



The Career Center provides the following services to students in all degree Programs. In-class presentations and guest lectures are offered on career-related topics including Career Readiness, Resume Writing, Finding a Job on Campus, Job Search Strategies, and Interviewing Skills. Career Advisors and Career Peer Advisors assist students in career exploration and research, resume writing, interview preparations, career transitions, and general job search strategies. A web-based job listings system (Eagle Network) contains current part time, internship and full-time job vacancy announcements from campus offices and UNT-friendly employers. The Counseling and Testing Service (CTS) has a staff of licensed psychologists, counselors, and doctoral students who offer assistance with social/family/ relationship difficulties; psychological problems such as loneliness or depression; crisis counseling and referrals; and career counseling and testing. Students may see a therapist for short term therapy, after which referrals will be made for longer-term counseling if needed.

Appointments should be made in advance and confidentiality is assured. In addition to vocational interest, aptitude, personality and other tests used in counseling. CTS also serves as a national testing center and computer based testing site for the GRE, TOEFL, CLEP, and Accuplacer. Information and application forms for various national and state tests are available in the center's office. Call CTS for more information or encourage individuals to call or stop by to make an appointment.

The Dean of Students (DOS) Office fosters the development of leadership, civility, accountability, and responsibility in UNT students; builds community through service and involvement; and serves as an advocate for all students. This office is dedicated to supporting the UNT student who may need assistance in resolving complex personal and academic matters. We strive to help all students achieve their academic and personal goals and enhance the UNT student experience. In addition, the Office provides assistance to students seeking solutions with personal, medical, or family issues and emergencies.

Student-Initiated Withdrawals

Students needing to drop all of their courses for the semester may visit the Dean of Students (DOS) Office during office hours for assistance. After the census date (12th class day during long semesters), undergraduate students must meet with a DOS staff member during office hours to complete their withdrawal.

During the meeting students will:

• Be advised of implications of withdrawal.

- Be informed of any obligations they may have with UNT or need to fulfill prior to withdrawing.
- Complete the withdrawal form and other necessary documents. The DOS
 Office can only withdraw students from the first class day until the official
 last day to withdraw as set by the University calendar. Prior to the first class
 day, students wishing to cancel their courses for the semester must contact
 the Registrar's Office. After the last day to withdraw, students must seek out
 their Academic Dean for possible approval for a late withdrawal.

The Office of Disability Accommodation (ODA) at the University of North Texas exists to prevent discrimination on the basis of disability and to help students reach a higher level of independence. Many assume that our office only helps people who use wheelchairs, students who are blind or deaf etc. Most students we work with have invisible conditions like depression, ADHD, and learning disabilities. Depending on your individual accommodation needs, our most common reasonable modifications include more time on exams, distraction reduced testing rooms, help acquiring class notes, and referral to our student support partners across campus. Our caring and professional staff helps students learn more about their disabilities, develop techniques to facilitate individual learning styles, plus you'll learn how to talk to faculty and staff about your accommodation needs and develop compensation strategies to achieve goals.

The Office of Outreach leads college awareness and targeted recruitment initiatives for the University of North Texas and impacts underrepresented students along the P-20 education pipeline: elementary, middle, high school, undergraduate and graduate students. Our programs are available in English and Spanish. Outreach coordinates underrepresented student recruitment efforts, on-campus recruitment initiatives and develops strategic alliances with schools and community leaders to recruit quality and diverse students that mirror the college eligible student populations of Dallas/Fort Worth and Texas. Our high school awareness initiatives impact over 10,000 students (and parents) through one-on-one mentoring, classroom presentations, group workshops, and tours of UNT. The UNT G-Force Mentor/Go Center Outreach initiative serves 12 area high schools helping students navigate the college and financial aid applications process. Early Year Recruitment initiatives serve students in grades 3-9. ELITE (Early Learning Initiative Toward Education) Experiences serve as a dent Affairs platform for exploring UNT's majors and academic initiatives, career exploration, and college knowledge. ELITE Mentors lead more than 14,000 students in college awareness workshops, tours of UNT and residence halls and mock professor lectures. The Multicultural Scholastic Award (MSA) Program is a retention and scholarship initiative for academically talented undergraduate and araduate students from diverse backgrounds. MSA Scholars receive \$1000 per year as an undergraduate student and \$1500 for graduate students.

