient reports are not included.)

The Recovery Board instituted a reconciliation process for reports that have been marked final and complete. The process gives the recipients the opportunity to make any final corrections to their reports and the agencies the opportunity to identify the recipients that have completed all work and will not be reporting again.

Indicted: Six Individuals and One Corporation

5-22-2013

Law enforcement authorities have conducted 464 prosecutions involving alleged fraud of stimulus funds since the Recovery Act was signed into law in February 2009. Recently, six individuals and one corporation were indicted with defrauding the U.S. government of almost \$1 million of Recovery money.

The defendants include a corporate CEO and a Salvation Army case worker. All investigations involved the relevant Office of Inspector General (IG) working jointly with state, local, or other federal authorities in different locations.

Guam

In January 2010, HUBTEC International Corporation received a contract from the Department of Transportation (DOT) for \$1.8 million—\$1.4 million of which was Recovery Act funds—to reconstruct and rehabilitate culverts along Guam's Route 2. The contract stipulated that HUBTEC comply with the Buy America requirement that all steel and iron used in the project be manufactured in the United States.

But DOT IG investigators working together with the Federal Bureau of Investigation concluded that HUBTEC and its chief executive officer and project manager, Young C. Kim, falsely represented that the company had used U.S.-made reinforcement steel bars for the project, when they had knowingly used Korean-made reinforcement steel bars.

Moreover, investigators said they uncovered evidence of a fraudulent billing scheme with Kim allegedly submitting inflated invoices for material to DOT. According to DOT IG, "The overall loss to the government is estimated to be \$913,277.79."

On April 25, 2012, a federal grand jury indicted HUBTEC and Kim on multiple counts of fraud.

Texas

A county official and a case manager for the Salvation Army were also indicted in April for felony theft of Recovery Act money intended to help prevent homelessness. The Texas Attorney General's Office said that Felecia Gonzalez, a county coordinator for the Community Council of South Texas, and Channan Cardella, a case manager at the Salvation Army, were charged with "defrauding a federal

program that was intended to serve financially challenged families and prevent homelessness. Rather than helping the poor, the defendants allegedly orchestrated a scheme to divert taxpayer dollars into their own pocketbooks."

Gonzalez and Cardella were employed by local nonprofit agencies that help needy people obtain funds from a federal grant assisting near-homeless individuals and families secure an apartment. According to investigators with the Department of Housing and Urban Development IG, Gonzalez and Cardella created phony grant applications using actual applicants' names, dates of birth, and Social Security numbers.

The defendants then hired third parties to pose as landlords who received the federal grant funds from the forged applications, authorities said. The "landlords" and the defendants allegedly divided and kept the money for themselves. Investigators estimate the scheme defrauded taxpayers of approximately \$40,000.

Florida

Three Florida residents were indicted separately on the same charges—fraudulently obtaining unemployment insurance payments from a Recovery-funded program. According to U.S. Attorney Robert E. O'Neill, defendants Roseland Redding, Nicole Cannon, and Miguel Pabon, all of Orlando, could each be facing as many as 10 years in prison for their alleged crimes.

Redding was charged in January 2012 with fraudulently taking more than \$27,000 in unemployment payments, Cannon with more than \$10,000, and Pabon with \$1,650. The funds allegedly stolen were federal funds related to the Extended Unemployment Compensation Account, part of the Recovery Act or stimulus initiative.

State authorities worked with investigators from the Department of Labor's IG.

Indictments are merely formal charges that a defendant has committed a violation of the federal criminal laws. Every defendant is presumed innocent unless, and until, proven guilty.

Board Staff Exports Insight on Transparency

6-5-2013

Since its inception in February 2009, the Recovery Accountability and Transparency Board (the Board) has met with delegations from many foreign countries, including Brazil, Argentina, Northern Ireland, and Russia, as well as the British House of Commons, to provide insight to the Board's transparency and accountability missions. In May 2013, Board staff, for the first time, was invited to visit a foreign country to provide expertise on transparency and on the building of a transparency website.

In May, 2013, the U.S. State Department asked the Board to assist in the development of a transparency project that the State Department had initiated in Honduras. With funding by the State Department, the Board sent two senior staff members to Tegucigalpa, Honduras, to meet with the Comité Técnico de Fedecomiso (CTF). The CTF is the commission overseeing distribution of funds collected through a security tax passed in early 2011 to help prevent and ultimately stop the pervasive violence in the country. Providing transparency on the management of those funds is a priority for the CTF.

Nancy DiPaolo, the Board's Chief of Congressional and Intergovernmental Affairs, and Alice Siempelkamp,

Assistant Director of Recovery.gov, visited Honduras and shared their expertise and lessons learned about transparency and about the creation of Recovery.gov. They also offered detailed suggestions on how the CTF could best implement a transparency website tailored to its objectives.

The CTF transparency website was successfully launched on Friday, May 24. Ms. DiPaolo and Ms. Siempelkamp will continue to coordinate with the State Department on future consultations with the CTF as the website is expanded and data is collected.

System Glitch Increases Number of Noncompliers

6-26-2013

In the most recent reporting period, a glitch in the System for Award Management (SAM) caused an increase in the quarterly total of Recovery awards not reported on, as required by the Recovery Act.

For Quarter 1, 2013 (January 1–March 31), a total of 456 Recovery awards were not reported on; for Q4 2012, the total was just under 300. The number of awards not reported on has been steadily decreasing since the first quarterly reporting period in October 2009. The number spiked for the Quarter 1, 2013 reporting period because SAM effectively prevented some recipients from submitting reports.

In order to submit electronic reports, recipients must have a valid, up-to-date Central Contractor Registration (CCR)

number—required to do business with the federal government—normally obtainable via the SAM. Because of a problem with the SAM system, recipients who either needed to renew an expired CCR number or who were trying to obtain one for the first time were unsuccessful and were therefore unable to report.

The General Services Administration, which administers the SAM system, is reviewing the entire system to determine the exact problem. Also under review are possible improvements to responsiveness by the SAM Help Desk and online error messages that are more readily understandable and helpful to system users.

2013 Featured Stories

Data Sharing Can Prevent Fraud

7-24-2013

Earlier this year, the Recovery Accountability and Transparency Board, along with the Government Accountability Office (GAO), and the Council of the Inspectors General on Integrity and Efficiency (CIGIE), convened a data forum to explore how data analytics can assist in the prevention and detection of fraud waste and abuse. Representatives from federal, state, and local government agencies, as well as the private sector participated in open discussions to identify the most-significant challenges to realizing the potential of data analytics and actions that the government can take to address these challenges.

The formal report was just released outlining the challenges and opportunities for accessing, using, and sharing available government data.

Among the challenges cited by the participants were:

- The amount of available data can be overwhelming and developing a strategy to prioritize limited resources is difficult;
- There are legal implications to owning and maintaining data;
- Statutory requirements, such as the Computer Matching Act, place procedural hurdles on agencies wishing to match data from one government database to another government database.
- A lack of uniform data standards makes it difficult for entities to share data across the federal government, as well as with state and local government agencies.

- The cost of for an agency to obtain another agency's dataset can be prohibitive.
- There is limited coordination between federal, state and local oversight entities, which leads to missed opportunities and redundancy in auditing activities.

Participants also noted, however, that there are opportunities to enhance data access and sharing such as:

- Consolidating datasets and data analytics operations at one location under the auspices of one group to eliminate duplication of efforts.
- Using open-source analytical tools and techniques to decrease costs, and at the same time, allow for adjustments to meet the needs of the individual agencies.

In January, the Recovery Board's mandate was expanded to prevent waste, fraud, and abuse in Hurricane Sandy funds. Data-sharing issues become front and center as the Board, OIGs, and other oversight officials strive to protect taxpayers' money and accomplish the critical re-building of the impacted states after the storm.

Forum participants suggested the next steps that could be taken would be to compile a directory of all data sources and open source analytics. CIGIE and the Board agreed to co-lead the effort. In addition, CIGIE will develop legislative proposals to address the statutory challenges; and, GAO, will develop best practices to sharing data across federal, state, and local governments.

Quarter 3, 2013 Data Is Posted

10-31-2013

The American Reinvestment and Recovery Act of 2009 (the Act) requires prime recipients of Recovery contract, grant, and loan awards to report every quarter on how the funding is being spent, the sub-recipients, and how many jobs were funded in the quarter. The Recovery Accountability and Transparency Board (the Board), which was created by the Act, collects all the data that recipients report and displays it on Recovery.gov.

Recipients reported in October 2013 for the seventeenth time since the Act was signed into law on February 17, 2009. There were 13,075 prime award reports and 36,452 subaward reports submitted during the reporting period, with 72,782 jobs funded during the third quarter of 2013. All the data collected on the awards was posted in charts, graphs, and maps on October 30, 2013.

Although the Act did not provide a final quarter for recipients to report, and because Congress has not passed legislation to end reporting, the Office of Management and Budget's guidance on reporting remains in effect and recipients with open awards will continue to report until further notice.

Reporting for Quarter 4, 2013 will take place from January 1, 2014 through January 14, 2014. ARRA Provides Funding for Smart Grid Technology

12-20-2013

The United States Department of Energy (DOE) and the electricity industry have made significant investments in approximately 100 Smart Grid Investment Grant (SGIG) projects since the program's inception in 2009. The SGIG program is a cost-shared initiative intended to accelerate the development of a smarter and more efficient electric grid through the use of Smart Grid technologies. The Recovery Act provided



\$3.4 billion toward to the total \$7.9 billion invested in the program. The federal funds are matched on a one-to-one basis (at a minimum) with private sector resources.

For decades, utility companies have relied on a workforce to visit homes and businesses to read meters, check for broken equipment, and measure voltage. Smart Grid technology gathers data from sensors in the field and communicates the information to the utility's operations center. The computerization presents significant costs savings to businesses and consumers.