Student Money Management Center (SMMC) supports a culture of financial empowerment and lifelong learning that enhances the student experience. The SMMC exists to streamline all money management education services under the oversight of one dedicated office serving as a single point entry to eliminate frustrations and confusion among students seeking support, counsel and advice. The SMMC offers both on-campus students and distant learners personalization and customization that utilize technology and innovative customer practices. The SMMC staff members and peer mentors provide students with online resources, workshops, outreach activities, and personal consultations that promote lifelong learning to empower students to manage their money with increased knowledge, applicable skills, and greater confidence. The center also manages several alternative loan programs to help eligible students address unanticipated or emergency related expenses threatening their immediate enrollment.

Campus-Wide Events and Traditions. There are several large events during the school year, all of which are free to UNT students. One of our biggest events is Mean Green Fling, at which various student organizations, university departments, and community vendors come together to greet students as they start a new school year. Additionally, we work with students to plan a number of activities, including Bonfire and the parade, for Homecoming Week, EarthFest, and University Day, among others.

Off-Campus Student Services. Student Financial Aid and Scholarships (SFAS) at the University of North Texas (UNT) is committed to helping students identify and obtain the financial resources available to assist with their education-related expenses. A variety of assistance is available, including grants, work-study programs, loans, and scholarships for students who meet the criteria. SFAS is located on the first and second levels of the Eagle Student Services Center (ESSC). Financial Aid Advisors are available to assist students Monday through Friday from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. After hours and on weekends, students may utilize self-service options such as myUNT, unt. edu/askunt, and Financial Aid Television at financialaid.unt.edu. Students may be surprised to find out how much assistance is available, regardless of their families' income level. Find out what is available by completing the annual Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA), the annual General Scholarship Application; and exploring on-campus job opportunities.

The Student Health and Wellness Center (SHWC) provides primary medical care as well as laboratory, pharmacy, digital radiology, and allergy injection services. Nutrition, psychiatric and travel consultations are also available. Office visits and primary medical care are available without charge to enrolled students during the Fall and Spring semesters, as well as Summer sessions if the student is enrolled in Summer classes. However, ancillary services and specialty office visits, such as laboratory tests and psychiatry appointments, will incur charges. Continuing students not enrolled in a Summer session may also use the SHWC, though they will be required to pay a small use fee. Students can schedule appointments quickly and often same-day by calling 940-565-2333 or stopping by the SHWC during clinic hours. Students can also make appointments online 24 hours a day at myOSH.unt.edu.

The SHWC will not provide students with routine medical excuses for a missed class; however, a student may request an appointment verification form after an office visit that confirms the date and time of their appointment. Appointment verification forms can be given to faculty members or employers at the patient's discretion.

Also available at the SHWC is the Meadows Center for Health Resources (MCHR), which coordinates health education and peer health educator programs and houses the Condom Club, free HIV screenings and massage therapy. Please call 940-565-2787 for more information about the MCHR services and appointment scheduling. Please note fees are charged for massage appointments, but most other services are paid for by the medical services fee. For emergency medical care, call 911. The SHWC is closed between semesters and during official UNT holidays. If you find yourself in need of medical treatment when the SHWC is closed, please call the 24 hour nurse hot line at 800-556-1555 to receive guidance on whether you need to seek treatment from a hospital or urgent Student Affairscare clinic. If so, please see the list of area hospitals and clinics below.

The University of North Texas is home to five TRIO programs serving traditionally underrepresented and at-risk students. These outreach and student support programs, federally funded by the U.S. Department of Student Affairs Education, assist students to progress through the academic pipeline from middle school to post-baccalaureate programs.

Talent Search. (2011-2016) UNT's two Talent Search programs increase high school graduation and postsecondary enrollment by assisting middleand high-school students in Tarrant, Cooke, Denton and Wise counties with college selection, admission and the financial aid processes.

Upward Bound. (2012-2017) UNT's Upward Bound program increases the rates at which participants enroll in and graduate from institutions of postsecondary education by enhancing their academic and personal preparation for college. Participants attend academic enrichment programs at UNT on the weekends and during the summer.

Upward Bound Math and Science. (2009-2013 and 2013-2017) UNT's Upward Bound Math and Science program (UBMS) provides academic enrichment and motivational activities for high school students who possess an interest in and aptitude for mathematics, science, computer programming, or engineering, motivating them to complete high school, enroll in postsecondary education, and complete degrees in STEM fields. UBMS, a summer residential program on the UNT campus, has been in operation at UNT since October 1990. Student Support Services. (2011-2015) UNT's SSS program promotes campus engagement while providing a supportive network to college students in at-risk situations to facilitate successful completion of their chosen degree program by providing academic tutoring; academic, personal, and career counseling; exposure to cultural activities; information and assistance regarding student financial aid; and assistance securing admission and financial assistance for enrollment in graduate and professional programs.

UNT Traditions

Official School Colors - Chosen in 1922, these school colors are Emerald Green and White. Secondary colors were added in 1995, which are Navy Blue and Gold. In 2005, UNT's official color was changed to a similar shade of the original green.

Lighting the McConnell Tower - After a victory by a UNT athletic team, special green floodlights bathe the Administration Building clock tower to signal the victory to the campus and community.

Scrappy, The Eagle Mascot - Students in a 1922 campus election chose the eagle over the dragon and lion as the college's mascot. In the '60s, a costumed Scrappy began appearing at games and other events. The mascot was renamed Eppy in 1974 by students who thought the name "Scrappy" was too warlike. However, Scrappy was reborn in 1995, when students decided the first name was better.

Eagle Claw - The eagle hand sign is our universal sign of pride and unity. Curl the thumb and index and middle fingers forward. The ring and pinkie fingers stay closed against the palm.

Honors Day - Outstanding students, faculty and staff are recognized in an afternoon ceremony that often includes alumni as guest speakers.

Alumni Appreciation Day - For more than 30 years, the university and many academic departments have set aside a day to recognize successful and dedicated alumni, inviting them back to campus for special events.

University Day - First held in 1961, when North Texas State College became North Texas State University, this spring event includes music, food, and camaraderie.

Homecoming Bonfire - The tradition of the Homecoming bonfire began in the '30s. Members of the Talons spirit organization build the fire, which is lit the Friday night of Homecoming.

Homecoming Parade - Held the morning of the Homecoming game, the parade includes floats made by students, faculty, staff, alumni, and community members. The route runs from campus to downtown Denton.

Mean Green Nickname - Although green has been the school color since around 1902, the "Mean Green" nickname dates from the late '60s when the football team's defense was dominating other teams. One of the outstanding players at the time was "Mean" Joe Greene.

Boomer, The Victory Cannon - The tradition of firing the cannon began in 1970. The modern cannon is a scale replica of a Civil War model and is managed by the Talons. Boomer is fired at special campus events and at football games to signal touchdowns.

Curfew and Spirit Bell - The Spirit Bell was brought to Denton from Michigan in 1891. It was used to signal class changes and evening curfewitions The 2,000-pound bell served as a sound of victory for many years until a crack was found within. The Talons dedicated the original bell to the university in 1982,

and it was placed in the University Union across from the One O'Clock Lounge. Though smaller, the bell's successor can be heard at any home football game ringing with pride.

Official Class Ring - Unique to North Texas, the official ring portrays our Eagle mascot, university seal and the McConnell Tower. The two clock faces show different times—one o'clock for the internationally recognized

One O'Clock Lab Band, and seven o'clock noting the 1892 curfew for students of Texas Normal College and Teacher Training Institute.

Mean Green Village - Various groups set up tents near Fouts Field before home football games. Meals are available at this popular social event, which is one of the university's newest traditions.

Rights of Students

Each University of North Texas student is entitled to certain rights associated with higher education institutions. These rights include:

- 1. The right to submit an application to the university and be accepted according to the university's published requirements. No qualified applicant shall be denied admission because of race, religion, sex, national origin, physical or mental disability, age, or veteran status.
- 2. The right to expect a quality education.
- 3. The right to develop one's individual potential.
- 4. The right to be free from illegal discrimination on the basis of race, religion, sex, national origin, physical or mental disability, age or veteran status.
- In accordance with law and policy, the right to freedom of speech and assembly which are subject to university requirements for the maintenance and order and the protection of rights and privileges of other members in the university community.
- 6. The right to inquire, discuss, listen and evaluate in appropriate settings.
- 7. The right to be interviewed on campus by an employing firm, agency, corporation or organization that has met university qualifications. The student shall however register through the appropriate university department (i.e., Career Opportunities, Student Employment, Center for Cooperative Education, or the appropriate academic department).
- 8. The right to pursue an education without undue interference.
- The right to communicate with administrators, faculty and staff through the appropriate process.
- 10. The right to confidentiality of official records, transcripts, disciplinary records and other educational records consistent with the "Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974" (the Buckley Amendment).
- 11. The right to invite and hear speakers on topics of student choice subject to the approval of both student elected or appointed representatives and university officials.
- 12. The right to belong to university approved/recognized student organizations which shall be open to qualified students without respect to race, religion, sex, national origin, physical or mental disability, age or veteran status in accordance with organizational eligibility requirements.
- 13. The right to publish and distribute information through the appropriate forums subject to the standards of reasonable journalism and applicable regulations/statements of the U.S. Constitution, the Federal Communications Commission and the university. Similar rights are afforded oral statements of views on the student operated radio and television stations.