A recent Smart Grid Progress Report issued by DOE indicates that the majority of the SGIG projects are expected to complete equipment installations in 2013. More than

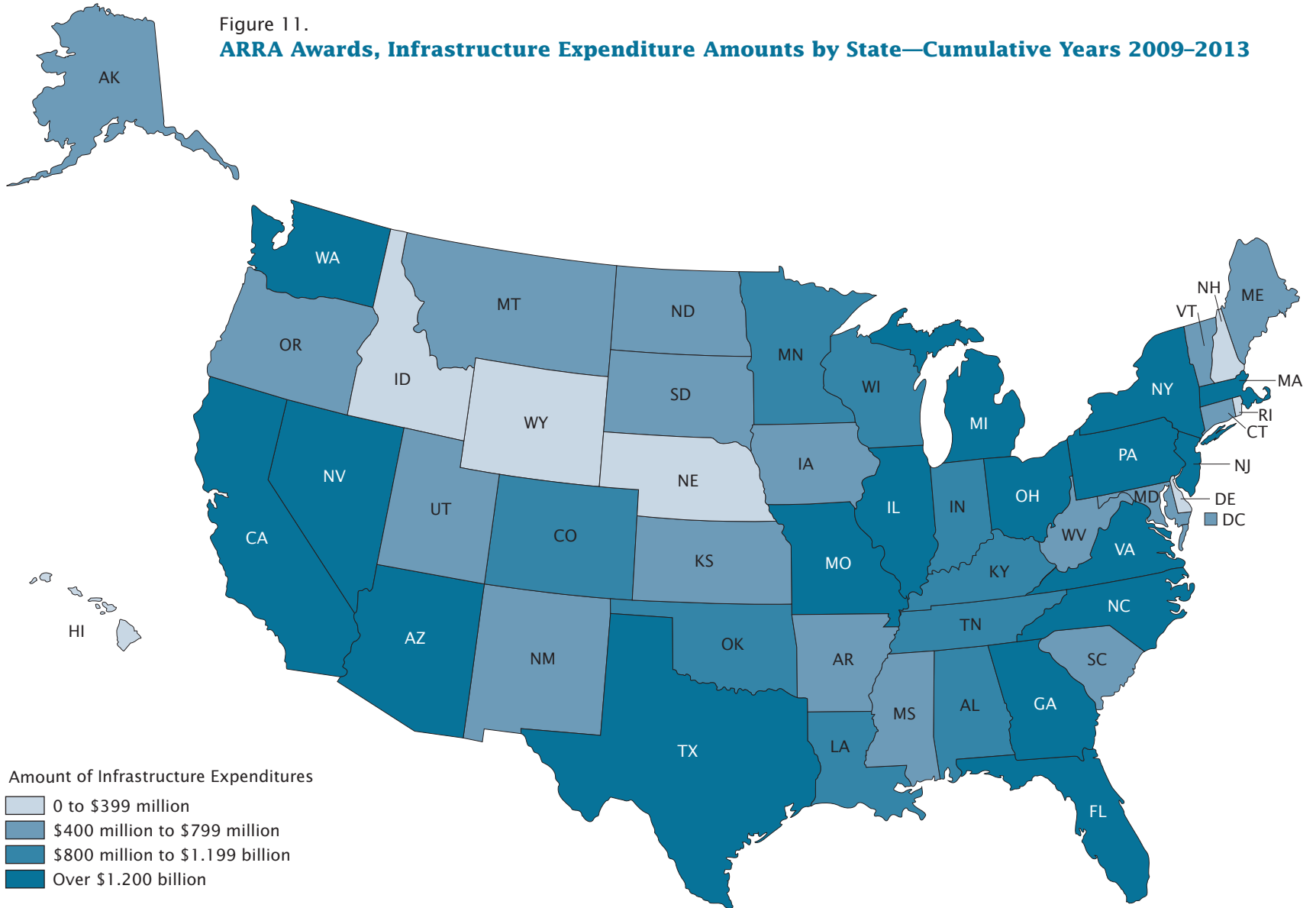
three-quarters of SGIG projects have reported completing 70 percent of their project's overall tasks. As of October 2013, 14.2 million smart meters have been installed accounting for 92 percent of the program's goal of 15.5 million installations at program completion.

The report also called attention to several accomplishments of the SGIG program:

- Newly installed technology has allowed grid operators to see and correct for disturbances before they become serious issues.
- Automated feeder switches and supporting sensors, communications equipment, and control systems have resulted in shorter and less frequent outages, in turn helping eliminate the added costs of an outage.
- Advancements in voltage controls have led to increased energy savings.
- Installation of smart meters has helped eliminate the costs of meter reading with an initial savings ranging from 13 to 77 percent.

Smart meters are a key element that allow all of the emerging Smart Grid technologies to function together. To see quarterly reports on installations and costs as the SGIG program nears project completion, visit www.smartgrid.gov.