- 14. The right of access to university designated facilities through university approved/recognized student organizations for business meetings, special meetings, and programs open to the public in accordance with university policy. Student organizations are responsible for reserving university facilities in advance.
- 15. The right of students or university approved/recognized student organizations to use the university name only when identifying the university affiliation in accordance with university policy; using the university name or logo without the express permission of an authorized university administrator or university official is strictly prohibited.
- 16. The right to petition the appropriate university unit or body for redress of grievances in accordance with university policy.
- 17. The right to fair hearings and appeals.
- 18. The right to be free from hazing, threats, stalking, violence, and other harassing activities.
- 19. Students and student organizations may have other rights that are written into university approved policies.

Ten Student Academic Rights and Responsibilities

Each student is encouraged to review the following academic rights and responsibilities and to seek clarification from the associate dean of the college or school in which he/she is enrolled.

- Protection of Constitutional Freedoms Students and all other members of the university community are guaranteed the constitutional freedoms of speech, peaceful assembly, petition and association.
 - **Responsibility:** Students and others must exercise their rights by lawful means subject to university rules and regulations regarding time, location, method and duration. Students may not disrupt the operations of the university or interfere with the rights of others to exercise their constitutional freedoms.
- 2. Academic Freedom Students and all other members of the university community are guaranteed the rights freely to study, discuss, investigate, teach, conduct research and publish as appropriate to their respective roles and responsibilities. In the classroom and in conference students have the right within the scope of the course of study to state divergent opinions, challenge ideas and take reasoned exception to the data or the views offered.
 - **Responsibility:** Students and faculty share the responsibility to protect and to preserve conditions which are conducive to the learning process, including withholding judgment on matters of opinion, ensuring a fair hearing for divergent viewpoints and observing rules of courtesy in the classroom.

Academic Standards - Students have the right to know the standards
of academic performance established for each course in which they are
enrolled.

Responsibility: Students are responsible for seeking clarification of any standard in question at the beginning of the term, for preparing assignments in advance of each class session and for learning the content of any course of study for which they are enrolled. Rules applying to academic dishonesty must be followed, including those related to plagiarism and cheating.

4. Academic Evaluation - Students have the right to be evaluated solely on an academic basis, without regard to issues of diversity, opinions or conduct in matters unrelated to academic standards. Students have the right to review tests and other written work after the instructor has evaluated them and are accorded protection through the Grade Appeals Procedure against prejudiced or capricious academic evaluation.

Responsibility: Students are responsible for bringing academic grievances first to the attention of the instructor who performed the evaluation in an effort to resolve the issue. If the matter cannot be settled at this level, it may be appealed in writing as outlined in the Grade Appeal Policy.

5. Improper Disclosure - Except when disclosure may be required by state or federal law, students have the right to confidentiality of information about views, beliefs and political associations which they may share privately with instructors, advisors or academic counselors. Judgment of ability and character may be provided under appropriate circumstances, normally with the knowledge and consent of the student.

Responsibility: Students have the responsibility to state clearly what is and what is not confidential disclosure.

Personal Safety - Students have the right to a classroom environment that is free of obvious hazards to safety and security.

Responsibility: Students are responsible for compliance with university rules and regulations prohibiting firearms, explosives, incendiaries and weapons of any kind on the campus. Students are also responsible to abide by all health/safety rules and procedures in all academic courses and laboratories.

 Illegal Drugs and Alcohol - Students have the right to a learning environment free from illegal drugs and alcohol.

Responsibility: Students are responsible for compliance with university rules and regulations prohibiting possession, use or distribution of illegal drugs or alcohol in classroom buildings.

8. **Disruptions** - Students have the right to pursue an education without disruption or interference and to expect enforcement of norms for acceptable classroom behavior that prevents disruption of the teaching learning process.

Responsibility: Students may not disrupt class or any other university process by any means whatsoever (including sideline conversations, comments, arguments, noise of any kind or other activity which would hinder access to or utilization of academic information).

 Non-discrimination - Students have the right to learn in a classroom environment where diversity is respected.

Responsibility: Students are responsible for respecting diversity andther Policies for behaving courteously to both faculty members and other students in the classroom regardless of difference in race, creed, color, religion, age, nationality, sex, sexual orientation or disability status.

10. Intellectual Property - Students have the right to expect that presentation of material in a class will be in compliance with copyright law and that their own creative work will not be disseminated or published without their permission.

Responsibility: Students who receive written notification from a faculty member that the information provided in his or her course is the faculty member's intellectual property shall not distribute, use for commercial purposes, or create derivative works of the intellectual property without obtaining the express permission of the faculty member. Students shall not assume permission absent written notification from a faculty member. Students shall also respect and treat in similar manner, the intellectual property of other students.

Code Of Student Conduct And Discipline

Information contained in The Code is subject to change without notice. Printing of information does not constitute a contract between the University of North Texas and a student or applicant for admission. Students are responsible for information published by the University in this and all other official publications. This publication does not contain a complete statement of all University rules, regulations and policies.

Purpose Of The Code

Consistent with our mission of being a recognized student-centered public research university that harnesses the power of ideas through a culture of learning based on diverse viewpoints, interdisciplinary endeavors, creativity and disciplined excellence, the University of North Texas's primary concern is our students. With that in mind, the University has established standards of conduct to ensure a safe environment conducive to learning and professional and personal development. In our educational community, we each have an individual and collective responsibility to conduct ourselves in a way that demonstrates respect for the rights and property of others and upholds the integrity of the University community. The standards of conduct are written and approved by representatives of the University of North Texas's students, faculty, administrators, and staff with equal consideration for the wellbeing, honor and dignity of all who live, learn and work in our educational community.

Authority For Student Discipline

The Board of Regents has delegated responsibility to the University to develop a policy governing student conduct and discipline. The Center for Student Rights and Responsibilities, under the supervision of the Associate Vice President for Student Development, is responsible for implementing and applying the Code. This Code is applicable to current, continuing, and former students of the University, as well as individuals seeking admission to the University.

Conduct prior to admission to the University that may have an adverse affect on the student/University relationship may be considered by the University. Applicant and formerly enrolled student cases shall be reviewed exclusively by the Judicial Officer without right to appeal to the Committee on Student Conduct.

Student Responsibility

All members of the University community, including students, shall conduct themselves in a manner consistent with the University's function as an educational institution. Regardless of place of residence, each student must observe all federal, state and local laws, both on and off campus.

Other Rules, Regulations and Policies

Other rules, regulations and policies are published in a variety of manuals and booklets which pertain to specific areas of the university, such as Housing's ABC's of Residence Hall Living. The University Policy Manuals, available in the office of the Vice President for Student Affairs, contains full versions of all policies pertaining to students. These policies are also available in fuller excerpted versions on the UNT web page at http://www.deanofstudents.edu. The brief statements below are for general reference and provide a brief capsule of the policy referenced.

Academic Progress Requirements – Outlines quantitative and qualitative progress required for students who receive financial aid.

Accommodations/Auxiliary Aids for People with Disabilities – States UNT's compliance with Section 503,504 and the American With Disabilities Act.

AIDS Policy – Provides a fair and equitable method of responding to the occurrence of HIV/AIDS in the university community.

Admission/Reenrollment as Related to Personal Conduct/Admission
Falsification — Stipulates conditions under which individuals who have falsified their records may be considered for admission/readmission

Alcoholic Beverages Policy – Prohibits use of alcoholic beverages on campus except under specified conditions and specific time

Animals in Buildings or Classrooms – Prohibits animals in classrooms and buildings except those aiding disabled persons and laboratory animals.

Class Attendance – Regular and punctual class attendance is expected, whether or not attendance is part of the grade. See "Authorized Absences", "Absence for Religious Holidays" in your catalog.

Confidential Records – Delineates who may see student records and how access may be obtained. See catalog for details.

Correct Address – Failure to provide and update correct address at all times is a breach of the Code of Student Conduct for which penalties may be assigned.

Directory Information – Specifies what information about a student the university may give out and how a student may request that directory information be withheld (cf. Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act).

Disrupting School Activities – (cf. House Bill 186, 62, 1971) Makes the willful disruption of the conduct of classes or other school activities unlawful and defines disruptive activities.

Diversity Policy – States expectation that all members of the university community will refrain from behavior that threatens the freedom, safety and respect deserved by every community member in good standing.

Event Safety Policy – Specifies the type of events which may pose a safety or risk factor and the conditions under which such events will be approved.

Facilities Use Policy – Defines campus facilities; specifies necessity for scheduling and the means by which scheduling may be accomplished.

Final Examinations and Pre-final Week — Sets the standard and rules governing activities which may and may not take place during prePolicies finals and finals week.

Firearms/Explosives on Campus – Both are illegal, as well as against the Code; specifies felony status and penalties for breach of State law.

Food/Beverages in Classrooms – Consumption of food/beverage in classrooms is at the discretion of the instructor; lists conditions and penalties for failure to meet conditions.

Grade Appeals – Sets forth the conditions and procedures under which a grade awarded by a professor may be appealed when a student believes it has been inequitably awarded. Also see catalog.

Handicap Parking – [cf. Vernon's Civil Statutes, 6675a-5e(1)] Outlines conditions necessary for use of free spaces on campus marked "handicapped" and penalties for their misuse.

Hazing Policy – cf. Texas Ed. Code 4.01 – 4.500 Defines hazing (various abuses against human dignity) and specifies both State and university penalties for hazing, assisting others in hazing, permitting hazing to occur, or failing to report hazing in writing to university officials when in possession of first-hand knowledge of the planning of hazing or of a specific hazing incident involving a student at UNT.

Health Insurance for International Students – Specifies that international students must provide proof of insurance to the International Programs office prior to enrolling each semester.

Housing Policy – Delineates who must live in on-campus housing and exceptions.

Identification Regulations – Delineates necessity for students to have I.D. cards, to identify selves to any UNT official upon request, and authority of the Board of Regents to eject any person who has no legitimate business from campus.

Illicit Drugs and Alcohol Abuse – (cf. P.L. 101-226) – Specifies that unlawful possession, use, manufacture or distribution of alcohol, inhalants, illegal drugs, drug precursors on campus is illegal; specifies penalties and legal sanctions, health risks, and lists the university's drug and alcohol education programs.

Liability – The university does not assume any liability for loss of or damage to personal property of students or employees.

Lost and Found Property – Specifies UNT Police and Union Information Desk as repositories for lost and found; details disposal of property after 30 days.

Making Money – Refers individuals and groups to Solicitation, Sign and Facilities Use policies, which control use of UNT facilities for organization, personal or commercial money-making purposes.

Medical Withdrawal – Specifies the conditions under which a student may be withdrawn, voluntarily or involuntarily, for medical or psychological reasons and the terms under which such student may request re-enrollment.

Motor Vehicle and Bicycle Regulations – Given with each parking permit, specifies locations and conditions under which students may park cars; locations for riding bicycles and locations for securing them.

Nondiscrimination – UNT does not discriminate on the basis of race, color, religion, sex, age, national origin, disability, or disabled veteran Policies status. Harassment based on individual differences (including sexual orientation) is inconsistent with UNT's mission and goals.

Notice of Complaint – An official request that the student appear before a university administrator; failure to answer a summons can result in disciplinary action.

Open Records – Applies to the accessibility of information in the custody of UNT and refers those seeking access to the Vice Chancellor and General Counsel

Parking Violation Appeals – Specifies the composition of the appeals board and the conditions under which a student may appeal a parking violation.

Paying Bills – UNT cannot extend credit, thus cannot accept checks on which money must be advanced and post-dated checks.

Pedestrian/Driver Responsibility; Drivers' Duties – (cf. Art. IX. Sec. 76, Texas Traffic Laws) Outlines both the driver's and the pedestrian's responsibilities to exercise caution with regard to crosswalks, traffic lights, walking in roadway, requirement for solicitation permit if soliciting from roadway, etc.

Police Authority – Delineates authority of UNT Police as fully commissioned officers to enforce all laws of the city/county of Denton and State of Texas and requirement for all persons to identify themselves upon request to such officers.

Refunds – (See also UNT Fee Chart). Delineates conditions and circumstances under which a partial refund of tuition and fees may be given.

Returned Checks/Unmet Financial Obligations – Stipulates conditions under which students will be withdrawn for failure to pay financial obligations to UNT.

Sexual Harassment – Definition of sexual harassment, what to do if you believe you have been a victim; susceptibility of offenders to prosecution under the law and to penalties under the Code of Student Conduct.

Sign Policy – A part of the Solicitation Policy which specifies where and under what conditions signs may be posted on campus.

Smoking on Campus – UNT facilities are smoke-free, except "exempt" facilities; (including vehicles); specifies "exempt" facilities, provides for enforcement.

Solicitation – (cf. V.A.C. Art. 2919), Section 9) Defines solicitation, which is strictly regulated on this campus; prohibits commercial solicitation and open posting of advertisement or signs; states exceptions, defines terms and conditions under which any such activity may take place with a permit.

Speakers on Campus – Covers use of campus space for speakers, necessity to reserve space for a speaker, conditions under which a speaker's appearance may be cancelled and by whom, and use of the Free Speech area.

Student Organization Policy – Covers necessity for all organizations to be registered, to have a full-time faculty/staff sponsor or advisor, the duties of such sponsor or advisor, and the necessity for a 2.25 gradeher Policies point average for all organization officers and the duty to comply with applicable campus regulations.

Registered/Recognized Organizations – Defines these categories of student organizations and the privileges they may enjoy.

Severe Weather Closing Policy – States policy to publish weather-related closings by 6 a.m. via local radio/TV stations and provides numbers to call for more information. See details in "Schedule of Classes."

Student Participation in Governance – Delineates the way in which the university includes student opinion and input into all official committees.

Trespass or Damage – Requires compliance with State law regarding defacing or trespassing on State property.

Withdrawal – Covers the various categories of withdrawal, from voluntary withdrawal (see catalog) to administrative withdrawal.

Crime Awareness and Campus Security Act applicability: University of North Texas and University of North Texas System at Dallas

Policy: It is the policy of the University of North Texas to provide an environment conducive to its educational mission by complying with the Crime Awareness and Campus Security Act of 1990, as amended.1

Accordingly, each year the university shall prepare, publish and distribute through appropriate publications and mailings to all current students and employees and to any applicant for enrollment or employment, upon request, a security report containing crime statistics and campus security policies of the institution. The President shall designate a university official or university officials to be responsible for the development and continued implementation of this policy.

Implementation: The university shall create procedures to implement this policy and to comply with the Crime Awareness and Campus Security Act and publish information informing the university community of these policies. These publications and procedures shall include:

 a statement of current campus policies regarding procedures and facilities for students and others to report criminal actions or other emergencies occurring on campus;

- the university's policies concerning response to reports of criminal actions or other emergencies occurring on campus;
- a statement of current policies concerning security and access to campus facilities, including campus residences and security considerations used in the maintenance of campus facilities;
- a statement of current policies concerning campus law enforcement, including the enforcement authority of security personnel (including their working relationship with State and local agencies) and policies that encourage accurate and prompt reporting of all crimes to the campus police and the appropriate police agencies;
- a description of the programs designed to inform the university community about campus security procedures and practices and tother Policies encourage individuals to be responsible for their own security and the security of others;
- a description of programs designed to inform students and employees about crime prevention
- statistics concerning the occurrence of crimes on campus, in or on noncampus buildings or property, and on public property during the most recent calendar year and during the two preceding calendar years, as defined and required by the Crime Awareness and Campus Security Act;
- a statement of policy concerning the monitoring and recording, through local police agencies of criminal activity at off-campus student organizations which are recognized by the institution and that are engaged in by students attending the institution, including those student organizations with off-campus housing facilities;
- a statement of policy regarding the possession, use, and sale of alcoholic beverages and enforcement of State underage drinking laws; and
- a statement of policy regarding the possession, use, and sale of illegal drugs and enforcement of federal and state drug laws and a description of any drug or alcohol abuse education programs.

Program Review: The Vice President of Student Affairs and Dean of Students, in conjunction with representatives from the University Police Department, Office of the Vice Chancellor and General Counsel, and Marketing and Communication Department, shall review the procedures, policies, law annually, to ensure that the information provided to the university community is current and that the university remains in compliance with applicable federal and state laws.

Subject: Public Information Policy and Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act

State law, with few exceptions, gives you the right to be informed about the information UNT collects about you. It also gives you the right to receive and review this information and the opportunity to have UNT change any incorrect information. UNT's Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act and privacy policies are available at www.unt.edu/untpolicy. Pursuant to the provisions and intent of Chapter 552, Texas Government Code, known as the Public Information Act, and the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) of 1974 as amended, known as the Buckley Amendment, the university has established a policy relating to the accessibility of student information in the custody of the University of North Texas. The UNT FERPA Policy Statement appears in its entirety in the UNT Policy Manual, policy number 18.1.9. Information not covered by FERPA will be released only in accordance with the policy on public information found in policy number 10.6 of the UNT Policy Manual. Requests for such information must be made in writing. FERPA affords students certain rights with respect to their education records. They are:olicies

- 1. The right to inspect and review the student's education records within 45 days of the day the university receives a written request for access. Students should submit to the registrar, dean, head of the academic department or other appropriate official, written requests that identify the record(s) they wish to inspect. The university official will make arrangements for access and notify the student of the time and place where the records may be inspected. If the records are not maintained by the university official to whom the request was submitted, that official shall advise the student of the correct official to whom the request should be addressed.
- 2. The right to request the amendment of the student's education records that the student believes are inaccurate or misleading. Students may ask the university to amend a record that they believe is inaccurate or misleading. They should write the Office of Vice Chancellor and General Counsel, clearly identify the part of the record they want changed, and specify why it is inaccurate or misleading.
 - If the university decides not to amend the record as requested by the student, the university will notify the student of the decision and advise the student of his or her right to a hearing regarding the request for amendment. Additional information regarding the hearing procedures will be provided to the student when notified of the right to a hearing.
- 3. The right to consent to disclosures of personally identifiable information contained in the student's education records, except to the extent that FERPA authorizes disclosure without consent. One exception which permits disclosure without consent is disclosure to school officials with legitimate educational interests. A school official is a person employed by the university in an administrative, supervisory, academic or research, or support staff position (including law enforcement unit personnel and

health staff); a person or company with whom the university has contracted (such as an attorney, auditor, or collection agent); a person serving on the Board of Trustees; or a student serving on an official committee, such as a disciplinary or grievance committee, or assisting another school official in performing his or her tasks. A school official has legitimate educational interest if the official needs to review an education record in order to fulfill his or her professional responsibility. Upon request, the university discloses education records without consent to officials of another school in which a student seeks or intends to enroll. UNT will automatically forward a student's record to these institutions upon their request.

4. The right to file a complaint with the U.S. Department of Education concerning alleged failures by the University of North Texas to comply with the requirements of FERPA. The name and address of the office that administers FERPA is:

Directory information regarding the student will be provided to the public upon request unless student files a request in the Registrar's Office asking to be excluded from the directory or from any other requests for open directory information from outside entities. The request should be submitted prior to the 12th class day in the fall and spring terms, the 2nd class day of the May mini-mester, or the 4th class day in the summer terms. A request to withhold information may be submitted after the stated deadline for a term, but information may be released between the deadline and receipt of the request. The file of a student who has asked to be excluded from the directory information will remain flagged until the student requests that the flag be removed.

Directory information consists of a student's full name, address, e-mail address, telephone number, date and place of birth, major field of study, classification, participation in officially recognized activities and sports, weight and height of athletic team members, dates of attendance, degrees, awards received, the last educational agency or institution attended previous to UNT, and photograph.

The University of North Texas will disclose information from a student's education records only with the written consent of the student, except:

- To school officials who have a legitimate educational interest in the records.
- To officials of another school, upon request, in which a student seeks or intends to enroll.
- 3. To certain officials of the U.S. Department of Education, the Comptroller General, and state and local educational authorities, in connection with an audit, or certain state or federally supported education programs.

- 4. In connection with a student's request for or receipt of financial aid, as necessary to determine the eligibility, amount or conditions of the financial aid, or to enforce the terms and conditions of the aid.
- If required by state law requiring disclosure that was adopted before November 19, 1974.
- 6. To organizations conducting certain studies for on behalf of the university.
- 7. To accrediting organizations to carry out their functions.
- To parents of an eligible student who claim the student as a dependent for income tax purposes.
- 9. To comply with a judicial order or a lawfully issued subpoena.
- 10. To appropriate parties in a health or safety emergency.
- 11. To an alleged victim of any crime of violence, the results of any institutional disciplinary proceeding against the alleged perpetrator of that crime with respect to that crime.
- 12. To release information designated as directory information unless student has requested such directory information be withheld.s
- 13. To a victim of an alleged perpetrator of a crime of violence or nonforcible sex offense if the institution determines as a result of a disciplinary hearing that the student committed a crime of violence in violation of university rules or policy or state or federal law, as authorized by state law.
- 14. To a parent or legal guardian of a student, information regarding any violation of university policy, or state, federal or local law, governing the use or possession of alcohol or a controlled substance if the student is under the age of 21 at the time of the disclosure and it is determined that he/she committed a disciplinary infraction, as authorized by state law.
- 15. To a court in which the university is defending itself against legal action initiated by a parent or eligible student.
